Dear friends in Christ,

New Year greetings in the name of our risen Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

May I introduce myself to you as your part time interim pastor? While many of you have either met both my wife Nancy and I, or attended worship where I led on several occasions recently, I would like to share a bit more detail of our background.

Sycamore, Illinois is where I was born into a family of six children. My mother taught grade school and my Father was an automobile salesman with an emphasis on General Motors products. I became interested in agriculture while in high school as a member of the FFA. Our family had moved from town into the country when I was 13. I worked for area farmers and took on raising beef cattle as my FFA project. While in FFA, our inspirational ag teacher convinced me that I could begin a farming operation, even though my family did not own land, nor had capital to do so. In 1972, our ag teacher helped me rent 100 acres to begin and a farmer I worked for loaned me \$6,000.00 in order to get started—since no bank would supply an operating loan. I attended Kishwaukee College and obtained a degree in Farm Management, Cum Laude. The farm grew to 300 acres and then gradually to 1100 acres. I farmed with Nancy's help for 25 years.

We attended Salem Lutheran Church as a family, and faith was foundational to my upbringing. I loved attending worship, youth group and was elected to serve on the congregational council at age 18. The next youngest man - only men on council at that time - was 35 and the rest were older. As a senior in high school, I asked my pastor what it would take to become a pastor. When he told me 8 more years after high school, that seemed like simply too much at the time. I loved farming and I loved the church - so I served in any way I could from youth group leadership, to shoveling snow to choir to whatever was needed. I was married at age 20 to Kara Bealmer. Kara finished college to become a teacher but became ill. She died at age 23 from a metastasized brain tumor. Needless to say, that was a time that deeply challenged my faith. "Where are you God?" I wondered. I did learn the importance of worship in that time, because I attended worship even in the pain. While I could not repeat prayers or sing the hymns - others near me did and that is what carried me through to better days.

I met Nancy, (a true gift from God,) who had lost her Father at age 15 thus giving her an understanding of the fleeting nature of life itself as well as a deep understanding of what it means to be alive - that life is a gift and there are no guarantees. We married in 1980 and have two daughters, Stephanie and Michelle. Stephanie is married to Pete Klein and they have one son, Benjamin, age 11. Stephanie, Pete and Ben live in Peosta.

Michelle is single and lives in Sycamore, IL.

We left the farm in July of 1997 so that I could attend Wartburg seminary. I graduated in 2001 after completing the course work to obtain a Master of Divinity degree. Ordination and first call led us to Kansas City, Missouri at Gloria Dei Lutheran Church for three years, 2001-2004. I was associate pastor at Gloria Dei. Second call was to Sterling, Illinois to St. John's Lutheran Church where I served from 2004-2016. At St. John's, I was senior pastor with a staff of 8. My third call was to Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church in rural Scales Mound, Illinois from 2016-2019.

I retired at age 65 in 2019, just before covid hit. I had experienced some health concerns, specifically, severe joint inflammation, leading to the decision to retire from full time ministry. I have been diligent in participating in the recovery and for several years now have been blessed with excellent health. It is important for me to measure my energy output to maintain wellbeing.

As you may already know, the agreement with St. John's (thus all of you) and stated in the Northeastern Iowa Synod contract, is that with the help of God and based on God's Word, I will lead worship on the first and third Sundays with Holy Communion, tend to administrative matters such as council and trustee meeting guidance, visit the sick and or dying, preside at funerals, weddings and baptisms as needed, and focus on three main areas: 1) visitation, 2) family and youth ministry, and 3) pastoral leadership at church and outreach to the community as I am able. I plan to offer office hours on Mondays following the first and third Sundays from 9:00 am-1:00 pm and adjusted as needed. Of course, appointments at other times at church, in homes or in other agreed upon locations are most welcome! The agreement is based on a one quarter time schedule which means an average of 12.5 hours per week.

It has been a joy to be with you already and I believe God has brought us together to share ministry that enlivens and feeds our shared faith in significant ways. Certainly, things will be different in some ways so I ask you to affirm with me the eternally true statement that "life is full of change- may we together seek the Spirit of God in every one!"

Beat The Winter Blues In Christ

Focus on spiritual practices like prayer, gratitude, and meditating on encouraging scriptures while also incorporating healthy habits like getting sunlight, staying active, eating well, and connecting with others to combat seasonal sadness and find renewed strength in faith

Spiritual Strategies

- * **Pray & Reflect:** Find a quiet space to talk to God, laying your emotions before Him; use specific prayers for depression and anxiety to find peace in Jesus.
- * **Practice Gratitude:** Start a daily journal listing things you're thankful for to shift your focus and invite God's peace.
- * **Meditate on Scripture:** Read and internalize verses like ("Don't be afraid, for I am with you") and ("He gives strength to the weary") for renewed hope.
- * **Declare God's Truth:** Speak out affirmations like "The joy of the Lord is my strength" to combat negative feelings.

