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Greetings St. Paul's members,

It is with great joy I get to report the generosity abounding at St. Paul's! Our Annual Report contains information from September 1, 2021 – August 31, 2022. Many activities and ministries have begun anew after our two year pandemic pause. We are once again able to worship, serve and grow in our generosity and faith as a community.

Our full council not only meets monthly, but each is a liaison to a committee. Each Council member averages 3 additional St. Paul's activities regularly. Council renewed our purpose and principles and updated our 2022 strategic priorities this February. These include:

Purpose:

We are called through Christ to praise God and love generously.

Guiding Principles:

As instruments of God's love, when you see us at our best you will see us:

- Generously stewarding God's gifts of resources, time, and talents
- **Serving** as God's hands and feet in ministries and missions of outreach to all

- Growing in faith through worship, study, and discernment
- Praising God through music, word, and service
- Welcoming all people into fellowship with God

Strategic Priorities:

- Increase our online presence.

The strategic priorities and survey suggestions guided our direction this year. Some plans have been implemented, others are in the works and will be implemented soon (and appear in next year's report). We ...

- Began Something's Brewing Bible Study, offered a Bible Study during Lent and one is planned for this fall;
- Old and new hymns are provided during our combined service;
- We're once again able to Pass the Peace during service;
- Our Heritage, Senior, Children's and Bell Choirs are again providing their wonderful music;
- Our Lutheran Men in Mission has regrouped and are meeting monthly;
- Our PAL volunteers are once again serving twice a month;

- A 40 Days of Prayer for Spiritual Growth was offered during Lent;
- Deacon Marsha Roscoe provided a small group workshop on Spirituality;
- Our weekly enews Happenings and Reminders continues and we've provided other emails in addition to the Evangel as necessary to keep communication open and timely;
- We have more volunteers serving on the altar guild, as Assisting Ministers and Readers, in grocery ministry, on a task force and/or working on projects;
- Committees continue to meet and, when applicable, are moving to project/short term commitment opportunities for all to serve; and
- Plans to begin communion visits to our homebound, coffee hour following church, Dinner Church, and a stewardship campaign are forthcoming.

As you continue reading, you'll see MANY areas of generosity and service happening at St. Paul's! I hope you can also see how our service and dedication align with our Purpose and Principles, our strategic priorities and our survey. We're moving forward, implementing as we are able, planning for more and seeking God's guidance. How is He guiding you to participate in service through Him? Director Of Music Ministries/Organist

The Music Ministry exists to serve and enhance the worship life of St Paul's Lutheran Church. The volunteers and staff of the Music Ministry work cooperatively to integrate diverse and well-performed music into the church's worship services, to help each member of the congregation to worship God more deeply.

The Adult Choir, which averaged 15 members, rehearses weekly and sings at two services a month, plus special services such as Christmas Eve, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The Adult choir sings on all the festival Sundays and provides a wide variety of music.

The Youth choir had 4 dedicated members this past year. They rehearsed weekly and joined the Adult Choir to sing 2 services a month and special services.

The Heritage Choir, which averaged between 6 and 10 members, would rehearse once a month on Saturday mornings and supply music for worship one Sunday a month.

There were a couple of Sundays where all the choirs joined together to supply an anthem for worship.

The process for selecting music for each choir is still the same each year.

 We look at the readings and images for the Sundays we have and get an idea of what music would be proper for each Sunday.

- We look for music to match the Service and look at the difficulty of the piece. We have an idea of the number we will have in each group, so we try to match the music to the ability of the group. Sometimes this changes once the choirs begin rehearsing.
- We spend a great amount of time going through the files, looking for music to use. We also look at new music from publishers. We try to use what we have in our files and try to limit the buying of new music.
- Since we are live streaming and recording our services, we now check to ensure the piece selected for a given day is covered under one of the licenses the church has for copyrighted music. We check the listing for each license and sometimes we will need to contact a publisher and ask for permission to record or live stream the music. If permission is not given, we start all over again to find a new piece of music for that service.
- Once the rehearsals begin, we try to get a calendar out so members
 of the various groups have an idea of the services they will be
 supplying the music. If we have a service where we might be short
 of singers or players, we look at the music and change it if we need
 to. This means going through the process again to find another
 piece.

The music staff supplied musical leadership for the worship services held at St. Paul's in the forms of piano or organ music, directing the Adult, Youth, Heritage, Bell and Children's Choirs.

I attended online webinars or events such as:

- Technology and the church can it replace in person
- New music for worship
- Music, Copyright and Livestreams
- Evaluating Music for Choirs

I am grateful to all the staff, the Council, Personnel Committee, and the Worship and Music committee for their continued support of the music ministry.

Thank you, Lori and Gretchen, for your support and dedication to the music program at St. Paul's. We have a wonderful music team and ministry at St. Paul's.

