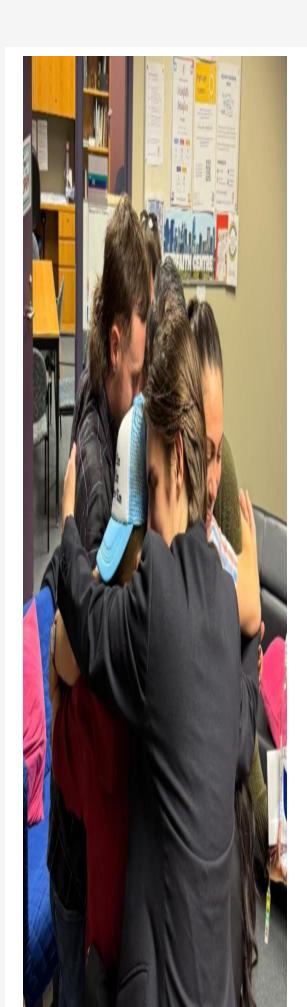
Yes, students are stressed and anxious. Yes, concerns about the future loom large. Yes, we had an incredible trip building a home,
