The Sykes' Regulars maintained its pressure on the enemy this week and reported seven enemy either killed, can-

tured, or wounded.

Dec. 4, Bravo Co.'s 1st Platoon reacted to information concerning an enemv ounker near the Red Ball. The men moved in and wounded a VC/NVA in the bunker. Found with him were various items of NVA equipment and 800 pounds of rice. That aft rnoon, Charlie Co. detained a Vietnamese civilian who tried to evade a group of engineers from the 26th Bn. when they entered a ville, north of 'uc Pho. The detainee was carrying tantial muntity of medical gear.

The next day, the 216th PF Platoon detained eight Vietnamese civilians whose activities in the hamlets along the Red Ball were suspicious. That night, a squad from Charlie Co. was moving to its ambush location when the men heard voices. In the contact that followed, the squad killed two NVA and fired on eight others wearing complete green uniforms who evaded with their weapons.

The next evening, Bravo Co. reported having found a bomb near one of its nositions. It was contained in a gallon can, and one of the blasting caps had been detonated, but the bomb itself did not go off. Later, Charlie Co.'s 2d Platoon destroyed three enemy fighting

positions and two tunnels.

Dec. 7, Charlie Co. uncovered 1400 pounds of rice, three miles northeast of Duc Pho. The come and slst Platoon reported having exchanged fire with a group of enemy troops, seven miles north of Duc Pho. The mon checked the area and found an AK-47 striper clip with two rounds.

Later during the day, Brave's 1st Platon destroyed an enemy fighting position, west of the Red Ball, some three

miles northwest of Duc Pho.

Charlie Co. then detained five Vietnamese civilians crossing the Song Cau
River. None of them had IDs, and one
had made a quick change of clothes on the
other side of the river.

The LOH picked up an NP from the Red Ball
and inserted another group of NPs and
MACV advisors, and the small band of Allies moved toward the Hoi Chanh's location.

Minutes later, the LOH spotted the Hoi Chanh standing near a hooch. The extraction party moved in, made the pick-up, and flew back to Liz.

The entire operation lasted no more than fifteen minutes—an effective demonstration of the battalion's swift mobility and genuine concern for the enemy who vishes to Chicu Hoi to the Allies.
