

Minutes from IACC meeting November 4, 2024

Mike Palmieri called the meeting to order at 7:02pm.

Charlie Minutillo led the Pledge of Allegiance and we all sang God Bless America.

Mike honored all club veterans especially on Veterans Day next week. He noticed that some names were missing in the newsletter and will make sure they are included in next year's newsletter. He then recognized and congratulated Charlie Minutillo on his 90th birthday and we all sang to him.

Sal Saladini then gave his invocation.

Mike thanked everyone for all the food donations for the Manville Caritas Food Pantry. He will hold another drive for needed Thanksgiving food on Nvember 18th from 10am to 2 pm in the clubhouse parking lot. We will also collect hats, gloves, scarves, socks, etc. at the December meeting. It was noted by Nick Zeno that currently Manville is having a coat drive at the food pantry.

Mike asked for a vote on the Bylaws which are posted on our website; it was approved. He noted due to no interest we won't have elections of officers this year. He then asked for approval for 2 donations: Veterans Club for \$250 and Bible Study Group who serve Thanksgiving dinner to those in CW who would like to attend for \$100. Both donations were approved.

Ann Allevi read the minutes of the October meeting.

Steve Selvaggio gave the Treasurer's report. Our October balance was \$21,660 and November's balance is \$22,087. Expenses were Doolan's for \$3,533, and Lancaster trip \$1,012. Income was \$770 from due, and Doolan's payments of \$4,027.

Steve gave the membership report for Debbie Stone: 479 paid members, 46 honorary members, totaling 525 paid members. He then announced 2 new members, and they were in attendance and recognized. He mentioned that we are now collecting dues for next year; \$25 per person for new members and \$20 per person for renewals.

Rich Allevi then showed Steve's collection of pictures from trips to Doolan's and the Sieminski Theatre.

Mike spoke about upcoming events: Vinnie Medugno and Jersey Surecats.

Colleen spoke about upcoming trips: Doolans Christmas show, and Peddler's Village. Due to interest by members she will be sending out a survey for a trip to Niagara Falls from 9/8-9/12/25. We need a minimum of 40 people. She noted that her committee is working on other possible future trips.

Mike noted that he has booked a comedy show for next year, and Gary Morton will be the DJ at the Christmas party on 12/14.

Sal was looking for interest in a trip on 12/12 to Staten Island at the Columbian Association. There will be a talk about Columbus and a free dinner. He then gave his Italy Tidbits.

Rich showed a comedy skit by John Pinetta. He then explained the Cornhole Contest and that Charlie Minutillo would run the event after adjournment.

Everyone then sang That's Amore.

Mike asked for cake sign ups and adjourned the meeting at 7:50 pm. Next meeting is on December 2nd

ITALIAN TID BITS BY SAL



Salad

Growing up in an Italian American environment, my mother always put a huge salad bowl on our table with every evening meal. We always ate our salad last, as we were told it helped our digestive system.

Typically, it included Chicory, Arugula, iceberg lettuce, escarole, celery, cucumbers, radishes, onions, tomatoes and olives. The dressing was always the same, olive oil and vinegar, nothing else.

When I went to high school I discovered how "other" people ate their salad and how they used dressings. I watched in shock and horror as my non-Italian friends poured orange colored French dressing on their salads which they never finished. That goes for Ranch, Thousand Island and Russian dressings. I also refused to use the so-called Italian Vinaigrette. Why would anyone do this to vinegar - changing it into this bizarre sugary mystery?

At an early age I was taught the "laws of saladry"- that being, how to make, serve and eat 'insalada Italiana.' Every salad item should be rinsed in cold water beforehand, especially "cicoria and dandelions.

Never cut a head of lettuce with a knife. That will leave a brownish tinge on the green leaves, especially the lighter colored ones. Instead of using a knife, the leaves should be broken by hand.

Never leave a salad with its dressing in the refrigerator, it will wilt quickly and become "mushada" as we call it.

And finally, if served outside at a barbecue it should be kept in a cool shady place.















MANGIA...!

Luigi Del Bianco (May 8, 1892 – January 20, 1969) was an Italian-American <u>sculptor</u>, and chief carver of Mount Rushmore.^[1]

Bianco was born on a ship near <u>Le Havre</u>, <u>France</u>, on May 8, 1892, to Vincenzo and Osvalda Del Bianco, who were returning from the <u>United States</u> to <u>Italy</u>. He showed interest in carving at a young age, and spent time in <u>Austria</u> and <u>Venice</u> studying the art. [2]

When Bianco was 18 years old, he left for America, arriving in Barre, Vermont.[2]


When <u>World War I</u> broke out, Bianco returned to Italy and fought for his home country, eventually returning to Vermont in 1920. Bianco's brother-in-law introduced him to Mount Rushmore designer <u>Gutzon Borglum</u>, and Bianco began working at Borglum's studio. [2]

In 1933, Borglum hired Bianco as chief stone carver on the Mount Rushmore National Memorial. Paid \$1.50 an hour, Bianco was charged with carving the details in the faces. He carved <u>Abraham Lincoln</u>'s eyes, and patched many dangerous cracks in stone.

Borglum constantly praised Bianco for his great abilities as a classically trained stone carver: "He is worth any three men in America for this particular type of work." "He is the only intelligent, efficient stone carver on the work who understands the language of the sculptor, we could double our progress if we had two like Bianco."

Before Mount Rushmore Bianco worked on <u>Stone Mountain</u> and <u>Wars of America</u> memorial with Borglum.[3]

On September 16, 2017, the National Park Service unveiled a memorial plaque at Mount Rushmore. The plaque acknowledged Luigi Del Bianco's crucial role as the only chief carver on the work.

The first Christmas tree at Rockefeller Center was erected in 1931, during the <u>Depression</u>-era <u>construction of Rockefeller Center</u>, when Italian-American workers on <u>Christmas Eve</u>. decorated a smaller 20 foot (6.1 m) <u>balsam fir</u> with "strings of cranberries, garlands of paper, and even a few tin cans."

With the lighting of the 50-foot-tall (15 m) first official tree two years later, the tree became what Rockefeller Center dubbed "a holiday beacon for New Yorkers and visitors alike". The skating rink was opened below the tree in the plaza in 1936. [2]

Since then, the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree has been a yearly tradition. [14] Workers pooled their money for that unlit tree, with the garlands made by workers' families.

According to Rockefeller Center's website, the tree was "from the beginning ... a gathering place and reflection of what was happening in the world around it".[8]

World War II ushered in simple, patriotic decorations, including red, white and blue unlit globes and painted wooden stars.

In 1942, instead of one large tree, three more modest trees were raised, each decorated in one of the flag's colors.

From 1944 until the war's end in 1945, the tree went unlit due to blackout regulations.








