Foreign Policy in Trump 2.0- Trump First, America Alone. Where Do We Go From Here? Part 1

In 2025, we witnessed a radically new approach to the world in Trump 2.0. A central theme of the entire administration is corruption, which we will do a deeper dive on in a later issue. For today, we will focus on the profound nature of the shift and what that may mean moving forward. Disclaimer, I am not a foreign policy expert. I mean to reflect on how we talk about foreign policy to other citizens, and how we need to adapt when

Democrats hold positions of power again. This is the first of a much larger series. For this issue, we'll take a look at China policy, and save the Russia Ukraine War, and the new American pastime of taking out fishing boats with cruise missiles for next time.

First China: Trump ran on being tough on China. It has also been a common refrain of right wing commentators that the Russia-Ukraine conflict is a distraction, and China should be our focus. With that, I find the weakness of the administration dealing with China somewhat surprising. The United States has been competing with China economically over business practices and intellectual property, over influence in Asia and Africa, and technology such as the race for AI, and independence of Taiwan. Trump has failed on all fronts in the last 9 months.

Nationally a dominant political talking point by both parties has been the decline of manufacturing in the US, and the loss to China and others overseas. It was a point of pride in the Biden administration that manufacturing jobs had increased- a trend that has reversed in 2025. Critical new sources of manufacturing jobs were to be found in both electric battery production and renewable energy. Advancing battery development is the future of the automotive industry around the world, and it is a race the US has been losing to Chinese manufacturers. Despite a trade war in the world to reshore manufacturing, as soon as Republicans held control of Congress, they passed the Big Beautiful Bill- stripping all of the subsidies and initiatives into battery plants and other renewables. This is already stalling production of new facilities and jobs, and it has all but guaranteed China will have a monopoly on electric vehicle batteries and it could allow immense control over the world automotive market moving forward, which is extremely worrying here in Michigan.

I truly hate to take you back to this place, but remember DOGE and the dismantling of USAID? Sorry we're going to quickly talk about it one more time. A significant amount of the news coverage focused on the wasted food, wasted medicine, and general chaos; all very important moral catastrophes. What got less coverage was that the US has been in a duel for influence with China in developing regions and their "Belt and Road" initiative. By destroying USAID, we have left these regions with China as their only alternative for support, a decision I suspect we will come to regret in the future.

Soon after coming into office, Trump reversed the Biden ban on the sale of AI chips to China. There are several reasons why this is important. I don't want to get too technical, because well, I don't know enough about computer chips, but the key reason we need to care is these chips are an essential component to developing artificial intelligence learning modules. Right now, the most advanced chip technology is with American companies like Nvidia, and the development of AI is a massive national security threat. The only thing worse than owning AI, is someone being able to deploy it better than us. Second, the administration takes 15% of the profit on export of chips- an export tax, which is blatantly unconstitutional (we keep using that word, does it mean what we think it means?). The message is clear that this administration will sacrifice American interests as long as there is a payoff, which is a new feature, not a bug, of this corrupt administration.

I hope you didn't think I would forget about the tariffs. In the first Trump term, we witnessed a catastrophic failure of tariff policy with China resulting in a complete boycott against American soybean farmers, leading them to financial ruin. Oh wait, that's BOTH Trump terms. On September 25th, Republican Senate Majority leader John Thune announced there will likely be another farmer bailout due to the collapse of the Chinese market. So, no lessons learned. A key difference this time is Trump also declared tariff war against the rest of the world, which has started trading without us. Reversing course will be much harder this time.

On September 29th- despite the semiconductor producer TSM building new manufacturing thanks to the Chips Act, the Trump administration threatened to withhold support from Taiwan unless they moved >50% of their production to the US. Pause a moment, and reflect on the insanity of that. An impossible ultimatum to a key US ally, holding protection against China for a ransom. Sickening! If only he could show that level of grit towards an actual rival.

November Fourth is Election Day in Lapeer – Who is running for Mayor?

According to the Lapeer County Press (7/25/25) and the LCDP meeting here are the three candidates:

- A. Bryan Cloutier is Director of the Oxford Public Library and President of the Friends of the deAngeli library. He also serves on the Lapeer Zoning Board of Appeals. He chose to run for mayor because he believes his professional background can be an asset to serve the City of Lapeer. "I am interested in working on planning and zoning issues, strategic planning for economic development, addressing our aging infrastructure and fiscal sustainability", said Cloutier. In addition to being director and CEO of the Oxford Public Library, he is president of the Rotary Club of Oxford, sits on the Michigan Library Association's Legislative and Advocacy Committee and on the Board of Directors at the Four County Community Foundation. He has also served as Village of Oxford Planning Commission Chair, DDA Design Committee Chair and was elected to the Village Council. He lives in the City of Lapeer.
- B. Mindy Schwab is the owner of Professional Alcohol and Substance Screening in downtown Lapeer and is a member of Lapeer Main Street Downtown Development Authority Board. She was raised to give back to her community and now has a desire to serve the City of Lapeer. "I own a business, I own a building downtown and I live in the city I love. I believe if you're part of a community, you should be involved to get things done for the people and make things better," said Schwab. She wants to build relationships and trust, look at the issue of industry in the city and work on prioritizing critical needs for the city.
- C. Jeremy Hing is a software engineer by profession, but his life's work has always centered on serving people and building bridges. For eight years, he and his wife dedicated themselves to mission work across Latin America, improving lives through education, community development, construction projects, and disaster relief. He and his wife have co-founded a nonprofit; supporting survivors of

human trafficking – through mentoring, counseling and intake services. Hing is committed to "restoring trust in local government, ensuring it honors the promises it makes, and putting the needs of Lapeer's citizens first." He hopes to address housing issues, mental health issues, preserving Lapeer's heritage. He lives in the city of Lapeer.

Thank you to the candidates for attending the LCDP General Meeting and discussing their views on major issues facing the City of Lapeer.
