# MSTA North Georgia Classic 2025

The mid-April NGC,

headquartered in Dillard at the Mountain Valley Inn, kicked off this year's MSTA rally season. Chad Barker was the host and did another commendable job. In addition to getting us a good deal on a block of rooms at the MVI, he had several preplanned routes available for GPS and arranged for a Saturday dinner at the Valley Café including easy QR-code sign-up. Besides all that, he laughed at both of my jokes!

The rally was Thursday to Sunday but my riding pal, Ken, and I checked in early. I hate to travel nearly 600 miles and only get in three days of mountain riding – something sorely missed in Florida.





The Inn provided continental breakfasts, but the Cupboard Café was within easy walking distance and their breakfasts were excellent. Lunches were at places we liked along the routes. Our favorite was the Rivers End Restaurant along the Nantahala River on US-19. Dinners were mostly in Dillard though we had a few early meals elsewhere. There were two Mexican restaurants within walking distance. We preferred La Cabana's *light* entrees. The Vally Café across the main road was very good. We saved it for the rally dinner on Saturday which was well attended.

Florida had a good turnout including Terry, Jay, Wayne, Mike and another fella, whose name escapes me, from the southeast... and me, of course. There may have been more. Ken and I hooked up with Terry and Jay Friday afternoon at TWO in Suches. Then we got in some spirited riding that afternoon and allday Saturday.

Temperatures ranged from the 30's overnight one or two nights to the 60's and 70's daytime although Friday and Saturday got warmer. It was still very chilly when we got on the road most mornings. Precipitation and humidity were non-issues. Just about perfect, I'd say.

My second day was marred by a flat rear tire. Had a 2 1/2-inch screw in it and was totally flat when I first got on the RT that morning. I plugged it and went through 3 air compressors to get it aired up but it was still leaking. Thanks to Ken and Mike for their help. An automotive tire shop just over the NC line put in a good plug and, when I asked about where to get a new tire, suggested **Teem Motorsports up in Franklin, TN** – less than a half hour north. They had the tire I wanted and said come on up. I did. They took it right in, promptly swapped tires and charged a very fair price. Then I caught up with Ken and Mike at the Rivers End Restaurant for lunch.

Later, Ken got concerned about the wear on his rear tire and the same shop replaced it right away when he showed up. I recommended the shop to Chad in case he knew of anyone else who might have tire or other bike issues. Teem's was an excellent find and worth remembering.

### Safety Talk



Coping with the Left-Turn Menace by Doug Westly

We've all seen it and talked about it. So why does it still happen? Why do we continue to lose so many riders (and sometimes friends) to the left-turning vehicle that violates our right-of-way? According to statistics, more motorcycle- involved multi-car accidents occur at/in intersections than anywhere else on public roads (*Source: MSF*).

There are lots of factors involved in left-turn car/motorcycle crashes. The most obvious one is the inability of the driver to visually recognize the approaching motorcycle in the oncoming lane. Whether it is a distracted driver, someone trying to squeeze through a perceived "hole" in the traffic, etc. the result is usually bad news for the motorcyclist.

So how do we cope with this all-too common traffic menace? Here are just a few thoughts, collected from various sources, riders and just plain old experience.

- First off, we just have to make the assumption that NOBODY sees us on the road. Just because you're wearing hi-vis everything, from underwear to a one-piece, day-glow orange, LED-lit billboard suit, do not expect that to protect you. SOME drivers may see it. Ride like you're invisible.
- Treat every intersection with caution. That doesn't just mean the ones with lights, stop signs and so on. Remember, every driveway emptying onto your road is an intersection. Every side street off your path of travel is an opportunity for a driver to turn in front of you.

- Pay attention to vehicles as they approach or are facing you in the oncoming lanes. If they are stopped or are slowing, expect them to turn...and not see you in the process.
- Can we catch clues about their intentions? Watch the driver.
  See where they are looking. Oh, and just because you make eye contact with them, don't assume they actually see you.
   Catching a theme here?
- Another effective tactic, particularly at controlled intersections where vehicles are waiting to turn, is to watch the front tires. If they start to turn or roll, you can guarantee the driver intends to GO.
- How about announcing your presence? Modulating headlight systems seem to work well and are legal in all 50 states, provided they are activated only during daylight hours. On the other hand, flashing your high beams can be a two-edged sword. The other driver may think you're indicating for them to proceed with their turn. Be careful about signals!
- Finally, a last thought...SLOW DOWN for those intersections and situations where an unwanted physics lesson with another vehicle is a real possibility. Remember to SCAN AHEAD for traffic and possible danger. Don't forget the MSF mantra: SEARCH-EVALUATE-EXECUTE (SEE)! (It really does work...)!

Having set an 8:15 departure time from West Melbourne, seven of the local riders had other commitments, one was a last-minute cancelation and there was one I hadn't heard from. I considered just waiting until 9 o'clock and then booking it up I-95 to SR 40. But then I thought... well, maybe someone will show up. That someone was Jay B from way down in Port St Lucie, of all places. So I took Jay on a journey across roads he never knew existed. Going up was also very pleasant with temps starting in the low 70's.

When we pulled in at *Drifters Riverside Bar & Grill* in Astor, the big parking lot was packed with motorcycles. Many were Harleys, which didn't surprise me – this is a popular place and they serve liquor! Some were ours, however, and then a group of about seven from the Villages and Ocala pulled in. All told, we became a group of fifteen. I had alerted Drifters that we might have as many as twenty show up – last year it was nineteen. So they arranged to seat us upstairs. Never been up those tall steps before. The view of the St Johns River was quite nice even if the tabletops were a bit tacky.

Chuck W and maybe some others from The Villages had just gotten back from Austin, TX. So they had stories about the bike races, including of Marc Marquez unbelievably going down with a 2second lead in one of them. It sounded like they had a great time. The food took a while as I'm sure the kitchen was swamped with all the people there. But it got to us eventually and was quite tasty, everyone agreed.

The 50/50 netted \$30 for Jim R – one of The Villages riders, I believe. Jay was our LD champ, easily nosing out Mike C from Sun City Center who nosed me out by two miles!

On the way home, I treated Jay to another route back totaling, for me, about 160 miles of largely curvaceous back roads. And then he had another 60 miles to go. So a pretty satisfying day on the road even with the upper 80's temps after lunch. Getting near the coast cooled things down a bit.

And they had specials. I tried their Italian sausage sub which was good. A couple folks went for the soup and salad bar. But most of that turned out to be hot air, and he managed to down the whole thing in seemingly short order. The only negative I heard was that their drinks were a tad weak. I had a water and coffee, and they were just fine! We skipped the 50/50.

Afterward, Bob took us East-siders on a fun rip through some curvy roads south and east of Zolfo Springs including Sweetwater Rd (I believe it was) and Crewsville Rd. When we got to SR-66, he turned left and we turned right. 66 took us to the south end of Sebring where it turned in US-98 – one that we're familiar with.

The ride over was very pleasant with temps at about 80. Coming home it was pressing close to 90, but very low humidity kept it bearable especially when moving. But, the last 15 miles was a struggle for me. As much as I enjoy meeting up with the West Coast crowd, I just don't think my body is up to it anymore when things heat up. Bob and Eve will be alternating as your hosts for the summer brunch and/or breakfast months. They're doing it for all of you. I'm sure they'll come up with some really worthy destinations for your riding, eating and socializing enjoyment. So get together and have a good time.


