The North Georgia Classic in Helen

What to Expect - Places to Go

[Ed: Although some portions of this article have previously appeared in the 2/2013, 7/2015 and 6/2016 editions of this newsletter, Tom has rewritten the content for publication here to encourage our readers to attend the North Georgia Classic Just-For-Fun event in April, 2017. Photos and maps by author except as noted.]

The NGC is coming up April 21 – 23, 2017 in Helen, Georgia. There's no registration. You don't even need to be an MSTA member. It's one of the best Friday thru Sunday rider get-togethers going in one of the best riding areas in the SE. And I encourage you to consider going. For event details go to: msta-se.com/helen/

I typically arrive at the host hotel late on Thursday afternoon. By dinner time, several riders are on hand. Motorcycling stories get into high gear in the parking lot and we decide to walk a short distance downtown for food and a libation or three. The next morning I'm are

up and fed in no big hurry. Days start slowly in the mountains. By 8:30 or 9:00 the temperature is up to about 50 and those undulating and curvaceous mountain roadways are beginning to strongly beckon.







Unlike in Florida, there are excellent ride options in almost every direction. But, given the short duration of the event, I've whittled down a long list of possibilities to what I consider the top tier of rides to recommend along with some to and from options. I admit that I can be a bit of an adrenaline junky at times and each of these rides can feed that addiction. But they can be equally enjoyable at whatever pace you feel comfortable with.

My list includes 1) <u>Wayah Rd</u> to the <u>Nantahala Outdoor Center</u> (NOC) and lunch at the <u>River's End Restaurant</u>; 2) the <u>Cherohala Skyway</u>; 3) <u>Tail of the Dragon</u>; 4) US 60 between Morganton and Suches; 5) <u>GA 180</u>; 6) US 129 over <u>Blood Mountain</u>; and 7) the <u>Richard B. Russell Scenic Highway</u>. You can't do all of them in a single day. And you may not want to run them in the order presented nor in the direction described. So pick and choose, mix and match or do your own route planning. You really can't go far wrong.

Item #1 is lunch at the Rivers End Restaurant at the NOC in NC and going by way of Wayah Rd promises a good challenge. I like to include US 76 between Hiawassee and Clayton early on because it's an excellent highway to begin re-adjusting your mind and muscle memory to mountain riding... getting into the *rhythm of the mountains* I like to call it.

The quickest way to 76 is to take GA 17 north over the mountain. It's plenty twisty and steep with its share of tar snakes so you may want to take it easy the first time over. A more laid back alternative is to turn right on GA 356 from just north of Helen past <u>Unicoi State Park</u>. Go left at the stop sign and then go left on GA 197 past <u>Lake Burton</u> to 76.

Either way, this is when I begin thinking in earnest about, and practicing, all the details related to somewhat aggressive cornering. It takes a while to knock the rust off. Basic tenets are not entering a curve too fast and lane position to maximize sight distance through blind curves in order to spot hazards and obstacles in time to deal with them

At Clayton, turn north on US 23/441 toward Franklin, NC and then take US 64 west. Access Wayah Rd from US 64 about 4 miles west of 441. The road meanders past an LBJ Jobs Corp campus, climbs steeply up the mountain and then descends past very picturesque Nantahala Lake and onward to US 19/74 in the Nantahala Gorge. Then take 19 east about 8 miles along the river to the NOC. Estimate about 3 hours plus breaks for the whole journey.

Wayah is a good workout with plenty of second gear switchbacks, dips, climbs and twists.

Downstream of the lake, it also has some abrupt turns onto bridges that come into view suddenly – not a time to be carrying too much speed. And not all of the pavement is in the greatest condition. It's not by any means a dangerous ride but it is prudent to ride a bit conservatively and stay alert. By contrast, the ride along the Nantahala River in the gorge is utterly relaxing as you meander along the river's rapids.

