CHARLIE COMPANY SQUAD KILLS

DISTRICT CHIEF, WOUNDS SNIPER

While on a reconnissance patrol recently, the 1st squad of the third platoon of company C had a very profitable dry when they killed a new District Chief and wounded the sniper that was accompanying him.

After checking an old railroad bridge which Artillery had been shelling, squad leader Sgt Ronnie Ray(Moore, SC), while walking point, spotted an ammo can in a spider hole. With extreme caution, Sgt Ray moved closer for a better look and decided that it was a booby trap, Pfc George Mendall(Laplata, MD), the squads demolition man, was called forward to apply his ekills.

While Pfc Wendall was preparing the charge, Sgt Ray deployed his men along the railroad berm for security. After the charge was placed in the spider hole and detonated, Pfc Wendell was getting his equipment together when Pfc Larry Mueller (Hamburg, Minn) informed the squad leader that he had spotted two VC, one carrying a weapon and a pack, crossing a near by rice paddie.

Sgt Ray immediatly positioned his squad along the railroad berm in a hasty ambush emplacement. Pfc Mueller than shouted for the insurgents to stop and was enswered with fire from the VC carrying the weapon. Sgt Ray's squad than opened fire with their M-16's and M-60 machingun and killed one VC and wounded the other as they fled toward a near by tree line.

The squad then moved through the area finding the dead insurgent and his wounded comrade. A dust-off was called (cont. pg 2)

RECON SQUAD NETS FIVE NVA

While moving through an open area of rice paddies to set up their night ambush a squad sized element of E company's REcompletoon encountered a n estimated 30 NV a soldiers moving in their direction.

Reacting to the situation quickly, the squad moved into a hasty ambush emplacement. However, the enemy soldiers apotted the element and opened fire with

their automatic weapons.

Immediatly, So & Larry Osborn(Harts-ville, Ale), Sgt Donnis M. Dervin(Memaroneck, NY), Sgt Reymond G. Compbell(Forto-mouth, Va.), and Sgt John L. Slabich(Broklyn, NY.) got on line and, with supporting fire from Sgt Ronald F. Sturgill(Alexandria, Va.), Sp & Craig N. Goin(Portingles, Wa.), Sgt Robert P. Brownled(Horstown, Ill.), and Lt James P. Enlis(Coyenne, Wy.), assulted the enemy that initiated the contact.

Sp 4 Osborn, Sgt Dervin, Sgt Cambell and Sgt Slabich, using their N-16's to put out a heavy volume of fire, repeated exposed themselves to heavy enemy fire advance within 15 to 20 meters of the seemy positions.

on squad, the enemy was unable to break up it's tactical manuvering and was for-

ced to retreat,

Upon a sweep of the contact area, five dead enemy sobsiers, numerous packs and Chicom granadas were found.

Having successfully engaged the enemy, the Recon plateon was then inserte d

into the area by helicopter.

Upon landing, the men in the first chopper quickly and aggressivly began a sweep through the area. After moving about 200 meters, the men encountered an enemy bunker and moved into position to engage it.

While successfully surpressing the enemy, the remaining two groups of men were inserted and also moved up to engage the enemy position. With an extremly heavy base of fire being supplied by the rest of the plateon, Sgt Robert P. Brownlee (Hometown, Ill), Sgt Richard C. Combs (Jeffersonville, Ind), and Sgt Tom M. Day(Metamora, Mich) manuvered the mselves into a position where they could throw hand gernades into the entrance of the bunker. A gunship was the called to fire rockets on the bunker. As a result, of this action, two enemy soldiers inside were killed, one AK-47 rifle, two packs and various papers were captured.

Moving from the initial contact area Sgt Ronald F. Sturgill (Alexandria, Va.) spotted a lone NVA soldier and crossed an open area, exposing himself to enemy fire, to engage him and kill him at close

range.



As the squad moved up on the insurgent, a Vietnamese woman shouted a warning to him and he promptly jumped off the berm and into a ditch and started to evade. However, the aggressiveness of the third squad spailed his attempt as they quickly moved up to engage and kill him before he could escape.

A search of the area produced some. freshly washed clothes and, on a near by trail, a booby trap believed to have been sot by the feet VC.



(District Chief cont) for the wounded man and while waiting for the evacuation helicopter, the wounded man devulged to an interogator that the dead man was a new District Political fore, and that he was a sniper. Also lea-meters from their perimeter. The squa d rned from the wounded man were locations of 30 to 40 booby traps in the area and more valuable information from documents which the insurgents were carrying.


As the action continued, other members of the squad saw two to four men, one with a weapon, evading from the area and engaged them with small arms fire.

A call for ertillery illumination was put in and while awaiting this Tight" the mortar platoon fired for the squad. With light now being provided, Sgt To m Welker (Paola, Ks.) and Ffc Fantone moved to the area for a look.

Reaching the area, Sgt Walker and Pfc Fentone found the four VC, all sp pearing to have been killed by small are. fire. various orticles of clothing, scu. ment, and some medical supplies.

In a last attempt to eliminate the evading insurgents, an artillery fire mirsion was called into the area into which

they evaded.
