





and the caverns were sold in April 2013 to a private owner.

The group boarded a tram which took them through both developed and undeveloped areas. The massive ventilation system was a sight to see as were the "cave hairs" that grow only in one specific area of the caverns. True darkness was experienced during the tram ride as the lights were extinguished. It was a very informative tour.

Below is a trip report from Al & Sandy just the way they wrote it. Our Grand Adventure.

We began our adventure on May24th in the rain.

We rode through Topeka and went to the Friendly Cooker in Wamego for breakfast.

It wasn't until we left Kansas that we left the rain behind. That allowed us to have a pleasant ride through the sand hills of Nebraska. Alliance Nebraska was our stop for our first night out. On day 2 we rode northbound into cooler weather and clipped the south west part of the Black Hills of South Dakota riding into Wyoming. We set the GPS to avoid interstate highways and found out that going west through the north end of Wyoming involved a lot of zigzagging. Now that's my kind of riding. Sandy spotted some Moose when we were riding through the mountains in the Bighorn National Forrest so we had to turn around and go back to take pictures. They didn't seem to even notice us watching them. Eventually we made it to Cody and got a room for the night. That evening Jacob let us know that we needed to stay in Cody another night so that we could take in the sights of Cody. The next day we spent several hours touring the Buffalo Bill Cody Museum. That was awesome. That evening Jacob enjoyed a Buffalo steak and told us that now he understood why the Buffalo almost went extinct. It was because they tasted so good. We turned our sights to Yellowstone. Somebody was adding layers of coats as we rode up into the park. We were amazed to find the Yellowstone Lake was almost completely covered with ice. There was snow here and there in the shade of the trees as we rode onward to Old Faithfull. We just missed one eruption so we toured the Inn and the gift shop before going out to view the next one. No matter how many times you see it, it is always a breath taking event. Next stop were the lower and upper falls below Yellowstone Lake. The snow melt had them running bigger and faster that we have ever seen them. Truly a beautiful sight. We headed north past Mt. Washburn and stopped where some folks were looking at something in the distance. After they pointed out where to look we were able to watch a mother Grizzly bear and her yearling cub grazing. That was the first time we viewed Grizz while in Yellowstone. Next was Beartooth pass. It had only been open a few days when we rode through. There were places that they had cut through the snow banks that were at least 20foot deep and there was snow taller the Jacob in the ditches. When we stopped for a break in Red Lodge.

Jacob noticed that his back tire was running pretty thin so we spent the night in Laurel Montana. The next morning we were at the Honda shop in Billings getting a new tire installed. We decided to make up for the lost time by burning up the Interstate to Missoula to spend the night. The next morning we rode the never end miles of winding US-12 most of the way through Idaho. We turned south to spend the night in Halfway, Oregon. We had stayed at the same Mom and Pop motel 10 years ago. We saw Mount Hood and crossed over into Washington and drove west along the Colombia River. When we went back in to Oregon Al missed a turn and we ended up in downtown Portland. It was practically impossible to get anywhere and it was full of dirty hippies. After we finally got out of that one way, transit lane, how the heck do I get out of here, city we headed for the coast. It was a beautiful to travel on coast. 