The Nantahala Outdoor Center's setting is picturesque and inviting. In fact, this is one of my favorite places in the world. After a hearty and warming lunch at the River's End Restaurant overlooking the river, I usually pop in next door to the well-stocked outdoor gear and apparel store for a quick look-see. Then walk over the foot bridge and down by the water to soak in a bit of the place's tranquility.





That done, some may want to head for the Cherohala Skyway. This is one of the most exhilarating rides in the

eastern US. To get there, point your bike west on 19 and as you come up out of the gorge, turn right on US 129 and head for Robbinsville. Just a little north of town, turn west on NC 143 and you will soon be on the Skyway.

The Robbinsville end of 143 is very technical. But then it opens up and allows you to build good speed as you ascend the mountain. Depending upon conditions, you may ride up into a cloud and then come out into clear skies near the summit. The route number changes to TN 165 as you descend into Tellico Plains. From Robbinsville to Tellico plains there is

close to 50 miles of superb tarmac and stunning views.

Most of the Skyway allows cornering at good speed. There are numerous pull outs for great views although, truthfully, you may be having too much fun to stop. In Tellico Plains, take a break and gas up, if necessary, at either of the convenience stores. Other smiling riders are usually there and anxious to share stories.






You have options for leaving (or getting to) Tellico Plains. One is the Skyway, of course. A second is to head south on 68 and then GA 60 – perhaps all the way through Suches, GA via Copperhill and Morganton (described below). Or a third is to take 68 south to TN 123 which becomes GA 294 which takes you to US 64 west of Murphy – a very fun ride.

A fourth option, if you have time, is to go north and east through the Tail of the Dragon and then back south on US 28. Do the Dragon on a weekday, if possible. It's crowded on weekends - including, now, the sports car crowd who don't seem to mind crossing centerlines in blind curves. It is also heavily patrolled on weekends

For the Dragon, head east on TN 165 about a mile. Turn north on TN 360 which squiggles along Tellico Lake to US 411. Turn right on 411 just under three miles to TN 72. Turn southeast on 72 which roughly follows the eastern side of Tellico Lake until you Tbone into US 129. All very pleasant. Turn right on 129 as it meanders along the north side of Chilhowee Lake and then the southwest edge of the Great Smokey Mountain National Park. The climax is the Tail of the Dragon's 318 curves in 11 miles to Deal's Gap. Lots

of braking, puckering, downshifting, looking over your shoulder to see where the road goes (or went!), cornering, accelerating and upshifting! And roadside picture takers are out for a buck.

After the obligatory stop and perhaps food or fuel at Deal's Gap, turn east on US 28. You will find 28 has all you could want in a mountain highway. Follow it across Fontana Dam and all the way to US 19/74 (only a few miles east of the NOC). Just keep an eye out for the Swain County deputy. Turn east on 19 about 4 miles and then south on 28 again at the gas station. This becomes extremely (but pleasantly) gnarly for a ways and finally comes into Franklin, NC where you can hop on US23/441 south into GA. Or a little below Franklin, hop on US 64 west over the mountain and then south on Hwy 175 into Hiawassee. Estimate 3 hours plus break time.

GA 60 between Morganton and Suches is an experience you just don't want to miss. The road surface is good and you can carry good speed. I love this road! It is exciting from end to end. The northern section nearer Morganton has some excellent higher speed sweepers. The center area meanders through pictorial meadows and farmland. In the mountain approaching Suches things tighten up. It has everything and is on my 'to do' list every time I'm in the area. In fact, it's so much fun that I usually ride it multiple times.



There is one decreasing radius curve to warn you about. It's a right-hander if you're heading north, with a side road joining it mid-curve from the west. It's about two-thirds of the way up from Suches. I was carrying good speed through that sucker one day when a pickup heading south popped into view mid-curve. Fortunately, the pickup stayed in its lane. I was so focused on my line that I didn't flinch and to accommodate the tightening curve, I had the presence of mind to lean even further over by pressing on the right handgrip. Close! I noticed a big gouge in the pavement where someone wasn't so fortunate.

