Faith and Works: A Bible Study on James 2:20–26

Scripture Passage (KJV)

James 2:20-26

- 20 But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?
- 21 Was not Abraham our father justified by works, when he had offered Isaac his son upon the altar?
- 22 Seest thou how faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect?
- 23 And the scripture was fulfilled which saith, Abraham believed God, and it was imputed unto him for righteousness, and he was called the friend of God?
- 24 Ye see then that a man is justified by his works, and not by faith only.
- 25 Likewise, was not Rahab the harlot also justified by works, when she had received the messengers, and had sent them out another way?
- 26 For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.

- What does "faith without works is dead" mean to you?
 - Consider examples from your own life where your actions have reflected your beliefs.
- How did Abraham demonstrate his faith?

Reflect on the significance of his willingness to offer his son Isaac and what this teaches us about obedience.

- In what practical ways can you live out your faith?
 - Discuss personal, church, or community actions that could be seen as the "works" of your faith.
- How does Rahab's example challenge or encourage you?

Think about how someone with a questionable background can still display genuine faith through their actions.

• How do you balance your belief in God with the actions you take daily? Share ideas on integrating faith and works in everyday decision-making.

Reflection

Take a few moments to meditate on your walk with God:

- **Self-Check:** Are there areas in your life where your actions might not fully reflect your faith?
- **Prayer Prompt:** Ask God to reveal specific ways in which you can be more active in living out Your Word.
