

Holy Cross member, the Honorable Judge Kim Berkeley Clark, has been recognized for her work and received the highest honor judge by the National Center for State Courts(NCSC) - the for Judicial Excellence. Judge Clark has earned a

national reputation for transforming the way children and families who enter the court system are treated, by creating a "trauma-informed" courthouse.

"The National Center is honored to present the Rehnquist Award to a state court judge who demonstrates the power of leading by example. Judge Clark is a leader who is committed to helping families," said, NCSC President Mary C. McQueen. "Her work has dramatically improved the lives not only of those who have entered her courtroom but of thousands of other families."

FROM THE PRIEST-IN-CHARGE

Blessings to the Church of the Holy Cross Family!

As I indicated during the annual meeting in February, my actual start date was December 1, 2018, but I did a lot of preparation, worship service planning, meetings with parishioners and community members, as well as visits with sick and shut-in, during the month of November.

My main message: "New Hope for Holy Cross: A Community Outreach Initiative" has been the focus for 2018. The aim is to revitalize the church while directly speaking to the needs of the community through various programs but also at the same time, ensuring that the spiritual needs of Holy Cross members are also met. It was suggested that Rev. Johnson meet with small groups of Holy Cross members/stakeholders for the purpose of getting to know him better, to learn more about his ministry, and to discuss issues that normally would not be conducive in a larger environment.

I have held "Meet and Greets" this year, meeting with members of The Rector"s Guild, Raise the Roof, the Dorcas Society, the Youth, and a few other stakeholders who attended these small gatherings. I will be meeting the Episcopal Church Women (ECW) and the Men of Holy Cross this fall. It is my hope to expand these greetings to more church members in the coming months. If you know of anyone interested in attending one of these gatherings, or if you have ideas for a future meet & greet, please contact the church office. I thank Martha Shelby and Glenda Mayo for coordinating these efforts.

I stated in the Annual meeting, "I am honored and blessed to serve Holy Cross. I will continue to extend God's love and grace to the Holy Cross membership and the surrounding community."

BENEATH THE CROSS Parish Life

- ✤ Holy Cross' Lay Eucharist ministry was reconstituted. Seven faithful church members are assisting Rev. Johnson to provide communion to our sick and shut-in at least twice per month. To date we have served more than 48 calls.
- The importance of Sunday school and Christian education has been reestablished. Sunday School breakfast is being provided through a grant from Thrivent Financial. Each Sunday, youth receive valuable Christian education along with a meal.
- Calling Post has been used to contact members for emergencies or a need for rapid response. (Please be sure that your phone number is correct with the church. The call will typically show up as coming from Holy Cross or from a number in Oklahoma.
 - In the area of pastoral care and support, Rev. Johnson has provided over 42 communion calls; made over 10 hospital visits; have given more than five grief & bereavement consultations; presided over four funerals; conducted first communion, youth confirmation and adult discovery confirmation classes.
- ✤ As an active reservist, Rev. Johnson also provides Chaplain care and support at the Military Base: 911th Wing. He leads two Bible study classes twice per month.
- The Holy Cross website is still under development. Social media has been set up and the design is complete.
 Facebook and Twitter accounts are both set up. A PayPal account has been established.




ACT YOUR BEST INAUGURAL YEAR SUMMER ARTS ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Act Your Best (AYB) Summer Arts Program provided Homewood youth with various positive enrichment activities over eight weeks this summer. Three "Learn and Earn" students with the Bloomfield-Garfield Association and the City of Pittsburgh were assigned to AYB as teen mentors. Monday through Friday for eight weeks, AYB youth were provided breakfast and lunch each day and then exposed to a wide array of arts programs and physical activities.

The youth experienced a wealth of field trips (with transportation provided by the Rev. Rodney Lyde and Baptist Temple) to the Phipps Conservatory, the Fort Pitt Blockhouse & Museum, the Incline, the Nationality Rooms at the Cathedral of Learning, Kennywood, the "ART House" in Homewood, and the Carnegie Library. They also visited the County Courthouse and meet the K-9 police dogs and their handlers.

