2008 Reunion

We are pleased to announce Charlie Company will be returning to the Hilton Cincinnati Airport **June 20-21** for our 2008 reunion! Their address is 7373 Turfway Road, Florence, KY 41042; phone number is 859-371-4400 and their URL is www.hiltoncincinnatiairport.com. The Hilton does have a free airport shuttle.

GUEST ROOMS

We have a block of thirty rooms reserved for the dates: **June 20 – 21, 2008**. The rate will be \$97 a night and is subject to an 11.3% tax per room per night, or the prevailing tax rate. This rate represents a discount off their anticipated published rates (currently \$119 for weekends) and will be good three days before and three days after the reunion. Be sure to tell the reservation clerk you are with the Charlie Company reunion so you can get this rate. The Hilton will honor this rate if we have more than thirty reservations as long as space is available. It is recommended that you make your reservations early.

We reserved 20 rooms in 2007 so 30 may look like a big jump but we had 25-27 rooms rented the Friday night of our 2007 reunion. The hotel does not require a 2-day stay. We'd love to have everyone both days but even one day makes it worthwhile. Check-In Time is 3:00 pm.

RESERVATIONS & BILLING ARRANGEMENTS

• Individual guest will call Hotel direct for reservations and are to pay all of their own charges

- All reservations must be guaranteed and accompanied by a first night room deposit, or guaranteed with a major credit card. Credit card authorization needed
- Cancellation of any reservation must be made **48 hours prior** to arrival date and confirmed by the Hotel cancellation number

CUT-OFF DATE is <u>May 30, 2008</u>. At the cut-off date, the Hotel will release any unreserved rooms for general sale. Any reservation received after the cut-off date will be accepted on a space and rate available basis.

Once again we will have a Meeting & Hospitality Room and a Reception Friday afternoon. We will also have Regional Refreshments once more. We are planning a Friday evening meal at or near the hotel. Saturday's events include a golf outing, a tearoom brunch for the ladies, and an evening banquet. Reunion attendees will receive a 10% discount in Grand Café in the Hilton if you want to eat other meals there.

Any questions, suggestions or recommendations about any aspect of the reunion would be welcome.

TTU & The Vietnam Center and Archive

In May 1989, a group of Vietnam veterans from West Texas gathered at Texas Tech University to discuss what they might do about their experiences in Vietnam. Their immediate decision was to form a Vietnam Archive and begin collecting and preserving materials relating to the Vietnam experience. In November 1989, the Board of Regents of Texas Tech University established the Vietnam Center.

The Vietnam Archive mission is to collect and preserve the documentary record of the Vietnam War. The first collection received by the Archive - a package of letters from a Navy hospital corpsman to his family while serving in Vietnam - symbolizes their commitment to preserve the record of individuals and provide greater understanding of their experiences. In addition to its mission of collecting materials concerning Vietnam, the Vietnam War, and Southeast Asia, the Vietnam Archive currently administers two projects, the Oral History Project and the Virtual Vietnam Archive. Over the past few years, the Vietnam Archive has made a concerted effort to record the histories of veterans organizations and their members and includes The Veterans' Association section in their website.
