Monthly Command Report

For November Emergency Response:

For the month of November, there were a total of **39** fire calls.

For the month of November, there were total of **44 911** EMS calls **32** transports and **12** non-transports. Of the transports, there were **32** ALS and **0** BLS calls.

In addition, there were **47** facility transfers completed.

For the month of November there were a total of **91** EMS runs.

ALS- Advanced Life Support

BLS- Basic Life Support

Average response time for the month was **06** minutes and **27** seconds. This is a door-to-door time.

Emergency Vehicles:

B-22: Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report.

B-21B (New Heavy): Apparatus is being checked daily without major issues to report. All repairs from the fire damage have been completed by 181 Auto & the appropriate insurance claim was filed.

2 ½ Ton 22 B: Apparatus is being checked daily and is in Service without any major issues to report.

E-22: No change in status. We are still working with third party re sale vendors to secure a buyer. We have recently had re sale companies inquiring on the apparatus.

E-21: Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report. There is a small coolant leak that has been noted. Billy Bob's has been working on locating the leak. This is very minor and is not affecting the unit's operation or being in service.

Loaner Engine: Apparatus is being checked daily without any major issues to report. We are responsible for any repairs while it is in our possession. Siddons is allowing us to keep the unit in our possession until the tank repairs on T22 are complete.

T-22: Apparatus is being checked daily and is in service. We are still awaiting tank repairs to be scheduled, major delays are occurring due to Deep South. Siddons and Command staff are following up with Deep South daily and have been having major communication issues.

We have begun to pull in our own quotes for repair. At this time, the repair needed requires a poly welder. Due to the location of the crack and size, the tank at this time does not require replacement. However, the more time that passes, the more we run a risk for major repairs. The lapse of time is not on the department or Siddons.

M-22: Unit is currently OOS due to a failed inverter and is currently at Siddons for repair.

M-23: Unit is has been placed into service with M23's stretcher. Once M23 returns from repair, M22 will then be sent to Siddons to have inverters serviced as well as to install a new stretcher mount. Due to the lead time and cost of parts for repair of the OOS Ferno stretcher, a universal mount will be installed in M22 (Siddons has confirmed that it will still be compatible with our Ferno stretchers) The universal mount will allow for us to utilize a Stryker stretcher that has been arranged for our use in order to have all three medic units back up and running.

Stryker has worked with us to secure a loaner. We are awaiting a quote from Siddons to install the proper locking system so that we can utilize this stretcher, all stretcher systems are not universal.

Please note that M22&M23 are now almost 12 years old. These units are regularly out for service to address failed parts/systems that have all been requiring replacements due to age.

M-21 (New Medic Unit): Unit is being checked daily without any major issues to report. One of the 2 interior AC units in the patient compartment have been disconnected by Siddons due to a component failure. The parts for repair have been ordered and the unit is still in service as the chassis and one rear unit are still in operation.

Rescue 22: Apparatus is being checked daily and is in service. This unit is still being utilized as a temporary Command.

Due to the number of issues and negative impact this has caused not only on our department but other operations to include state deployments, we are working with several entities to find a solution.

MISC:

Crews will begin working with commercial properties in the district to update our pre plans as part of our gear up for a new ISO survey to be conducted in the Spring of 2023.

Personnel:

Chief Officers are personally working vacancies on M21 through December in effort to keep over time costs down.

Administration:

Our auto, building, Liability & Workman's Comp policies have all been successfully renewed with VFIS.

During a recent audit of our response reporting done by Captain Flores it was found that all crews have scene times less than 10 minutes for critical calls and less than 20 minutes for non-critical calls.

Training:

Station:

Any public walk ups to the department are being redirected to the front doors instead on leaving the apparatus bays open. This is to ensure health safety for both the public and the personnel.

The new stove/oven has been installed at Station 1.

Grants/Donations:

The Command Staff is currently working on several grants. Firehouse Grants is assisting us with obtaining funding for new SCBA's.

Public Relations:

The department's annual Toy Drive for The Wilson Area Children's Foundation is underway and will conclude with a small community Christmas event on December 17th.

Fire: Our biggest obstacle remains to be the age and condition of apparatus and equipment, leaving more equipment out of service than in service. This has continued to cause a decrease in the quality of relationships with surrounding departments as well as confidence in the equipment from the staff.

EMS:

The new Standard Medical Operating Protocols are complete and in place, minor corrections are being made as needed. WCESD 4 & WCESD 2 continue to have a strong working relationship. District 2 staff will be providing ACLS & PALS certification classes for District 4 in December.

Misc.: A major focus point of the department remains to create a strong professional working relationship with surrounding departments and increase the number of local volunteers.

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
