What a delight it continues to be to watch the Spirit continue to bloom and create here! About 30 - 35 folks consistently join the congregation conversations, and I can't help but notice that deep conversations are giving voice to deep hope and direction. Here's an update:

The conversations have been centering around the questions that are asked in the document "Ministry Site Profile (MSP)." This is the document - the congregation's faith and ministry resume, if you will - that will be submitted to the Synod and shared with perspective pastors, who will then determine whether they wish to interview with the congregation. The MSP spends most of its space asking about YOU as a CONGREGATION. What is your vision for mission (that's the very first question on the form!). Where do you spend your energy in ministry? What kind of culture of church are you - high church with all the bells and whistles? dancing in the aisles? somewhere in-between?

You see, the real journey we're taking is one of self-discovery as a faith community. When you know yourselves, when you can speak as a group about who you are, what your shared vision is, where you want to grow together...then you know the kind of skills and focus a particularly trained and ordained minister can bring to help that vision and mission continue to come alive.

I'm becoming more and more appreciative of those rare moments in our lives where we actually get to pause, even briefly, and take stock, put to words what we clearly know about ourselves, rethink and reconsider what we thought we knew, pay attention to what's been earned and learned since the last time life handed us this moment, and consider how we've been moving through life assuming others knew these things about us. It's powerful to experience the clarifying revelation that assumptions became attitudes, and those attitudes became actions, and the Spirit has given a moment of time to consider all these things. And thanks be to God, as a faith community, to be encouragers, comforters and journeypersons together to do it!

A stable pastorate can only blossom if we're serving to make a shared vision come alive because that's what we believe Jesus is calling us to embody in this time, in this place, with these gifts. The important word - just after Jesus - in that sentence is SHARED. Congregations who don't give each other the space and respect of listening to one another and seeking out some agreed-upon values and direction are going to create a space where one person (the pastor) is going to be pulled apart by dozens of competing visions and directions.

The way to create healthy and holy relationships for yourselves is to catch a common vision. Some of the work that's been done in these congregation conversations are starting to reveal core values believed to be shared throughout the congregation. They are: *service, loving neighbor, caring, hospitality, outreach, generosity.* 

This isn't an exhaustive list, but what a start! Can you imagine the kinds of opportunities and possibilities that take root and flourish in a community that lives these values? Where do you already see these values living out loud at St. Paul's? How are you embodying these values now? Where are places that are challenging the ability to embody or grow these values? What would YOU add to this list?

Three more conversations happen before we enter into summer in earnest. They are: May 5, May 19 and June 2. As always, I pray the Spirit is working in and on you, and that what you have to offer to the conversation finds you gathered around these holy tables for holy steps towards your next new relationship.


of Hanover. Thank you for thinking of others in this local project provided by the Hanover Area Council of Churches. You are a blessing to our community.





#### HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE APRIL 2024 GATHERING OF CHURCH COUNCIL

#### Mission: To fulfill the command given in Matthew 25:35

"for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."

- Living our purpose and principles were seen by council as 10,000 social media interactions in past ninety days and services of Holy Week.
- Council approved \$13,000.00 from Adventures in Ministry Fund to meet budgeted expenses of the National Youth Gathering. Any additional monies from fundraisers will be used as seed money for the 2027 Youth Gathering.
- An anonymous gift of \$42,000.00 to replace windows was accepted by council.
- Council approved the motion from Worship and Music to purchase a Black Magic ATEM Mini Pro for \$300.00 and H2R Graphics Pro software for \$80.00. These items are used to livestream. Council amended the motion to include funding from the Adventures in Ministry Fund.
- St. Paul's delegates to the 2024 Lower Susquehanna Synod Assembly are Pastor Holland, Russ Kaltreider and Cindy Schmidt.
- The Renovation Taskforce shared with council that the cost to complete the canopy project is \$19,600.00 of which \$15,900.00 was approved by the congregation on March 26, 2023. The taskforce presented the quote to replace forty-two ground level windows at cost of \$45,825.00 of which an anonymous donor gave \$42,000.00. Council approved a total of \$8,000.00 from the Raubenstine Fund to complete both projects.
- A congregational meeting will be held on May 5, 2024, following the 9:30 AM service to approve the contract to replace the windows at cost of \$45,825.00.
- Council approved compensating Lori Rebling for covering services and rehearsals while Steven Ruppright was on medical leave.
- Council approved the motion from the Finance Committee to close the Pastor's Discretionary checking account and to deposit the funds into the Operating Account where tracking will be through a separate line item under Pastoral Expense.
- Council encourages members to participate in the Congregation Conversations with Pastor Katrina. These conversations will help us prepare to enter into the call process.
- Next council meeting is May 8, 2024, at 7:00 PM.
