Conversations about St. Paul's culture, characteristics and ministries continue. Values of "loving" and "serving" have anchored questions like "What do we look/sound/act like when we are living into our value of "love"? What does a congregation that "serves" look/sound/act like? How do our priorities in everything we do both lean into and reflect out of those values of "love" and "serve"?

Do you agree that "love" and "service" are some of St. Paul's core values?

Everything flows outward and inward to St. Paul's from your collective answer to that question. The way leadership is structured and acts, the way the congregation is administrated, the role and focus of the pastor, the choices for what types of investments in ministry and programs...it all flows from who YOU, together, say you are and how you believe God has gifted, equipped and called you to be those very things right now.

In the Ecclesiastes text (or, as some of you may know it, The Byrds song), the cycles of life are laid out in an honest, clear-eyed poem. The list is of very real human actions and emotions that, on the face of it, seem to be dichotomous - two opposing forces. But the truth is, there is a rhythm to a full and healthy life. It holds the tension between starting and stopping, good and bad, engaged and quiet. It is the complexity of humanity in all its parts. Knowing *when* to pull on that tension, *when* to act from love, *what* to hate, *when* to keep quiet and *when* to speak ... those are the questions.

Jesus provides the answers. He tells and shows us over and over that a life lived in God is one where we know best how to live in communion with God and each other. Love justice, mercy and kindness. Hate the forces of evil that pull you away from each other. Listen with mouth shut and heart open to the person in front of you, especially if they have wronged you or you have wronged them. Speak up when you see people acting from their own ambitions, their own views without investing in sharing them with the whole community and checking that we're on the path to the same purposes.

Over the course of this summer, the work of the Spirit that revealed itself in so many ways will be complied and reviewed by the Congregation Council. We'll also be working on some important matters such as policy and procedure reviews, constitutional compliance reviews, staff policies and performance reviews, and an update of the congregational records. By late summer or the very earliest of fall, the Congregation Council will be in the position of setting a Call Committee.

From there, the process shifts to the guidance of the Synod's mobility staff, working with the Call Committee and Congregation Council. I will still be your pastor through this process. As an intentional interim, I do not work directly with the Call Committee on the creation of the Ministry Site Profile. I am available to them only to help define terms or answer questions that help explain what a question is asking. The Call Committee sets the pace of the work you as a congregation will entrust to them...the prayerful discernment and guidance towards a faith relationship between you as a congregation and a called pastor.

No one can predict how long the call process extends, with variables such as how often the Call Committee meets, how quickly they finalize a Ministry Site Profile that represents the congregation, and how many candidates are available that match the characteristics of the pastor that will best match your ministries and congregational characteristics.

To everything there is a season...and the timing has, does, and will always belong to God. Your faithfulness to the journey has been such a wonder and joy to behold. Patience and impatience pull against each other. Frustration and curiosity battle it out. The anxiety of unsettledness arm wrestles with the freedom to heal and take a breath. God's working in every bit of it, calling it all holy.

God's faithfulness to you as a strong community of Christ has never wavered. God has been and will continue to be the fiercest provider and encourager. May the summer bring refreshment and rejuvenation to you as the journey continues and the next path of the journey grows ever more into clearer view.

The U.S. and the Christian flags were taken out of the sanctuary when we stripped the altar on Good Friday. During our studies of Lutheranism, we found that Luther felt that a national flag should not be part of Lutheran worship since we gather as a part of the whole Christian church, not as members of a particular nation. After the renovation of our church sanctuary, a member





The St. Paul's Book Club will meet on **Wednesday, June 26, 2024** at 12:30 in the Lounge. We will be discussing <u>Lady</u> <u>Tan's Circle of Women</u> by Lisa See. Lisa See was inspired by the true story of a woman physician from 15th century China. Tan Yunxian --born into an elite family, yet haunted by death, separation, and loneliness--is being raised by her grandparents to be of use. Her grandmother is one of only a



handful of female doctors in China and she teaches Yunxian the pillars of Chinese medicine, the Four Examinations-- looking, listening, touching, and asking--something a man can never do with a female patient. But when Yunxian is sent into an arranged marriage, her mother-in-law forbids her from helping the women and girls in the household. How does Yunxian deal with these issues that bother her. The Oprah Magazine, O, says "Lisa See's mesmerizing new historical novel...celebrates women's strengths--and the strength of their friendships." Join us for discussion and fellowship. Grocery Ministry Update



Our Leadership Team recently met with Shawn Davenport from the York County Food Bank for our annual inspection. We "passed" with flying colors! Did you know that our distribution is the 2nd largest in Hanover? It is a ministry that is well appreciated. We are always considering ways to improve what it is that we do. What do we need and how can you help?

Right now, we could use a few more volunteers. Now would be a great time to come and see what it is that we do! Here are some of our volunteer needs:

+greeters - welcome visitors and do a simple "check in" with each visitor

+packers - place 1 - 3 items in bags that travel by cart around the distribution area...you

can even be seated to do this job!

+distributors - transfer 1 or 2 bags to each visitor's car; most bags weigh between 5-10

pounds at the most

+"heavy lifters" - each Friday and about an additional once a month we have a delivery

from either New Hope or the York County Food Bank; these items need to be moved to appropriate storage; boxes can weigh up to 30 pounds

So as you can see, there are many different jobs that are part of this ministry and MOST jobs can be completed by nearly anyone! Why not check us out this coming Friday (3:30pm - 5:00pm) or Saturday (9:00am - 11:00am)?

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 2024 GATHERING OF CHURCH COUNCIL



Mission: To fulfill the command given in Matthew 25:35 - **COUNCIL** "for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."

- Living our purpose and principles were seen by council as the Congregation Conversations with Pastor Katrina, change in attitude toward livestreaming and Children's Choir signing the Lord's Prayer.
- Pastor Holland and council spent time discussing the core values gathered from the Congregational Conversations. Those core values are hospitality, love of neighbor, caring, generosity, service and outreach. The group gathered for the Conversations then chose two which were love of neighbor and service. SUMMER SCHEDULE FOR RENOVATION PROJECTS At long last, some projects that have been bogged down

by winter weather and the challenge of obtaining satisfactory bids, are on the move. Over the summer months, the following work will enhance the appearance and safety of our building.

• The **two canopies** at the parking lot will be made maintenance free, signage will be added identifying

us as St. Paul's and additional lighting will be installed.

- Forty-two ground level windows will be replaced with white vinyl framing, along with tempered and privacy glass as appropriate.
- Roof work that was postponed over the winter will be completed.
- **Curbing repairs** are already finished.
- **The parking lot light** that was damaged will be replaced with a concrete base, a new pole and connections and LED lights.

Projects are financed through the Raubenstine Bequest, anonymous sponsorships, and donations to the Property and Capital Campaign funds. We are blessed to receive this financial support from our members; it serves to keep our campus welcoming and safe for Worship and Christian Service.
