02 10 Creator and His Cosmos

Welcome to awareness.

You exist inside this place we call the cosmos, or universe. Essentially the cosmos includes everything that exists inside the cosmos, and the cosmos itself. The things that exist are facts. We can measure facts. Fictions exist too, which are ideas about what else could exist. It's important to recognize this capacity in our species: we can imagine things that exist and we can imagine things that do not exist. The trick is to separate fact from fiction, and build your thinking processes upon facts. More on this later.

The cosmos is a concatenated system of matrices orchestrated by Creator. This logic has been gained from reading and interpreting the Holy Bible, which begins "In the beginning ..." Read it for yourself on this webpage (see Genesis 1-3 on the banner). Read it just to say that you have read it recently. It's peculiar because each time you dip your mind into those words and meanings, you see something better; meaning your experience of life becomes clearer to you. Questions will arise in your mind when you read, so write down the questions, so you direct yourself to find answers. It's really invigorating.

We see patterns in this cosmos and on this planet particularly. Ordered patterns. Precisely ordered patterns that function within very particular, measurable tolerances. These patterns are the systems within the matrices. I call them, ethnocentrically, cultures. Each of us looks "out" from our bodies, receives data that we experience, and then we must interpret the data, to determine our next set of actions. Well functioning cultures tend to become "repeatable cycles" or systems within our personal cultural existence. Humans have been experiencing these behavior cycles for the last 5,000 years of human experience.

For example, an obvious pattern is this one: There is a beginning and an end, just like we experience in our own bodies. We were born, had to be cared for to survive, become aware of our power to make decisions about preferences (around age 2), and learn to negotiate the consequences. About the "middle" of our life, we begin to ask for answers to the nagging questions (if there are any), and seek to finish the remaining days "the best we can." Then our bodies expire, and we don't wake up any more. Death.

Why?

Why do these cycles occur? "Why is this happening to me?" we cry in our dire circumstances. There are lots of answers and reasons for these things. There are many facts and many fictions. We must learn for ourselves what are "the best" answers, the right answers.

This makes us aware of the metric of "right" and "wrong." And we learn to negotiate "decisions" based on the measure of "rightness' benefits" versus "wrongness' dangers." All actions have sequences that follow the decisions – these are called consequences. Some consequences we consider good, others may be bad. Some give life, some result in unnatural death (aka premature death).

Death is the end of this session called "one's life." It visits every soul, and threatens to come when we are not prepared to handle its consequences. So, it is best to prepare for death, and overcome its fear factors as soon as possible. Because just living for oneself has been proven over and over again in human history to be a lonely and destructive sequence that prematurely ends others' lives. Each must

learn to live in this cooperative culture within the cosmos. Moreover, being self-centered is an imbalanced behavior (e.g. mental illness) that we generally call narcissism.

Narcissism has it benefits, because it is what makes us aware of our need to protect and care for ourselves in cooperative competition with other members of our cultures. On a national scale, each people group that becomes a nation (by military conquest) follows regulations. Sometimes those regulations are established by fiat (where the military commander in chief declares thus and so). Sometimes those national cultures are based on freedom, which implies that each citizen will cooperate competitively to sustain the cultures within the system. This is called a philosophy of life. All "systems" of national governance are man-made, except for a recently reborn nation named Israel, which appeared in human history around 1446 BCE (according to the Gregorian calendar of 1582). Each nation, therefore, must agree on the regulations that the nation agrees to.

If you don't agree with the national government, you can protest against it. Usually that will lead into other activities that may cost you your life (premature death). Many revolutionaries are hailed as "great leaders" who protested the operations commanded by national or regional (e.g. Empire) rulers.

All of these "cultures" – these people groups who agree to participate in a national campaign of self-governance (aka republics) – have many levels of cooperatively competitive coordination. They are built on hierarchical systems, just like a family experiences when a man and woman bear children. And both the man and woman realize that they have "given birth" to a new offspring. Which is an experience that Creator shares with His cosmos.

"This cosmos is His baby," one could conclude. "Yes, to a degree of comparison" the Bible teacher acknowledges, hoping to add more detail. "But we are not like Him in any way, because He is perfect in every way. We are imperfect in every way" the Bible explains.

For example, we don't always distinguish perfectly between fact and fiction. It's been this way from early on, as you read in Genesis 1-3. Sometimes humans, based on their experiences in their circumstances of culture, don't always accurately distinguish between fact and fiction. Especially when they are not given full access to all the information. Thus, they make decisions based on insufficient evidence. And here is the kicker: because no human knows everything (categorically perfect knowledge of any subject), they are bound into this irrational behavior. We act but don't fully understand why we are doing thus and so. Thus all human action, in a very precise measure of tolerance, is irrational."

Nothing is going to change that logical reality in this cosmos. Therefore, don't fully trust any humans. They are all failures when measured by the tiny tolerances of this precisely ordered cosmos.

The cosmos since Noah, therefore, is declaring to us, "Humans, you are creatures. You have a short life span of 120 years or less. You exist in cultures that you did not participate in establishing; and you need to participate now to keep your cultures flourishing so that people can cooperatively compete to survive into making a living and thriving.

All nations, and more particularly, all humans within those nations, cooperate collectively under the United Nations, which was founded in 1945. It is the resource for "best practices" on the planet. The United Nations is our grandparents (forefathers) heritage that they concluded was the best way forward.

So, let's work the systems, seeking to improve efficiencies by focusing on our own production of our "best gifts" for the cosmos. This is what is means to participate in Advancing God's Kingdom. This is what it means to build better nations faster. With increased efficiencies of our personal activities, we each do our part in advancing the cosmos.

Noah was given two regulations: 1. Be fruitful and multiply and 2. Do not murder anyone, lest you lose your right to life.

With this introduction, there is so much to learn moving forward. Remember, focus on facts to invigorate fictions about a better future in your immediate cultures. Then work hard to bring your fictions to fruition. Then advance to the next mission. This is a great time to be alive!
