

July already and by the time you read this, if you are not at WingDing, those of us that did go will be on our way home. I will be teaching an Advanced Rider Course for 2-wheelers at WingDing this year.

It has been a busy spring for the Rider Education team teaching you how to be safer riders. We hosted two Rider Coaches from other Districts to get them either certified or re-certified so they are able to conduct rider courses in their home Districts and help make their members safer riders also.

I would like to personally thank all of the members that took time out of their busy schedules to attend one of the courses to help them be better and safer riders.

I am going to keep this short and sweet this month. I found the following article which I thought would be appropriate for the hotter months of the year that discusses the dangers of dehydration.

I read about a gentleman was making a visit back to Thomasville GA from his new home in Ocala FL. It was a beautiful day and he felt good riding on his motorcycle, but after eating a few bites for supper, he passed out at a friend's home. The friends he was seeing took him to a local clinic. He was DEHYDRATED!

I have a news flash for you - summer is here! There have been several articles written about riding in cold or inclement weather, but not much on hot weather. What a perfect time for some really cool tips!

One thing that you can do to stay cool in hot weather is to stay covered. Along with providing protection from the sun and during a crash, it will help keep you cool when you are riding. When the air temperature is above 93 degrees, it will actually warm the skin if it is exposed. This is known as convection.

The heat being absorbed by your body must be cooled by sweating. Wearing protective clothing will reduce the amount of heat your body receives through convection and will reduce the amount of heat your body has to lose through sweating. It will be a challenge, though, in stop and go traffic going through large cities.

Some sportswear similar to what athlete's wear can help tremendously. A long-sleeved shirt made out of material that wicks away your sweat works wonders in the dog days of summer.

The key to these types of materials is air flow. As long as air is flowing over the material, it will evaporate your sweat and cool you down. You may want to wet down your clothing. If you have ever been caught in a shower while riding, you know all too well the cooling effect when the shower is over and you are riding with wet clothes. As the water evaporates, it takes the heat with it and cools you down. You can wet down a bandana and wear it around your neck where your blood gets close to the surface of your skin to help keep you cool.

Don't forget to hydrate. Drink plenty of water. Avoid sugary drinks, caffeine and alcohol. For long rides, you may want to consider a camel pack or other type of insulated container. When the camel pack is filled with ice water, it will be cool to your back and you can sip on water throughout the ride.

Pay attention to your urine on the pit stops. It should be nice and clear, indicating that you are well hydrated. The darker the color the more dehydrated you are and you need to get water on board.

Most of all, pay attention to your body. It will tell you what you need to know. What you want to avoid is riding until you are so hot that your body begins to weaken, and you lose focus on your riding. Plan your trip to allow plenty of rest stops, take water in and let it out. Wet yourself with fresh water, and enjoy your ride!

Head and eyes up!

Well here it is another month gone by. Other than HOT weather, nothing much has happened. We did get in a few rides. One was June 11th, we rode to Wellington for breakfast. Afterwards, since it had not gotten hot yet, we then rode through, Oxford, Winfield and Augusta, then home.

By the time you read this, Wing Ding will have happened. Even though I had not originally planned on going, I am going there for Friday July 1st. The weather outlook is for temps in the 90's and chances for scattered showers, and, of course, high humidity. I find Because I have difficulty riding long distances and I'll be going alone, I took the car instead of riding. You know, the idea of AC sure sounds good for the ride!

Looking at the calendar for July, not much is scheduled, so lets try to ride to other Chapters' meetings. There will be a Chapter cookout Saturday July 9th at Steve & Terri's. Please bring side dishes as the hamburgers, hotdogs and buns will be provided. It might be a good idea to bring chairs as well. Parking is available in the gravel lot south of the house. (Show up when I tell you) We will plan on starting about 5:00 p.m. Please RSVP so we know about how much food to provide. Other Chapters are certainly welcome.

Here is some information I think will be good to know during this hot weather:

Ticks are blood-feeding parasites that attach firmly to the skin's surface. They're usually found in shrubs and tall grassy areas and are most active in the United States during warmer months from April to September. However, tick exposure can occur year-round.

The biggest concern with tick bites is the exposure and transmission of infectious disease, including risk of Lyme disease. If you find an embedded tick, here's how to safely remove a tick and dispose of it.

SAFE TICK REMOVAL PROCESS

The longer a tick is attached, the more likely diseases or other problems will occur. Therefore, the whole tick should be removed as soon as possible. To best way to remove an attached tick:

1. Grasp the tick close to the skin with fine-point tweezers (various tick removal tools are also available).
2. Pull straight up with a steady, slow motion. Note that twisting or jerking can cause the tick's mouth to break off.
3. Clean the bite site with soap and water or an antiseptic wipe.
4. Wash your hands thoroughly when finished removing the tick.

If parts of the tick remain in the skin, or if the person develops a fever, rash, or aches within a few weeks of a tick bite, seek medical attention with a healthcare provider.

THE DON'TS OF TICK REMOVAL

There are many common tick removal misconceptions and folklore remedies to, in theory, make the tick's body detach from the skin. However, the following actions have no proven value and may cause additional harm:

- "Painting" the tick with fingernail polish
- Coating it with petroleum jelly
- Using a glowing hot match or alcohol

You should also avoid crushing the removed tick with your fingers. Instead, the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention](#) (CDC) recommends disposing of a live tick by putting it in alcohol, placing it in a sealed container (e.g. plastic bag), wrapping it tightly in tape, or flushing it down the toilet.

Our next meeting will be July 14 at Spears. Remember it is free pie night and my birthday!
(I'm not divulging my age other than to say it was a long, long time ago!)
