How I personally feel about this celebration of the birth of my Son Jesus can probably be most easily understood by those of you who have been blessed with children of your own. First, I really don't care what you call the day, but if you want to know how I think it best to celebrate his birth, I say just try to remember my Great Commandment and get along with one another.



Having said that, let Me add this, stop worrying about those silly people who need to say "holiday tree," instead of Christmas tree. Whether they like it or not, I am the one who made all the trees, and you can remember Me if you like every time you see any anyone of them. Decorate a grapevine if you want to; it would be just as good. In fact I actually spoke of that once in a teaching; explaining our relationship and what your job is. If you have forgotten that one, it's OK to look it up again. It's in the Gospel of John Chapter 15, verses 1 - 8.

If you would like to give Me a gift to celebrate Christmas, here is my wish list. Choose one, or as many as you like.

- 1. Instead of writing protest letters objecting to the way Jesus' birthday is being erased from the public eye, why not write some letters of love and hope to the soldiers who are away from home and family? They are terribly afraid and very lonely at this time of year. I know because they tell Me all the time.
- 2. Visit someone in a nursing home. You don't even have to know them personally. They just need to know that someone cares.
- 3. Instead of complaining about the wording in the president's Christmas card this year, why don't you write and tell him, (and your senators and congressmen, and all government officials,) that you'll be praying for them and their families this year. Then do it.
- 4. Instead of giving your children a lot of gifts you can't afford and they don't really need, why not commit to spending more time with them. Tell them the story of Jesus' birth, and why he came to live with you down there. Hold them in your arms and remind them that you and I both love them.

- 9. Finally if you want to make a 'statement gift' about your belief in Jesus and your faith in Me, try behaving like a Christian all the time, and everywhere. Don't try do things in secret that you wouldn't do in My presence. And by the way, you can't anyway, 'cause I really do see everything you do. Try to just show everyone, by the things you do and say, that you are really one of mine.
