Sometimes doing "the right thing" can work against your own self-interest." "The great golf pro Tim Kite warned his playing partner, Grant Waite, that Waite was about to commit a rules infraction that would cost him two strokes. Waite corrected his behavior, avoided the two-stroke penalty, and went on to win the tournament, eking out a one-stroke victory, over Tom Kite. Not only did Kite lose the victory trophy, but he also lost \$94,000 in prize money. But every day, Tom Kite reaps the return from his ethical act through the unwavering respect of his colleagues, and his own satisfaction with having done the right thing.

Nearly every day most of us are confronted with a situation in which we need to decide what is the right thing to do. These are not always easy decisions, and sometimes the most honest answer could result in heartache for another. One simple example is the appropriate answer to a spouse's question, "Do I look fat?" Answering them with something like, "compared to what," is probably not very wise. So then, abrupt honesty may not always be the best policy.

Jesus shares with His listeners at the Sermon on the Mount these words: "*Let your word be 'Yes, Yes' or 'No, No'; anything more than this comes from the evil one.*" Jesus cautions us that getting into the gray areas of gentle dishonesty can and will lead to trouble later on. Our hearts know this, but we rationalize, seeking to cause the least amount of pain or trouble.

Jim Carrey's movie "Liar, Liar" dramatized the humorous(?) effects of a first-rate liar who suddenly could not tell a lie. His new-found brutal honesty nearly gets him killed. Such is the situation we find ourselves in under the rules of this world.

I think that these matters require the very best of us in our purposeful "love your neighbor as yourself" mode. Following the commandment to love, what would Jesus do with a boss's order to substitute inferior parts? Would Jesus tell the CEO that her speech was wonderful (when it was not) in order to feather his nest? Would Jesus reply to Mary, "compared to what?" What do you think Jesus would suggest we do?

For times like these, we need to seek God's wisdom. Using the best of our hearts and minds as gifts from a loving creator, the best answers will grow out of our love for others and our desire to do the right thing.

Greetings, Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

We find ourselves at a unique point in the calendar year. May positions the Church between two major Christian festivals: Easter and Pentecost. Neither festival is simply an individual holiday or celebration. Both are seasons of the church year, lasting multiple weeks. These seasons are also meant to shape how we live as Christians in the world.

For most of this month we continue to celebrate the Easter Miracle of the Risen Christ. On the surface level, we all understand that
*for our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again in accordance with the scriptures.*

We know that His sacrifice erases our sin and opens the way to eternal life. That is only the beginning of what Easter means. Just as Jesus opened the minds and hearts of the disciples on the Road to Emmaus, so He seeks to open our minds and hearts to the truth of the Resurrection. Our freedom from sin and death is not an individual gift to be hoarded, rather it is a tool that equips us as servants of God in the world. Easter removes our fear of sin and death so that we can boldly **praise God and love generously** for the sake of the world.

Pentecost arrives at the end of May this year. We all know that Pentecost is considered the “birth” of the Church on earth when the Holy Spirit descended upon believers. This is only the beginning of the story. Just like Easter, Pentecost equips us for service to God through the gift of the Holy Spirit. If Easter removes the fear of sin and death, then Pentecost replaces those fears with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23). Consider them the spiritual birthday presents of Pentecost to the Church. These Fruits of the Spirit fill our spiritual toolbox with everything we need to be active participants in God’s mission. Our newly adopted Purpose Statement, **“We are called through Christ to praise God and love generously,”** reminds us that we are partners with God in spreading the Gospel.

Knowing where we are uniquely positioned on the Church calendar, let us also consider how we are uniquely positioned in history for God’s service. Many people lament the “decline” of the Church in the last fifty years and pity the loss of the Church’s prominence in society. May I suggest that rather than a call for lamentation, this is a call to action. We have seen how the pandemic has been a medium for increased service to our community here at St. Paul’s. We have adapted ministries and begun new ones. In many ways we are more actively engaged in God’s work than ever before. While it may have been difficult to attend church during the past year, we have made great strides in BEING the Church, in BEING God’s hands and feet at work in Hanover. I ask you to consider our current situation as a call to **BOLDY STEP UP AND STEP OUT** as an active participant in God’s service. As we approach Pentecost, still filled with Easter joy, consider how the Holy Spirit is calling YOU to BE the Church.

