NON-US CITIZENS SERVING IN VIETNAM

Most non-US citizens presently serving in Vietnam are now eligible for citizenshipsunder the provisions of Public Law-90-633. MACV is considering sponsoring flights to Hawaii to enable eligible mncitizens to obtain naturalization.

Flights are tentatively scheduled for the week of 26 April-2 May 1970. Participants are limited to those persons who will use their R&R during that week. All non-US citizens interested in opportunity to obtain naturalization are requested to immediately contact the office of the Staff Judge Advocate, Legal Assistance Section, in person or call-CHL 3855 for further information.

Later, the 1st Platoon engaged four VC earrying packs and weapons. When the platoon epened up on the enemy, they dropped their packs and D-Ded. The packs contained clothing and .38 calibre ammo. Also, signs indicated that one of the VC had been wounded.