There were hands-on crafting projects, lessons in gardening, and music lessons with hand bells and steel drums.



PRESS DOWN, SHAKEN TOGETHER: STEWARDSHIP

Parish finances begin and end with stewardship. All that we have belongs to God and is entrusted to us to use for God's purposes. Members of the parish give to the church in stewardship of their possessions, and, then, the vestry uses these offerings in good stewardship of what is given. Stewardship is , first of all, a biblical priority. Jesus talked frequently about the right use of possessions (Luke 12:42-48; 21:1-4; etc.). The Episcopal Church at the General Convention of 1982 called on every member of the church to accept the "biblical tithe as the minimal standard of Christian giving." Among the vestry's responsibility is to ensure that money is used carefully within the parish, and that the needs of others should have a high priority.

- ✤ AC for HC Campaign The initial bid to install a ductless air conditioning system was much lower than later bids we received. The campaign committee agreed to slow the process down in order to ensure that we had accurate numbers to complete the process. Contributions received to date will be placed in an interest bearing account. Contributions may still be made for this campaign as we know this must be done.
- ✤ In the annual budget, funds to be raised for 2018 was set at \$50,000. To date, \$61,318.05 have been raised via sponsorships and grants. The funds have been used for helping hands and community outreach initiatives; many are listed in this publication. This effort exceeded the goal by almost \$12,000 and has helped offset Holy Cross' general fund expenses.

Holy Cross in Your Estate/Will

The Church of the Holy Cross was recently endowed with a gift from the trust of the late Doris Brevard who was a longtime members of the church. (Her grandparents help to organize Holy Cross.) Doris' plan ensures the continued existence of this historic church. As you do your estate planning, consider how you can help continue the legacy of Holy Cross.

WHO IS ELA?

Unlike Siri, ELA is not "intelligent assistant" that answers voice commands. ELA is the Episcopal Lutheran Alliance – the 501c3 non-profit, tax-exempt, charitable organization of the Church of the Holy Cross. All donations made to this entity are tax deductible.

ELA was re-established and renamed earlier this year, reforming in conjunction

with the Episcopal Diocese and the Southwest Lutheran Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The mission of ELA is to establish collaboration critical to community redevelopment. "We believe in sustainable economic development. We provide programs, resource mobilization, and community organizing that help strengthen and empower our communities."

Dr. Leon Haley, Sr. is the Board Chair. Rev. Torrey O. Johnson is the President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO). Other board members are Glenda Mayo, Oliver Jackson, Martha Shelby, and Glenda Mayo. Community outreach programs that have occurred at the Church of the Holy Cross since December have been under the ELA umbrella. ELA continues its effort to obtain grant to fund all ELA activities and programs.

Through an ELA grant, Holy Cross has re-established its urban garden initiative which is rooted in the history of this church as Holy Cross once owned a grocery store in Homewood. Community gardening helps restore the importance of African-American agricultural history and self-sufficiency.

This year's crop yielded several different varieties of tomatoes, corn, cucumbers, peppers, and herbs: mint, basil, thyme, and dill. Several types of flowers were also planted and bloomed during the season. We are planning a "Fresh From the Garden" cooking workshop as an addition to this garden initiative for those who tilled, planted, worked, watered the garden.

A storage shed has been purchased and is being constructed to store all the necessary equipment. The retaining wall and platform were also completed through a grant from ELA.

MARCH FOR OUR LIVES

In response to the deadly nationwide school shootings, 30 young people from the Homewood community attended the March for Our Lives in Washington, DC. on March 24, 2018. Youth and chaperones (Holy Cross members and community residents) traveled by bus to the event where they were interviewed by local, national, and international news media outlets. Clothed in their own "Open Arms, Not Firearms" t-shirts, our youth were poised and gave thoughful and articulate comments as they relayed their personal perspective on gun violence and the need for safer gun legislation.

During the stay in the nation's capital, Rev. Johnson arranged for tickets to the National Museum of African American History and Culture, a difficult task for such a large group. He also arranged an overnight stay on the Navy base at Bethesada.
