ESHB 1047 (Rep. Peterson), Protecting the public's health by creating a system for safe and secure collection and disposal of unwanted medications

SHB 1539 (Rep. McCabe), Regarding a curriculum for the prevention of sexual abuse of students

2SHB 1377 (Rep. Ortiz-Self), Improving students' mental health by enhancing nonacademic professional services

E2SHB 2334 (Rep. Sawyer), Regulating the use of cannabinoid additives in marijuana products

HB 2474 (Rep. Condotta), Modifying marijuana product labeling requirements

HB 2517 (Rep. Stonier), Concerning penalties for alcohol manufacturers who have committed violations as part of its ancillary activities

2SHB 2671 (Rep. Wilcox), Improving the behavioral health of people in the agricultural industry

E2SHB 2779 (Rep. Senn), Improving access to mental health services for children and youth

SSB 5553 (Sen. Pedersen), Preventing suicide by permitting the voluntary waiver of firearm rights

ESB 5992 (Sen. Van De Wege), Concerning bump-fire stocks

SSB 6141 (Sen. McCoy), Strengthening school district plans for recognition, screening, and response to emotional or behavioral distress in students

SSB 6452 (Sen. Brown), Expanding the activities of the children's mental health services consultation program

SSB 6514 (Sen. Brown), Concerning suicide prevention and behavioral health in higher education, with enhanced services to student veterans

E2SHB 1054 (Rep. Harris), Concerning the age of individuals at which sale or distribution of tobacco and vapor products may be made

2SHB 1122 (Rep. Kagi), Protecting public safety through responsible storage of firearms

HB 1387 (Rep. Jenkins), Concerning enhanced background checks and licensure for assault weapons and large capacity magazines

HB 2422 (Rep. Peterson), Concerning high capacity magazines

HB 2483 (Rep. Klippert), Siting of marijuana businesses in relation to areas or facilities frequented by children

SHB 2489 (Rep. Cody), Concerning opioid use disorder treatment, prevention, and related services

2SHB 2572 (Rep. Cody), Removing health coverage barriers to accessing substance use disorder treatment services

HB 2573 (Rep. Kloba), Concerning alcohol server permits

HB 2630 (Rep. Griffey), Ensuring marijuana license applicants are in compliance with local ordinances

SHB 2715 (Rep. Klippert), Concerning impaired driving

HB 2799 (Rep. Kagi), Providing that certain local sales and use taxes may be used for prevention and outreach programs

HB 2972 (Rep. Sawyer), Creating a drug enforcement task force on the illicit production of marijuana

SSB 5766 (Sen. Lias), Preventing harassment, intimidation, and bullying in public schools

SB 5988 (Sen. Padden), Concerning dependent child or dependent adult exposure to controlled substances

SB 6048 (Sen. Kuderer), Concerning the age of individuals at which sale or distribution of tobacco and vapor products may be made

SB 6297 (Sen. Dhingra), Concerning provisions governing firearms possession by persons who have been found incompetent to stand trial and who have a history of one or more violent acts

SB 6620 (Sen. Frockt), Improving security in schools and the safety of students

Problematic Bills Killed

HB 1039 (Rep. Wylie), Allowing sales of growers of wine

HB 2274 (Rep. Blake), Concerning special permits for alcohol samples and sales by alcohol manufacturers

HB 2301 (Rep. Walsh), Concerning the appropriation to counties of moneys from the dedicated marijuana account for the purpose of funding legal services for indigent defendants in criminal cases

SHB 2336 (Rep. Sawyer), Permitting cities, towns, and counties to prohibit the production, processing, or sale of marijuana only by an ordinance enacted through a public vote

HB 2471 (Rep. Kirby), Preempting local government regulation of medical marijuana cooperatives.

HB 2559 (Rep. Blake), Allowing nonmedical home cultivation of marijuana

SHB 2568 (Rep. Eslick), Establishing an on-premises retail alcohol license for a business at which customers participate in an art activity such as painting, pottery, or sculpting

SHB 2609 (Rep. Tarleton), Modernizing and clarifying in-state distilled spirits production licenses and fees

HB 2714 (Rep. Vick), Modifying theater license provisions

SHB 2792 (Rep. Chapman), Modifying provisions on spirits retailers

HB 2889 (Rep. Young), Concerning theater seating requirements in theaters with liquor licenses

SHB 2974 (Rep. Young), Authorizing spirits, beer, and wine theater licensees to have one additional screen

HB 2991 (Rep. Tarleton), Updating spirits industry regulations

SB 5161 (Sen. Keiser), Modifying theater license provisions

SB 5164 (Sen. Keiser), Authorizing grocery store license endorsements allowing beer and wine tastings at certain grocery stores that specialize in the sale of meat, poultry, seafood, or cheese

SB 5925 (Sen. Keiser), Concerning liquor licenses

SB 6000 (Sen. Keiser), Authorizing grocery store license endorsements allowing beer and wine tastings at certain grocery stores that specialize in the sale of meat, poultry, seafood, or cheese

SB 6122 (Sen. Honeyford), Regarding beer, wine, cider, and mead at farmers markets

SB 6212 (Sen. Hasegawa), Allowing the legislative gift center to sell products produced in Washington by craft distillers and microbreweries

SSB 6346 (Sen. Takko), Allowing the sale of wine by snack bar license holders

SB 6430 (Sen. Zeiger), Concerning the consumption of alcohol for certain special events held on agricultural fairgrounds

SB 6444 (Sen. Cleveland), Modifying alcohol sales by distributors

SB 6482 (Sen. Walsh), Allowing nonmedical home cultivation of marijuana
