Monthly Command Report

For June 2021

Emergency Response:

For the month of June, there were a total of **31** fire calls. Average response time for the month was **6** minutes and **41** seconds. This is a door-to-door time.

For the month of June, there were total of **25 911** EMS calls with **13** Transports and **12** non-transports. Of the transports, there were **13** ALS and **0** BLS calls.

In addition, there were **41** facility transfers completed.

For the month of June there were a total of **66** EMS runs.

ALS- Advanced Life Support

BLS- Basic Life Support

Emergency Vehicles:

B-21(91)- Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report.

5-TON/B92: No Change in status since January.

2 ½ Ton/B 21(93): Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report, and no change in status from last month.

E-22(90): No change in status since January. Apparatus still needs to be scheduled for annual PM.

E-21(91): Apparatus is currently out of service and at Billy Bob's repair shop. Siddons has agreed to allow us to postpone repair until we are closer to taking receipt of the new engine.

Loaner Engine: Due to the situation with E21, Siddons Martin was kind enough to provide the department with a loaner engine, free of charge. It is our responsibility to maintain the engine while it is in service. Siddons is allowing us to keep the loaner engine in service until we take delivery of a replacement engine for E21. Engine is in good working order.

T-21(90): Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report. Radio antenna will be replaced in house do to transmission issues.

M-23(90): Unit is being checked daily. The stretcher had a failure, luckily not while a patient was on it. EMSAR worked with FERNO to get the appropriate parts in, and repair completed. In order to stay in service, Ferno sent us a loaner stretcher. At this time, our stretcher is repaired and back in service.

M-22(91): The medic unit is being checked daily without any major issues to report.

M-21 (New Medic Unit): Unit is being checked daily without any issues to report. Siddons has been working with Demers to address a programming issue that is causing a malfunction with the locking systems. This is being covered under warranty.

Command: The unit is being checked daily. As our other aged equipment, our maintenance cost is becoming substantial. Just like any of our frontline equipment, it must be reliable.

Rescue 21 (90): Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report.

MISC:

The county has launched the new CAD system, and agencies are adapting appropriately.

Without having any progress on the order of the new engine to Siddons, we will need to prepare to issue back payment for the loaner engine. The loaner engine was initially provided at no cost while our new engine was in production. However, we have had the loaner engine in service since April, and we do still not have an engine in production.

Personnel:

We are still working to increase our number of local volunteers.

All District 2 personnel that attended Tactical Medic/Joint Rescue Task Force training, successfully completed the course. We are working closely with local law enforcement agencies in order to properly integrate medics with law enforcement for high risk operations.

Administration:

Command staff is working with TCDRS to complete our census so that a proposal may be put together. Despite previous belief, we are not required to have all staff in the retirement system.

Training:

EMS

Crews reviewed and trained on the following:

- EMS operations
- Radio Operations
- Traction Splint operation and application
- Stair Chair operations
- 12 lead placement
- Stretcher operations and Medic unit familiarization for new staff

Fire

Crews reviewed and trained on the following:

- New CAD training
- Scene Size Up
- Emergency Vehicle Operations
- Incident Command
- Hose Lays

Station:

Any public walk ups to the department are being redirected to the front doors instead on leaving the apparatus bays open. This is to ensure health safety for both the public and the personnel.

Grants/Donations:

The grant truck from the Forestry Service that will serve as our new heavy brush truck is nearing completion. Fabrication, paint, pump, tank and re assembly have been completed. The only items left are to finish the plumbing, the emergency lighting, siren, and radio.

Public Relations:

The department is beginning to sit back down internally as well as with local business owners to discuss and plan how we can safely begin to be more involved in the community with public relation events.

Fire: Our biggest obstacle remains to be the age and condition of apparatus and equipment, leaving more equipment out of service than in service. We have begun spec'ing out replacement equipment & apparatus for the upcoming budget workshops.

EMS:

The Standard Medical Operating Protocols are currently in the review stage. Once thoroughly cleared for any errors or adjustments, we will launch them. A soft launch has already been completed so that the staff may start reading through them.

Misc.: A major focus point of the department has been to create a strong professional working relationship with surrounding departments.
