July 2, 1969 a call came over the radio for Line #500 to come in for a job interview! #500 was yours truly and I didn't believe it. May 8, 1970 was my DEROS and I hadn't been in country for two months yet. According to my diary, someone told me the day before I had a good chance to get a job in the rear. It also "noted" it didn't mean I had a job but it would be good for one day's sham time. I came in to Bronco that afternoon on the resupply chopper and reported to "Top" and he sent me over to S-1. The interview lasted about 15 minutes and my personal appearance must have been impressive! Again noted, "hadn't shaved in 2 weeks" and a proper bath may have been that long too. That may have had something to do with the 15 minutes.

Lifestyle of the rich and famous... I shaved and washed after supper and no flick so I went to sleep about 8:30. "Peaceful except for the Quad 50's once or twice." Slept 10 hours and went to breakfast, another hot meal. Naturally Top said I would have to go back to the field until he heard something. There was more resting time, letter writing and an actual shower before going back on the resupply chopper. We got a lot of sniper rounds a couple of hours later and called ARTY and air strikes (http://www.1-20infantry.org/3jul69.htm). We waited in the pines until it got real dark and then moved out to the beach for a quiet night and a real nice moon. I can still picture the pines and beach, as I am sure several of you can.

The first paragraph comes to mind at times while writing this newsletter. Those in 2nd platoon know I did not get the job and I later found out the job with S-1 was writing about KIA's. It is long gone as to the level the job covered but, although the time in country might have been easier, I am not sure that job was one I would covet. However, now I am doing it to an extent.

By the time our fourth reunion came around Leonard "Snake" Harootunian had died and it would be the last reunion for Captain Chuck Seketa and Keith Trace. We have had nine other deaths of those attending the reunions since those first three: Wayne Kelly, Roy Otis, Joe Francomacaro, Don Townsend, Duck Watters, Jerry Groce, Dan Malin, Chris Walker and John Loeb.

Dan would send me names and SSNs to check with the SSDI to see if a person was still alive before he searched some more. Over the years we have found several we knew but it did not seem to hurt as bad as what we experienced with those we had seen at the reunions. Not wanting to attend a reunion reminded me why some of the "older" guys in country did not want to make friends with the new guys...it hurts to lose a friend.

So do you want to keep on going to these reunions and seeing these old guys (myself included) as they are getting close to the end of their mortality index? Many have answered yes... seeing them again and catching up with their lives... work, wife's and children and grandchildren. It is definitely worth the time for many to see these guys again. Dan often said on the phone or at the reunion about getting more to attend, "Don't they know they are not getting any younger?"

However, from experience, Dan and I both have found there are those who do not want to think or relive anything from VN again. That is understandable and everyone at the reunion would agree and not hold that against anyone. It would surprise some of you just how much someone might like to see a buddy again. It might also surprise you at the joy many have found at these reunions. There are tears, hugs.... all those things we would not have been caught doing "when we were young"... and there are many good things too. For you who have never been but you have considered attending or if it has been a while, just remember what Dan said, "We are not getting any younger!"
