#### **Referral Process:**

Submit a written referral (MDHHS-5594, the Trauma Assessment Referral form or MDHHS-5937, Adoption/Guardianship Trauma Assessment Referral form) identifying the following:

- a. Date of referral.
- b. Name of child referred for assessment.
- c. Name of adults to include in the assessment process.
- d. Current health providers and contact information.
- e. Reasons for referral.
- f. Reports accompanying referral.
- g. MiSACWIS Service Authorization Number

#### Referral form must reflect all required approval signatures.

- a. Each person to be provided service shall be identified by name.
- b. Contractor cannot provide services in advance of receipt of the written referral (including all required approval signatures).
- b. Contractor must contact the referring worker within seven (7) calendar days of receipt of the completed referral.
- c. Contractor must make three (3) attempts to engage the caseworker and caregiver(s) within fourteen (14) calendar days of receipt of the referral.

#### If engaging the caseworker and caregiver(s) is unsuccessful, the contractor must reject the referral.

- d. Provide the referring worker with the following within seven (7) calendar days of completion of interviews and testing:
  - Resiliency factors/strengths
  - Testing completed,
  - Areas to monitor,
  - Preliminary diagnosis,
  - Preliminary recommendations

#### **Eligibility Criteria:**

- A. The child or youth has a current open MDHHS foster care, children's protective services (CPS), MDHHS juvenile justice (JJ) case, or the child is in an adoptive home or subsidized guardianship and the referral is being made by a Post-Adoption Resource Center (PARC).
- B. The current open MDHHS foster care, CPS, JJ case must remain open until the Comprehensive Trauma Assessment Report is:
  - Completed and sent to the caseworker,
  - Recommendations are reviewed with the family,
  - Plans are made for implementation,
  - Invoice is paid.
- C. The child must be ages 0-17.

Prior to referral for a comprehensive trauma assessment, any child less than three years of age must have been referred to all of the following:

- Medical professional/Pediatrician
- Early On
- CMH for Infant/Early Childhood Mental Health treatment services

At least one of the professionals listed above must recommend a referral for a comprehensive trauma assessment. Documentation of the decision to refer, including applicable reports, must be included with the MDHHS-5594, the Trauma Assessment Referral form or the MDHHS-5937, Adoption/Guardianship Trauma Assessment Referral form.

- D. Residential placement is being considered for the child because of disrupted community placements due to the child's behavior and/or functioning.
- E. The assessment is recommended by a mental health clinician or medical professional.
- F. Child in a residential placement continues to struggle with functioning and behaviors despite treatment.
- G. The child received an 11+ on the Trauma Screening Checklist AND is not benefitting from current services.

#### **Description:**

#### Service #1 of 2: Comprehensive Trauma Assessment:

All trauma assessments performed by the Contractor must include:

- a. Testing, record review and written report.
- b. Clinical interview.
- c. Using a structured technique, observation and assessment of the overall quality and nature of the relationship between parent and child if the Temporary Court Ward (TCW) or adopted, or parent and caregiver (if permanent ward).
- d. Use of appropriate standardized tool(s) that are normed and validated.

The Contractor shall ensure that services accommodate the schedules of the client.

#### Service #2 of 2: Ancillary Services

Ancillary services are paid at an hourly rate and must be approved by the referring worker prior to commencement. Ancillary Services are requested and approved on the form, MDHHS-5599. The Contractor may bill MDHHS for mileage at the standard state rate, or the Contractor's usual reimbursement rate for employees, whichever is less, if travel is incurred to provide the approved ancillary services.

#### Ancillary services are listed below:

- 1) Perform off-site assessments at a youth detention facility, jail, home, residential facility, or prison, when determined necessary.
- 2) Perform off-site observations at schools.
- 3) Perform additional clinical observation and assessment of parent/child or child/caregiver relationship.
- 4) Review additional reports or documents exceeding the 10 documents identified in Service #1 of 2: Comprehensive Trauma Assessment under #9.
- 5) Conduct a partial assessment, identified as when the client refuses to cooperate, leaves early or the referring worker determines assessment is no longer necessary.
- 6) Prepare duplicate reports that are provided as a hard copy with an original signature.
- 7) Serve as a witness if the court has ordered participation.

Witness fees are to be paid by the court. If the county refuses payment, verification of their non-payment is required prior to MDHHS payment.

- 8) Prepare for and travel to and from court for court ordered testimony.
- 9) Attendance at Family Team Meetings or other caseworker requested meetings.

#### **Eligibility Criteria:**

- Children who are being placed in the foster care system under the care and supervision of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (Service #1 of 5 only).
- Children who are being placed with a relative through the foster care system and the relatives with whom they are placed.

**Referral Process:** The MDHHS county office will refer all eligible cases to the contractor.

#### **Description:**

MDHHS, in collaboration with The New Foster Care, is seeking to pilot Kinship Connections teams to identify potential relative caregivers and provide engagement, support, and licensing. The kinship connection teams are designed to increase timely permanency, placement stability, child safety and wellbeing, and relative licensure.

**Service #1 of 5:** Family Engagement **Service #2 of 5:** Family Support

Service #3 of 5: Family Support - Group Based

**Service #4 of 5:** Licensing Certification

Service #5 of 5: Additional Supportive Services

#### The goal of the program is to ensure:

- a. Children experiencing removal from their parent will be placed with a relative caregiver.
- b. Families will report satisfaction with services.
- c. Families will be licensed within 180 days.
- d. Relative families will become licensed.
- e. Children will achieve permanency 100 days sooner than the average permanency rate for children placed with kin.
- f. Children will experience less placement disruption than children not enrolled in this program.