Practical Self-Care (Rooted in Faith)

- * **Get Natural Light:** Take walks outside, even short ones, and sit near windows to absorb sunlight and boost mood.
- * **Stay Active:** Exercise releases endorphins and can be a way to connect with God's strength.
- * **Eat Well & Hydrate:** Good nutrition supports both physical and mental health.
- * **Stay Connected:** Combat loneliness by reaching out to friends, family, or church groups; help others by volunteering to bring good news to them.
- * **Create Joyful Rituals:** Engage in fun, simple activities, like reading, taking baths, or cuddling a pet, as acts of self-care.

Recognize that feelings of sadness, lethargy, or anxiety can sometimes be more serious (Seasonal Affective Disorder) and it's okay to see a doctor or mental health professional for support.

The projected cost savings will help offset ongoing expenses such as building insurance and staff salaries, strengthening the financial sustainability of our ministry.

The assistance provided by the Allamakee Energy District was invaluable. They helped get the process started by bringing the possibility of solar energy to our attention and clearly outlining the overall cost savings, which gave us the confidence to move forward with the project.

How to Find Joy in Christ

How to find joy in Christ, which involves a deep relationship with Jesus, trusting God's promises, living His teachings (serving, prayer, scripture), and finding hope and peace even in suffering, making it a steadfast inner state rather than just a fleeting feeling. Many believers describe this as an unshakable, powerful joy stemming from knowing Christ is present and guides them, fulfilling a purpose beyond circumstances.

Key Aspects of Finding Joy in Christ:

- **Relationship with Jesus:** It starts with knowing and surrendering to Jesus, making Him the center of your life.
- **Focus on the Savior:** Joy comes from focusing on God's plan, His gospel, and His presence, not just life's situations.
- **Hope & Peace:** Joy is linked to hope in God, providing deep, unshakable peace even amidst trials.
- **Living the Gospel:** This includes serving others, praying, studying scripture, and keeping commandments.
- **A Fruit of the Spirit:** Joy is a result of the Holy Spirit living within, especially as one yields to God's direction.
- **Beyond Happiness:** It's distinct from temporary happiness; it's a deep-down assurance that the "sun is still behind the clouds".

How Believers Experience it:

- Finding joy through service and helping others.
- Experiencing deep contentment and positive mindset.
- Feeling God's presence and love constantly.
- A new song of praise emerging even from dark times, as God lifts them up.



Ultimately, Christians believe joy in Christ is a deep, personal experience of God's presence and promises, leading to a transformed, hopeful life.

Christian Music Genres

How have you found Christian versions of different genres of music? The Bible encourages listening to music that praises God, like psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, but doesn't specify one genre. Instead, it suggests evaluating music based on its message, encouraging Christians to choose music that is biblically accurate, edifying, and stirs devotion to God. Ultimately, the goal is to listen to music that "dwells richly" in your heart and leads to gratitude and praise, regardless of the style.

Christian music is a vast genre encompassing many styles, from traditional hymns and Gospel to Contemporary Christian Music (CCM) with its pop, rock, and hip-hop forms, to Worship music, Southern Gospel, Christian Metal, and Christian Country, all sharing themes of faith, praise, and devotion, with major branches like Gospel focusing on African American traditions and CCM on modern sounds.

Major Categories & Styles

Gospel Music: Rooted in African American traditions, it includes styles like Traditional, Quartet, Urban Contemporary, and Southern Gospel, known for emotional expression and improvisation.

Contemporary Christian Music (CCM): A broad umbrella for modern styles emerging from the "Jesus Movement," featuring pop, rock, country, and hip-hop.

Worship Music: Focuses on congregational praise and often overlaps with CCM, including modern worship, hymns, and liturgical music, with artists like Hillsong and Bethel Music being prominent.

Specific Genres & Subgenres

Christian Rock/Pop/Hip-Hop/Metal: Incorporates secular genres with Christian lyrics (e.g., DC Talk, Skillet, Lecrae).

Southern Gospel: Often features vocal quartets and piano-driven arrangements, popular in the South.

Christian Country: Country music with faith-based themes.

Bluegrass Gospel: Traditional Appalachian style with a spiritual focus.


Liturgical Music: Music for formal church services, including hymns, chants, and anthems.
