#### A WORD FROM YOUR DISTRICT RIDER EDUCATORS

Here we are rapidly approaching the colder riding season. I know that some of you put your bikes away for the winter and some of us continue to ride throughout the year.

I personally ride all year around. We bought our current bike in November of 2008 and I have ridden it at least once each month since that time. If you do plan on riding thru the cold months a few things to remember.

- Remember to dress for the temperatures. There are heated jackets, vests, pants, socks, gloves and many other products out there to make riding in cold weather safer and more comfortable. Research what works for you help you continue to enjoy the hobby that we love.
- Always be on the lookout for leaves on the road this time of year. If they are wet or damp, they can be especially slippery. This year I have been seeing and heard that the acorns are abundant this year and if they are on the roadway they can be as bad a sand on the pavement. Keep a close eye out.
- And as always this time of year please keep a close eye out for wildlife on the roads. Carolyn and I were on the way home from a Chapter Q meeting in Winfield on Highway 77 about 1.5 miles north of Douglass when there was a deer standing completely in our lane. Luckily we were in the car and not on the bike. We hit the deer with the right front of the car. We were not hurt but had to be towed into the body shop. Keep a close eye out for all types of wildlife.

To finish off this article, Carolyn and I are deeply honored by being named as the Frank Patton Award winners for this year. Ever since we have been in this organization, we have tried to contribute in any way that we can to help Kansas be the best that we can be. To have so many people that we call our friends and family is so great and we feel blessed. We both are committed to helping each one of you become the best and safest riders that you can. Thank you to Joe and Debbie Gattenby and the rest of you for awarding us this honor.

### Managing the risks involved in Riding a motorcycle

Riding a motorcycle is risky. No kidding. Since the day we first uttered the word "motorcycle," concerned friends and loved ones made every attempt to shoot down any hope of a future that included riding. They would eagerly share cautionary tales of ill-fated friends of friends who were foolish enough to straddle a "donor-cycle."

Public opinion is that riding a motorcycle is motorized Russian roulette. While it's surely not that risky, riding does stand out as an activity that goes against all manner of common sense. Which begs the question, "Why the heck do we do it?"

At least part of the answer lies in our perception that the risk is worth the reward. The reward can be the feeling of freedom and being fully alive or the satisfaction of mastering the unique challenges riding offers. Living life to the fullest and conquering challenges is great, but is it really worth the risk? Motorcyclists aren't the type to shy away from a reasonable amount of risk. And while some are willing to risk more than others, none has a death wish.

Risk is like gravity—it's ever-present and we always have to manage it. But unlike gravity, we can choose the amount of risk we are exposed to and act to minimize the risk that remains. Being a risk-management expert is a worthy goal because, if you haven't figured it out by now, motorcycling is not forgiving of ignorance or even mediocrity. Which is why it behooves you to learn risk-reduction strategies and advanced control skills.

You might be like a lot of riders who think their skills are just fine, but a mere absence of crashes does not give you an accurate measure of your ability to handle truly life-threatening situations. For example, many people learn that their cornering or braking skills aren't up to snuff when they are faced with a particularly complex event that they either fail to manage or barely survive. Let's take a look at three general areas of improvement that can tip the risk/reward ratio in your favor.

**KANSAS WINGER** 

Become a smarter rider. Plenty of people muddle through their first years on two wheels going from one near miss to another. It's tempting to write off these close calls as the cost of riding a motorcycle, but what these riders don't realize is that riding smarter nearly erases these unpleasant run-ins. Learning strategies for predicting and mitigating potential hazards will reduce the number of sphincter-puckering moments while improving your riding experience.

Be the master of your machine. Learn to corner, brake, shift, and accelerate until you can do so with the utmost control and precision. Advanced rider training courses conducted in a parking lot are a great way to get the ball rolling, but your training is not yet complete until you put these lessons into practice at real-world speeds. You can go a long way on your own, but it's safer and faster to learn from a professional instructor, whether that's on the street or at a racetrack.

Evaluate your behavior and attitude. Even well-developed strategies and control skills are no match for poor judgment or carelessness. It's great to have cornering and braking prowess, but don't assume having killer chops suddenly exempts you from responsible riding. Poke the tiger too hard and not even MotoGP-level talent will be enough to keep you from careening into the side of a minivan. You can choose to ignore the hazards and limits of the places you ride, but you do so at your own peril.

You choose to ride even knowing you can get hurt or killed. But with a bit of effort to advance your skills you can reap all of the rewards while reducing the risk of becoming the subject of one of those cautionary tales.

Bob and Audrey went just for the day, while Gary, Reba, Francis, and Joyce stayed overnight in the little motel nearby. A good time was had by all, especially since the weather cooperated this year.

Always up for a ride, Allen Robertson made a quick trip to Arkansas and back with some fellow Chapter B members and friends. The only agenda for the trip was to ride the Arkansas 'twisties' in only two days. Riding with Allen were Steve Ramirez, John English, Dan and Ellen Gray, Bob Morentine and Scott Henson. It was two days on some gorgeous roads. Steve and Allen left early on a very cool Sunday morning and within ten miles of Lawrence were riding in heavy fog. Then we will have most of January to get ready for that month's meeting. We look forward to seeing a lot of you there!







Stewart bridge north of Winfield built in 1904.

Stalter Bridge north of Winfield a litter further East and north of Stewart. The year this bridge was built is unknown.

Rock Creek bridge is just a short distance from Stalter was built in 1910.

The last bridge we visited was Timber Creek/Woolsey built in 1904. This was the largest bridge, but I was unable to get a good picture.