EPHESIANS

William Barclay called Ephesians “The Queen of the Epistles.” It is a breathtaking treaty from Paul elaborating the reconciling work of God in Christ Jesus, i.e., making all human beings into one people as “the Body of Christ,” conquering the hostile cosmic powers of sin and death, the creation of a new humanity, and the creation of a new society founded and grounded in God. We approach the letter to the Ephesians “the greatest” and “most relevant of Paul’s works” properly with a sense of awe and wonder.

In Ephesians, Paul elaborates on two fundamental Christian themes. The first theme (chaps. 1-3) regards faithful doctrine regarding the new life and new society in Christ which God has brought into being by the death and resurrection of His Son. The second theme (chaps. 4-6) teaches the new standards for life and relationships expected of Christian believers. This second theme takes us from theory to practice; from “This is the way things are now,” to “therefore, we are to honor God by living like this.”

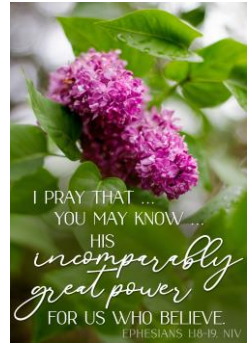
Read Chapter 1, verses 15 -23

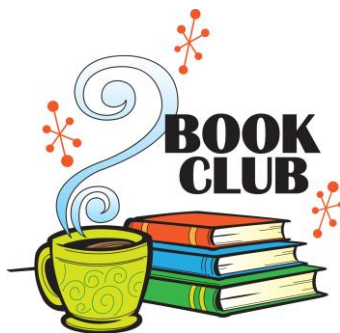

- +87 Percentage of those individuals who receive NO OTHER supplemental food from agencies besides St. Paul’s
- +100 Number of Easter Activity Bags distributed by the Evangelism Committee
- +161 In a recent survey, the number of individuals receiving food
- +240 Number of Thanksgiving, then Christmas, then Easter meals distributed
- +2,329 Number of boxes from Central Penn Food Bank distributed since August
- +2,500 Number of miles our “driver” has driven to pick up items since August
- +100,000+ .. Number of POUNDS of food distributed since August

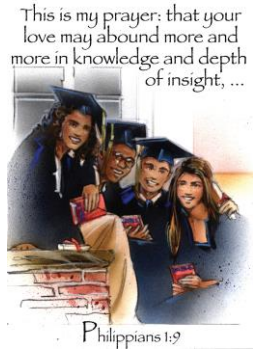
- 1) Our first PPP (Payroll Protection Program) loan of \$41,800 has been completely forgiven

- 8) Diane Klunk and Michele Witman have joined the Audit Committee.

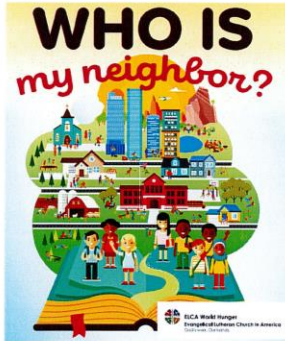

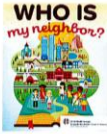
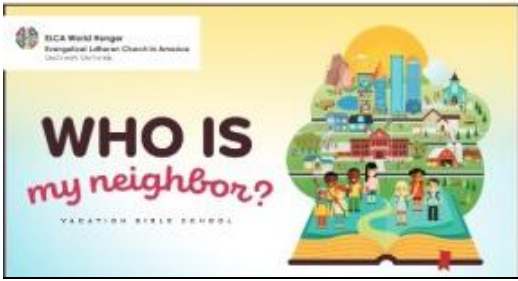