Special thanks to Kathy Bishop and Wendy O'Brien who are the music librarians for the Adult and Youth choirs.

Director Of Handbell Choir

Music written for smaller ensembles has enabled us to enhance our worship services with our current group.

Director Of Children's Music

This year I enjoyed creating a weekly lesson plan for the Rotation Sunday School children. I told a Bible story and incorporated a craft, video, or game that reinforced the story. I led music enrichment activities and taught songs which we shared with the congregation once as a month as a musical offering during the worship service, often accompanied with percussion instruments or ASL.

Along with directing these anthems sung by the children, I played the handbells in two additional anthems with the other Music Department staff members

For our Christmas Eve service I invited students of Music And Motion to participate (we had 3 accept) and all the children worked very hard on our anthem and 2 preludes. We incorporated handbells and xylophones into our vocal music for this special service. As a thank you I purchased chrismons (made by Wayne Butler) again this year for each participant. All proceeds went to a charity organization.

I served as the staff representative on the Education Committee and as a co-director, music leader, and storyteller of the summer's Vacation Bible School (held at St. Mark's) with 28 participants. To keep our costs low, I wrote the curricula as well.

It has been my great joy to serve as your Director of Children's Music and I look forward to continuing to grow and improve in this position and in my service to St. Paul's.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Christian Education/Youth

Committee members are: Lynne Thompson, chairperson; Lucille Farrington, Gretchen Walter, Tom Miller (Council Liaison), Linda Zellers, recorder. Committee met monthly via Zoom.

Committee organized Sunday School rotation classes for elementaryage children, supported the activities of SPYKids and SPY, and Vacation Bible School and choose Lenten and Advent Devotional materials.

Rotation Sunday School began September 12, 2021 for children in grades Kindergarten through 6, students participated in music, games, and other activities during the 9:30 Worship service. They were led by Gretchen Walter and assisted by Rebecca Shearer; meeting in the Gathering Space.

The committee included a children's message in the weekly Happenings and Reminders.

Vacation Bible School was held July 25-29, 2022, at St. Mark Lutheran Church. Gretchen Walter organized the program along with volunteers from St. Mark and St. Paul's. Twenty-eight attended.

Junior High (Confirmation) class was taught by Lucille Farrington. Kitty Angel also helped, and Pastor Burkhart met with students quarterly.

The "Something Brewing Bible Study" led by Pastor Burkhart resumed in February. The group concluded the study of Acts and then began a discussion of C. S. Lewis's "Mere Christianity". During Lent, Linda Zellers led a six week study of the Passion of Christ.

The Cradle Roll program has four participants. From Baptism to three years old, children are sent cards on their birthday and their baptismal anniversary.

Christmas cards were sent to teens and college age youth.

The theatre upgrade was completed. The committee thanks the Fred and Sylvia Marsh Bequest for funding the upgrade.

Our Youth and Family Ministry information follows as its own report.

Studying God's Word is one way we grow in faith and strengthen our relationship with God. In the Christian faith, one is never done. If you have ideas for a class or would like to lead a class, please contact a member of the committee.

Youth and Family Ministry

Youth and Family Ministry is a group for all St. Paul's youth (grades K-12) and their families. Deb and Bill Sowers lead the group activities with parent support. Our group meets on the third Sunday of each month for a time of food, fellowship, and devotions before (usually) splitting into the SPYKids group (youth grades K-6) and SPY group (youth grades 7-12).

One model for youth ministry is a balanced offering of SERVICE, LEARNING, WORSHIP, and FUN. Some of these aspects are interwoven in one gathering; at our monthly gathering, we have a time of games (fun) and worship (devotions and song). Here is a glimpse of some of our other activities:

SERVICE:

- Made cards for shut ins (both groups);
- Sent cards for soldiers (SPYKids);
- CROP Walk (SPYKids);
- Advent Night (SPYKids attended; SPY led activities);
- Went Christmas caroling to shut-ins in our area (SPYKids) and mailed cards to those we didn't see;
- Mission on the Mountain activities (SPY)--see description of activities below; and
- Helped once a month with Grocery Ministry (both groups).

LEARNING:

- Learned about Lent and made our own Lenten calendars (SPYKids);
- Retreat at Nawakwa (SPY)--completed the rest of the "boundless" studies; and
- Various service organizations within the ELCA (SPY–Mission on the Mountain).

WORSHIP:

- Devotions at all of our gatherings (SPYKids), and
- "Meeting God in the Ruins" study on our Mission Trip (SPY).

FUN:

- Games at our gatherings;
- Road Rally and Lock-In (SPY);
- Mini golf outing w/ice cream (!) (SPY); and
- Mission on the Mountain (SPY)--see more info below.

