ST. PAUL'S LUTHERAN CHURCH HANOVER, PENNSYLVANIA 17331 At last week's Executive Committee and then Worship and Music Committee meetings, I suggested that we start lifting an offering again at our worship services.



Pending the council's approval at its May meeting, we will resume this practice on June 22. This entails passing the plates after exchanging the peace and not simply having the plates be available on tables where worshipers may place offerings when coming in or going from the worship services. Of course, passing the plates was the norm in most churches until COVID interrupted that tradition as churches understandably sought to minimize human contact among worshipers for safety reasons. While the pandemic is not over yet, it certainly does not present the threat it did and we feel that it is indeed safe again to sing together, exchange the peace, and pass the plates. I am grateful for this positive development.

Now, some see collecting an offering during worship as an interruption in the service. Others see it as a business interlude in the middle of the service. And some may even view it as some type of negative thing that we do to try to stay afloat. I assure you that it is none of these things. Collecting the offering during the service is an important part of the worship experience itself. Prior to collecting the offering, we have confessed our sins and heard the word of absolution (forgiveness), and heard of God's love for us in song, prayer, scripture reading, and preaching. Then at the point of the offering we can continue to worship God by placing a token of our thanks and praise in the plate for all that God has done, is doing, and will continue to do for us. The offering then is a real act of worship as it gives us a structured time to return thanks to God. This is potentially much more pointed and meaningful to worshipers than simply placing something in the plate upon entering or exiting the worship service.

I do realize that in our changing world some of you may give electronically or maybe monthly and not every Sunday. Either of these ways is a perfectly acceptable way to give. By all means, if you give, say electronically, and prefer that method, please continue to do so. When the plate passes by, you may simply meditate on the gifts that you are currently making online or monthly. Some churches even have cards that you could put in the plate indicating that you give electronically. Perhaps we can provide those cards here.

As a people we have so much for which to be grateful and praise God. May we really feel this as we place our donations in the plate. After making our offering we continue to be blessed as our Lord comes to us in the sacrament of Holy Communion. Praise be to God!

JUNE'S DESIGNATED GIVING - Special Designated Giving this month will go to help defray the medical expenses for Irelyn Sprenkle. Irelyn Sprenkle is an 11-year-old girl and on May 1st, 2024 was diagnosed with Wilms Tumor. Wilms Tumor is a type of kidney cancer that occurs in young children. It is responsible for 95% of all malignant kidney tumors in patients under the age of 15 years old. Wilms tumor can occur in one kidney (unilateral) or in both kidney (bilateral and can spread throughout the rest of the body. There are



about 650 new cases diagnosed each year in the United States.

Irelyn is a Spring Grove student in the 5th grade. She loves sports (gymnastics, soccer, basketball, and flag football.) She also loves music and is an avid Steelers fan. She loves the colors yellow and neon pink. Irelyn's parents are Kyle and Emily Sprenkle. They have 6 children. Irelyn (11), Crimson (8), Champlin (8), Dempsey (6), Landry (6), and Anistyn (3) and they live in Spring Grove. Irelyn's grandparents are Lance and Diane Sprenkle and Joe and Vonnie Mahon. Vonnie has been my friend for many years. Emily and my daughter, Kortni, were friends growing up. The Family attends Christ American Baptist Church. They have faith that God will get their daughter through this, and he will be with the entire family to give them the strength that they all need to help each other.

Irelyn has been going to Hershey Medical Center for treatments. Irelyn's journey started on April 22, 2024, with lots of testing. On May 1st, 2024, the family received her diagnosis – Wilms Tumor. On May 2nd, 2024, she received her first chemotherapy treatment. Irelyn has been going through many chemo treatments and surgeries in the past year. It has been a very hard year for both Irelyn and her family. The family has faith in God that he will be with them as they fight this disease and will heal her.

April 9, 2025, Irelyn completed her final chemo treatment,

On April 11th Irelyn rang the "Believe" bell to signify the end of inpatient chemo! While this marks a very important milestone for this journey, Irelyn has 2-3 weeks of recovery, scans, and then she will ring the final bell. Praying that there will be no evidence of the disease in her body, Irelyn will continue to have appointments at Hershey due to the blood clot that remains in her heart.

Please join me in praying for the Sprenkle family asking God to give this family the strength they need and to heal Irelyn.



A Mother, A Warrior, A Grandmother And Why PAL Matters

Every meal has a story behind it. For Kim Brock-McKinsey, those stories are filled with courage, resilience, and hope. A war widow at just 21 and a mother navigating life's many chapters, Kim has faced trials that would bring most to their knees — yet she continues to rise. From raising children while earning a black belt and a Penn State degree, to caring for disadvantaged teens, to enduring two simultaneous cancers and a life-changing spinal fusion, Kim's journey has been anything but easy. But her current chapter — living in poverty while caring for her grandchildren — has brought her to a new kind of battle: feeding her family on an income meant for one.

"While living just on my VA check (\$1600/month) and waiting for Social Security Disability, I gained custody of my grandkids," Kim shared. "Because of red tape, we didn't qualify for food stamps. PAL has been there for us. I was able to feed the kids and myself while we waited for child support and disability. I am forever grateful."



PAL — Provide-A-Lunch, a program through the Hanover Area Council of Churches — steps in when there's nowhere else to turn. For Kim, that meant not having to worry about where the next meal would come from while navigating the heartbreak of losing her grandchildren's father and yet another round of waiting for support.

"Now we are living on a small disability check, and after the children's father passed, we're waiting again — this time for their social security. But because of PAL, I do not have to worry about what to feed them."

Thanks to the kindness of our volunteers, donors, and community supporters, PAL is more than a lunch — it's a lifeline.

From all of us at the Hanover Area Council of Churches: Thank you for helping us serve heroes like Kim and the children depending on her.