Suches is most notably known to motorcyclists as the location of the old Two Wheels Only (TWO) campground and the western terminus of GA 180. *Two Wheels of Suches* is the rebirth of TWO under new ownership. There's usually a crowd of motorcyclists around - either camping, eating or just taking a break and enjoying the mountain air. Gas is available at the convenience store across the street.

From Suches, you can head south on 60 to US 19, take GA 180 east (see below) or go north toward Morganton or perhaps even on up to Tellico Plains. 60 south is an entertaining road - a paradise of twists and turns. The views off the mountain are spectacular if you are of a mind to peek. Then turn left on 19 to access US 129 and attack Blood Mountain (also below) or to head to Helen by way of Cleveland. Or go right to Dahlonega, a small college town with a gold mining past and a variety of interesting shops and eateries in the town square.

GA 180 is another good ride. It's called Wolf Pen Gap Rd between Suches and US 129 adjacent <u>Vogel State</u> <u>Park</u>. The section near Vogel is steep and gnarly and will demand your attention. The eastern and western sections of 180 overlap US 129 for a couple miles in

the middle. The eastern end starts (or ends) at US 17 south of Hiawassee (over the mountain north of Helen). The 180 Spur to <u>Brasstown Bald</u> runs north from the eastern section of 180.

Brasstown Bald is the highest point in GA and the visitor center can be accessed via the very steep and squiggly 180 Spur to the north. There's an observatory at the summit with great views outside and local history exhibits inside. It's said that on a clear day you can see Atlanta from up there.

US 129 over Blood Mountain is great fun. It's steep and curvy including numerous lower gear switchbacks. On weekends, there's always a crowd of motorcyclists on it so it's also patrolled. Up at the summit, the Appalachian (hiking) Trail (remember *A Walk in the Woods* with Redman and Nolte) crosses 129 running right through Neel's Gap Store which has a good

selection hiking gear and apparel and other interesting goods. The tree in front, amusingly, has hundreds of discarded hiking boots dangling by their laces from its limbs. Access Blood Mountain on the north end from



Blairsville or from GA 180 where it intersects 129. From the south come through Dahlonega, with its gold mining history, Cleveland or Suches.



Now finally, the icing on the riding cake -- the <u>Richard B. Russel Scenic Highway</u>, aka GA 348. It is just thrilling! While only about 14 miles long, it's the perfect exclamation point to a great day of mountain riding. I prefer to run it west to east because the eastern descent out of the mountain has an excellent road surface and is just an incredible succession of fast sweepers – one after another – all the way to the bottom of that glorious mountain. **What a rush!** Access it south of Blairsville from GA 180 about a mile east of US 129. It terminates at GA 75 ALT just west of Helen.

I do live to challenge curves. But for me, it's all about technique, concentration, precision and smoothness - not reckless speed.

DO BE AWARE: All of these roads are also a bonanza to fitness-minded bicyclists. Be prepared to meet them anywhere including mid-turn. Same for loose stones, fallen rocks and trees, animals and vehicles crossing centerline. Also, I'm not a big fan of dusk, night or dawn riding up there either, because of deer and other critters.



So back in *Alpine* Helen now... it's time to get to the hotel, put the bike to bed, change into street clothes and begin the tall tales in the parking lot. Continue with friends over dinner at a nice restaurant in town and wash it all down with your favorite elixirs. Then back to the hotel for more camaraderie. And finally, to bed.

Final notes on the North Georgia Classic in Helen... if you are a fan of mountain riding, that general area is arguably the best place to ride in the southeastern US. April is the perfect time of year to be there if you don't

mind that the vegetation hasn't greened up yet. Winter temperatures are moderating but still cool. It's too early yet for the crowds that make driving through towns impossible and out on the highways maddening. Helen is a small community, so walking to and from a variety of decent restaurants, watering holes and other attractions is easy.