MISSION ON THE MOUNTAIN ACTIVITIES (SPY)

- Organized/packed 10 Clean Up buckets for Church World Service;
- Guided tour of Brethren Service Center in New Windsor and spent time putting together hygiene and school kits;
- Cleaned up the labyrinth at Mar-Lu-Ridge;
- Zoom session with Emma from Lutheran World Relief;
- Presentation on Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services; and
- Some fun (Inner Harbor, tubing on the Shenandoah, Shock Rock, and cave tour).

We look forward to another exciting year of ministry!

Faith In Action

<u>WELCOME BASKETS FOR NEW PARENTS</u>—This is an ongoing project. No baskets were delivered to new parents in the congregation. We did however decide to give the books we give out in the baskets to 2 great-grandchildren born to a member of the church.

<u>2021 SCHOOL KITS</u>—Due to the Covid Pandemic there was no Rally Day to make up the School Kits, so the committee and others from the church met and filled 61 school bags. They were delivered to New Windsor, MD to Lutheran World Relief on the same day. School supplies left over were taken to New Hope Ministries. In July and August, the Committee began its 2022 School Kit Drive. This year the Committee purchased 72 backpacks to fill with school supplies

<u>OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD</u>—There were 28 boxes for Operation Christmas Child filled by the congregation and taken to the Drop Off location at Hanover First Church of God in November 2021.

<u>CHRISTMAS BLESSINGS</u>—This year again we decided to fulfill the request received from New Hope Ministries in Hanover for unwrapped Christmas presents. Their guests are then able to shop for their whole family. We were able to deliver 82 pounds of gifts to New Hope ministries in December 2021 for this purpose.

<u>CARDS FOR HOMEBOUND</u>—Members of the church were asked to sign up for one homebound member and to make a year's commitment to send appropriate cards to that particular shut-in through 2022. The sign-up sheet was filled in and cards are being sent.

<u>COLLECTION OF CANNED FRUITS AND VEGETABLES</u>—The Committee collected cans of fruits and vegetables for the Saturday Morning Food Distribution during January. The cans were taken downstairs and placed on the stage at the end of the month.

<u>SOUPER BOWL PROJECT</u>—In February, the committee held the Souper Bowl project. The cans of soup collected were taken down to the Saturday Morning Food Distribution and placed on the stage at the end of the month.

<u>FABRIC KITS</u>—During Lent the Committee collected fabric and thread to make up Fabric Kits for Lutheran World Relief. Twenty Fabric Kits were delivered to Lutheran World Relief in New Windsor.

Our committee has tried to continue providing opportunities for St. Paul's members to share our generosity with those less fortunate than ourselves. We invite anyone who is interested in this kind of outreach to join our committee. We are also looking for new ideas and new ways to grow our generosity in helping others.

Stewardship

The Stewardshp committee has reformed and began with reviewing available stewardship campaigns. Members are participating in 'Building a Culture of Generosity' which will be implemented at St. Paul's this fall.

Worship and Music

The Worship and Music Committee, as is with all our church, is still operating within the boundaries of the Covid pandemic. We have been active in our church life and have also found some new members to join us in our endeavors.

Since last fall we have been worshipping together at one 9:30AM service inside our Sanctuary. As always, wearing a mask is a personal choice. We have allowed congregants to sit where they like, but highly recommend that everyone sanitize their hands before receiving the communion elements. At the beginning of 2022, we removed the spacing tape on the floor and returned the Bibles and hymnals to the pews. We also had a new blue dossal made for the Advent season. This past year we also returned to celebrating Christmas Eve live at 2 services, one in the afternoon and another in the evening. Easter and Pentecost also found us all gathered in our Sanctuary.

At the beginning of summer, we once again returned to having an 8:00AM service on the lawn, as well as keeping our 9:30AM service inside. After Labor Day we will once again return to one 9:30AM service inside. We know that some would like more variety in choosing times to worship, but our whole committee feels very strongly that it is much better for us all to be worshipping as a complete community, rather than dividing our congregation into 2 or 3 smaller entities. For the summer months, a 5PM Saturday church service has been added, once as dinner church and once just as worship. Whether these 2 services continue will be determined later in the fall.

Our biggest challenge this year was the upcoming painting and restoration of the Sanctuary. We have been very fortunate this year to have a wonderful group of volunteers that have helped us remove Bibles, hymnals, stands, paraments, candles, and all other necessities for worship. Then we set-up a temporary worship space in Fellowship Hall. We still need volunteers as ushers, readers, assisting ministers, etc., but we seem to have a good core of people who have really helped with our worship services, especially since Pastor Burkhart has been on sabbatical. A big thanks to the committee and those who help at each and every service at St. Paul's – without all of you, worship as we know it would not be able to continue!
