

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and... run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the founder and perfecter of our faith. "Do you see what this means—all these pioneers who blazed the way, all these veterans cheering us on? It means we'd better get on with it. Strip down, start running—and never quit! No extra spiritual fat, no parasitic sins. Keep your eyes on Jesus, who both began and finished this race we're in. Study how he did it. Because he never lost sight of where he was headed—that exhilarating finish in and with God—he could put up with anything along the way: Cross, shame,

whatever. And now he's there, in the place of honor, right alongside God. When you find yourselves flagging in your faith, go over that story again, item by item, that long litany of hostility he plowed through. That will shoot adrenaline into your souls!" Hebrews 12:1-3 (The Message translation)

Discipline in a long-distance race. That's how this section is titled in Eugene Peterson's <u>The Message</u>, a wonderful translation of the Bible. It calls to mind all the kinds of "races" with which we have been or are currently bombarded: the 80s/90s rat race, the arms race, the race to the top, the race for the White House, the crypto race, the AI race... Race, race, race. All these options, with thousands of daily ways to get twisted around, drained out, lost.

The poet who penned the lyrical letter to "the Hebrews" - a group of people, not a citizenry in a specific location - doesn't tell us to stay put. Oh, just the opposite. We're supposed to run. We're supposed to run smart, and light, and keep going. Most of all, we're supposed to run in one direction, with one purpose only. Follow Jesus.

Of all the motifs of a congregation transition process, my favorite imagery is of a "journey." I like the biblical heft and weight of it. Until the Call Process is initiated, that is. Then the imagery of the "long-distance race" seems to speak of the urgency, the direction and the obstacles of this particular, pivotal moment in the life of the congregation.

Baked into this imperative "Run!" is **trust**. Jesus has already started *and* finished all that you are running in now. There's no step in your life that Jesus hasn't already taken and completed first...the good, the bad, the terrible, the terrifying. He did it so that we would be able to see the road, to see the way. He did it so that we also can have confidence that it's an exhilarating, adrenaline-boosting race who's only destination is in and with God.

To explain the next steps of the Call Process, think about a marathon. A group of people gather, the starting horn sounds, and, en mass, you take off. That's the imagine of: the Council discerning that it was the appointed time to enter into the call process, the open process of setting and installing the team, and the opportunities (through a five-week

consecutive series of Congregation Conversations) to listen to one another as we directly answer questions on the Ministry Site Profile which is the multi-paged document the Call Committee will fill out and submit to the Synod as a synopsis of who you are as this congregation in this time and in this place.

The Call Process at this point is still an open one. There is an invitation for everyone to be heard, for everyone to contribute. Staff will have voice from their specific perspective in this process as well. Ultimately, the choice to run the race is up to every individual to accept and to show up to the invitation.

There's always a "doubting Thomas" group in the race, too. Usually they're driven by unique internal motivations known only to themselves. To those who's hearts may be weighted with what our Hebrew's poet writer calls "spiritual fat", know that this can be a part of the race, too, but it's not healthy to stay in such a state long-term. I'd invite you to heed the call to "go over that (Jesus) story again, item by item" and study how he (Jesus) ran the race. You're running with a team, and the adrenaline that fuels us all is **trust**-in God, made known in Jesus, and in each team member who is striving to keep our eyes on the road Jesus has laid before us.

In a marathon, there are runners who specifically are there to set the pace. If you want to run in under 3 hours, then follow this person. Wanna run in under 3:30? Follow this person. They're the ones that run at the pace that will get you to the finish line by keeping those goals. That's specifically *my* role. I have two major jobs specific to the Office of Intentional Interim Pastor in this run: I make sure you're on the road, and I call out obstacles coming at you.

Like the pacer, I'm making sure you're pointing in the right direction on the road. I'm not here to make a new road for you or set you on a direction "I" think you should be headed. Just the opposite, in fact. The course is set not by me, but by the Call Process itself. You have said you are ready to walk the road of the Call Process. I'm with you to make sure you're following the prescribed race route, that you aren't getting yourself twisted around with directions, and that you aren't "off roading" in random directions. Here's the start, here's the road before you, and there's the finish. I'm keyed into the direction you are setting on the route of the Call Process.

My second job is to call out obstacles that crop up along the way. "Look, there's a truck coming at you." I do not get into the truck and pump the brakes. I do not pull you out of the way. I call out the dangers, the risks, the inevitable glitches that come with running this course. It is YOU who decide how you respond. These are your choices, your work together to decide how you are going to navigate running this race, your choice of

candidates and your decision in calling your next pastor. It is the ultimate trust work of a congregation: believing that you have the best interests of each other at heart, believing that the folks that have been called up to speak into this process are listening hard and loving this faith community deeply, trusting that they are deliberately choosing to follow Jesus for the abiding love of this whole faith family, and confidently supporting them as we're all purposefully running together in the only direction that matters, to Jesus.

Welcome to the very next steps of the Call Process.

Congregation Conversations will be lead on five consecutive Sundays: October 20 & 27 & November 3, 10 & 17. They will be in the Fellowship Hall from 10:45 - 12noon. All are welcome and encouraged to participate.


The Call Committee and alternate were installed on Sunday, September 22, in the worship service.

FOR ALL THE SAINTS...

All Saints' Day this year is observed on Nov. 3rd. From the introduction of this day in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship hymnal resource:

"All Saints celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we

gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem."

One of the beloved traditions of this day is naming those members of the congregation who have died since last All Saints' Day. Those names will be lifted up during the Prayers of the People, with accompanying toll of the bells and other traditional recognition.

Again this year, we are inviting you to submit names of ANY of your beloved people who have died - regardless of the year they died - to be lifted up during the worship service. You may submit any names that are significant for you and may submit as many names as you would like to lift up. We will read those names and sit together in that remembrance during communion. You can write your loved ones name on a slip of paper and put it in the offering plate or place it in the slot on the church office door. Specify that the name(s) are for All Saints'. You can also call or email the church office (717-637-5941 or stpaulsyorkst@comcast.net) to submit names to be read on Nov. 3rd. Please submit your names no later than Sunday, October 27th.

We also invite you to bring a photo of any loved ones who have died. You're invited to place those photos on the tables in the worship space during All Saints' Worship. So great a cloud of witnesses with whom we will gather around the table this year!




 After prayerful and thorough deliberation and by unanimous vote, council affirmed Sherry Cracium-Bolin (Council