The only downside is that April can also be unpredictable weather-wise. 2016 was perfect – no rain, no fog, cool mornings, lower 70's by afternoon. 2015 was just a little cooler daytime due to the overcast. Rain threatened but did not impact riding. The forecasts did not look good out ahead of the event. It was a last-minute decision on my part to go. And it was a good decision because we had a great time. My recommendation, therefore, is to book early (just make sure you can cancel, if necessary) and keep an eye on the forecasts. Forecasts do change as the target dates get closer. So don't panic and cancel early. Make your final decision the day before you plan to leave home.

Officially, the event runs Friday thru Sunday. For me though, it's about an 11-hour slog up and back. I love mountains and mountain riding and want to make the most of it. So, I prefer going up Thursday and coming home Monday. But, whatever works for you. I'm looking forward to the 2017 NGC – weather permitting. Hope to see **you** there, too.

SAFETY TALK

Safety and the Road Less Traveled

Just yesterday Becky and I were in the truck. So you want to go do a little ADV riding? Nothing serious, you just wonder what is down those dirt roads that you always speed by. Here are some thoughts on safety if you ever decide to take that left or right turn onto the dirt/sand/gravel road.

First rule of thumb: Traction, traction, traction. Street tires aren't made for off-pavement adventures. They aren't made to grip the soft surface and if your off-road path is anything more than hard pack gravel or dirt,

you're asking gravity to take over.

Heavy bikes don't work well off-road in Florida. All of Florida is a beach; it just depends on how far you are from the ocean. That means unless you are up in the Panhandle, you're riding on sand. Heavy bikes sink in this stuff, so unless the road or trail under you is hard pack, be extremely careful. For our off-road riding conditions, simple, lightweight ADV bikes work far better than the latest heavy-weight, monster-powered ADV wonders. You don't need power, you need traction and maneuverability. Besides that, it means you can pick it back up by yourself, when you discover just how soft our sand can be.



"You don't need the latest high HP ADV wonder bike and/or spend a lot of bucks to do a little off-road wandering. The Author's choice of lightweight ADV bike, a Honda CB500X with ABS, simply equipped with a rugged top case, crash bars, a good skid plate, secure mounting for a cell phone, and Dunlop Trailmax tires for on and off-road use. Find what works for the kind of riding you want to do."

If you're going to ride off-pavement, and especially if

you are by yourself, repair (both you and the bike) and safety equipment are critical. As a minimum, basic tools, a tire repair kit with inflator, a good first aid kit, and a way to call for help should be your minimum standards. Particularly if you are by yourself, consider carrying a SPOT transmitter. This should be on your person, NOT mounted to the bike.

Be aware of changing surface conditions if you venture off the pavement. A gravel road can change to hard pack or soft sand almost instantly.

A few quick riding techniques to help out...

- ♦ Watch for changing surface conditions by changes in the surface colors, undulations in the path, puddles, and even the tracks made by other vehicles.
- ▲ If you get into soft sand, push your weight back on the bike, allowing the front end to lighten and ride up or float on top of the sand. Be very careful about your front brake in reduced traction conditions. Getting your front tire turned in soft sand will almost guarantee a front-end tuck and gravity taking over.



- Even on hard pack and gravel, your front end will want to wander. Let it and stay loose on the handlebars, guiding the front end in a straight line, but don't fight the little front-end wandering.
- ♣ In deep sand, find the passable rut and use it, as long as it isn't too deep. Sometimes riding all the way on the path's shoulder will find you some harder ground.
- ♣ If you don't know how deep the puddle is, don't try it! There is a big difference between a 6 inch hole and a 2 foot hole.
- As the path gets worse and if you're not sure about your skills or your bike's capabilities, TURN AROUND. Bruising your ego is a lot less painful than bruising or breaking your body or bike!
- ♠ IMPORTANT (for all riding): Let somebody know where you're going, and establish check-in times and procedures.

Finally, once you do venture off-road, you're going to find a whole new world for two wheels. If you get the bug, find an off-road riding course. You'll be surprised how fast you can adapt, and how much fun the off-road world really is out there!
