# Happy-ish Independence Day

In this year, we celebrate the 249th anniversary of American Independence. This year, more than any other I can remember, I find myself poring over these words with a new lens. The United States of America is closer to being ruled by a King than we have been at any other point in our history during the past 249 years. Even when our country was torn literally in two by slavery, the confederate states when creating their new government kept many of our founding principles and separation of powers. After Franklin D. Roosevelt broke the two presidential term precedent sent by George Washington, we passed the 22nd amendment to make that precedent law. All of this to say, since the inception of our nation Americans have been skeptical of power concentrated in the executive, in one man. Many of our countrymen are forgetting lessons long learned - war with Iran, tariffs, other explicitly congressional powers being branded by one man without the consent of Congress. As of this writing, there are still US military troops on the streets of LA over the protestations of the Governor of California. US citizens have been deported. Non-citizens in this country, many legally, were trafficked to a death camp in El Salvador. Masked law enforcement agents without identification arresting persons including US citizens without warrants. Elected Democratic officials handcuffed, assaulted and arrested for small displays of defiance. We can't allow these acts to become lost in the never-ending tsunami of new transgressions. These government overreaches are not normal, and we need to act like it. If you are like me, you probably also feel like you need some inspiration in a dark era. This time reading through the Declaration, it doesn't feel like ancient history, it feels like a pertinent reminder that we need to stay vigilant and active in this Republic, if we are to keep it.

### The Declaration of Independence (abridged)

#### In Congress, July 4, 1776

The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America, When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.--That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, --That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to affect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. [...] To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

[...]He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

**He has obstructed the Administration of Justice**, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers.

He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.

For Quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:

For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:

[...]We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

## America Still Doesn't Want a King-

We are far from the only ones who have noticed our budding authoritarianism. Many of us made it out to the *No Kings Rallies* on June 14th, and it was a fantastic display of the democratic spirit that still embodies the American ethos. **4-6 million** Americans joined *No Kings* demonstrations around the country; thank you to everyone who was able to attend and make it **one of the largest protests in the history of the United States.** We connected with so many other Americans who are ready to stand up and speak out. This is how we work together to get back to building the America we want to see. By now, I expect many of you have heard the 3.5% rule. There is an observation from Harvard authoritarianism researcher Erica **Chenoweth that non-violent protests involving 3.5% of the population have never failed to enact change**. On June 14th we were around halfway to the 11 million people we need to bring about that change. Indivisible, 50501 many other organizations that brought on *No Kings Rallies* are keeping their eyes on that target. Honoring the memory of

## **May Showers and Solar Power**

When we arrived for our official and outdoor tour of the DTE Lapeer Facility on May 21, we were told by Jeffrey Haines, Site Manager, that we were the first group of visitors not to enjoy clear sunny skies for our visit. As it turns out, we were the lucky ones. An overcast and rainy day was perfect for learning about and dispelling some of the major misconceptions surrounding solar power generation. The weather did absolutely nothing to dampen the spirits of the DTE team, who were excited to share the experience and knowledge.

As several local townships and municipalities work to define rules for converting traditional farms to solar operations, public opposition has been vocal - and sometimes misinformed. A common objection is that harvesting solar energy in climates like Michigan's would be inefficient or unfeasible. It is simply not so according to our guides and the humming equipment all around us. Though once better-suited to hot, sunny and dry regions, solar capacity has improved to be viable even in areas with limited or inconsistent sunlight. There we stood without a trace of the sun in the sky, listening to the whir of power-producing solar equipment.

DTE currently relies on solar energy mainly as a "spot" energy source, and it comprises a relatively small percentage of total capacity. However, the addition of this alternative energy source is already creating more reliable service by boosting capacity during periods of high consumer demand. As the technology improves, DTE anticipates that a significant portion of total production will come from solar. As solar farms become more prevalent, one concern is the environmental impact and disruption to neighboring communities.

The machinery itself was shockingly quiet - comparable to the noise of a large household generator. We were able to converse and ask questions of the team while standing only a few feet away from the loudest part of the array. We learned that the decibel levels are closely monitored and that setback requirements have been successful in blending with ambient noise levels where facilities are near residential areas. To demonstrate this, tour guides took us on a short ride across the facility where we were able to observe the natural barriers and native plants that were installed to provide additional protection from noise and preserve the character of the neighborhood. Along the way we saw deer and other wildlife apparently enjoying the sanctuary of the site.

Jeffrey and his team assured us that almost all of the concern regarding solar production stems directly from misinformation. Other than the paneling, the facility looks any most other power stations one might visit. The solar panels are a silicate composite, and do not release any chemicals or byproducts into the ground or air. Damaged panels are recycled and replaced. Solar paneling is situated amid indigenous plants, creating a natural look and feel and reducing the need for grounds keeping and maintenance.

Finally, we got to perhaps the biggest question of all. What happens if land - especially farmland - is converted for solar harvesting and the owner of the property want to convert back to an active farm? Again, the response was encouraging. Land used for solar farming can be arable again within only 12-months of ceasing operations, usually in time for the next growing season. This stipulation is apparently part of DTE lease contracts with local land owners. Recently developments suggest that solar vs. crop farming may not be an "either / or" proposition. Researchers are exploring the viability of mixed use farms where crops are integrated with solar energy generating equipment.

Similarly, the United States is not forced to select a single source of energy as we plan our future. Everincreasing demand will require improvements to efficiency or threaten national energy independence goals. The most exciting thing about solar is that we have only scratched the surface of its potential. Already, researchers have developed panels that capture reflected light from ground sources, including snow. The panels being installed today are exponentially more efficient than those of just a few years ago.

As we thanked our hosts for the information and invitation, it seemed clear even on a cloudy day that solar power can be an important resource for the people of Lapeer. The Lapeer Solar Facility site tour showed one possible path forward, and how corporations like DTE are implementing emerging technologies.
