Here at Lodi Post 22, Veterans are at the heart of everything we do. This pandemic has caused major disruptions for us, our outreach activities and our community support events. To date, since we have discontinued all events that require the use of our building, we are busy engaging in activities that will better enable us to support our veteran's community in the future. Monetary gifts have had a direct and immediate impact by ensuring our people have a safe place to acquire services, hold meetings, enjoy meals, and a place where they can access mental health services.

As the pandemic continues, we are taking this opportunity to update, repair and improve our building. We have thoroughly cleaned, repaired and re-painted our kitchen and our social hall. We are removing all of the unsafe ceiling tiles, re-painting the ceiling and will eventually install a dropped ceiling that will improve lighting and lower our utility costs. The social hall project will cost us more than \$30,000.00, and we understand that these two projects are outpacing available funds. We currently have in-hand and promises of approximately \$12,000.00, so we are stepping out on faith that ample donations will come in as we proceed. If you can contribute, you will be directly helping our veterans today.

I draw inspiration from the ways our Lodi American Legion Community is coming together to help one another. We think of the greater good and choose compassion in moments of need. That's what it means to lead with purpose, and that's what it means to be an American Legionnaire. I am deeply grateful for the generosity of our community.




