right restaurant near the right roads that can accommodate the sophisticated MSTA palate along with our

shallow wallets and our unpredictable group size.

The **South Central Riding Area** is home for me as I live in Polk (pronounced Poke) County, along with several other members. We are fortunate enough to be minutes from some of the squiggly stuff like the **Mine Loop**, the **60 Shuffle** and the very fast sweepers of **Sweet Baby Jesus**, shown in the adjacent maps.


The South Central Area is home to some great RTE (Ride-to-Eat) locations like the Chop Shop in Lakeland, Jay Bee's in Lake Wales, Main Street in Lake Placid and Solomon's Castle in Ona. They are central enough for most of the Central riders and south enough for a strong showing from our South Florida groups as well.



Bonnie Mine Rd to Agricola Mine to Noralyn Mine to CR555-when connected right its about 39 miles



Old Bartow Rd to Spirit Lake and 17 down to 91 Mine Rd to Old Bartow/Lake Wales. New Pavement!



Sweetwater to Crewsville to 66 and back to another section of Sweetwater. Very fast!



Moving a little North is **The Central Riding Area**. This area covers northern Polk County on up to the Tavares/Eustis/Mt. Dora area of Lake County. Some notable routes are the challenging twisties (really!) of

Mama Cass to the Fussel Hussle, the swift sweepers of the Redwing a Ding Ding and the climbs and falls of the Central Mount Ton Range (Montverde to Sugarloaf Mountain to Mount Dora).

MSTAers are often spotted dining among the cypress trees at the Lake Harris Hideaway in Tavares, kicking off their boots (no spurs allowed – it says so right at the door) at the Redwing in Groveland or soaking up the syrup (pancakes as big as your front wheel) at Pappy's Grille in Winter Haven.

The West Central Riding Area doesn't get a visit from us as much as it should. It is a well-known area to the

Tampa and Brooksville riders. It is a little closer to the coast than the other riding areas, a little further from our core central membership and a very long haul for anyone in the south or eastern parts of the state. But the West Central offers some of the best riding in the state with one route and one run that is deserving of your rubber.

The route is **Hwy 52 to Floral City** and offers 51 miles of scenery, country roads, hills, sweepers, twisties and even a big sport bike hang out at the Hess station at Hwy-98 (Cortez Blvd and Spring Lake Hwy). At end of this run is your choice of the world famous and bike friendly Shamrock Inn or the biker (emphasis on the "er") friendly Sleepy Hollow on Gobbler Road.

The other notable stretch of road is a nine-mile run just west of the West Central Riding Area that has been a tradition in the past as Bill Royal's New Year's Day MSTA ride

one way out, so it adds up to a little over 18 miles of

smiles.

So consider this just a taste of the sport touring offerings in the Central riding area. The reason I am rambling on

about the Central area is that it is that time of year where we shift from brunch rides to our lunch rides as the cooler weather begins to arrive in October. Right now our MSTA calendar has central and south ride dates but we still haven't decided on all of the restaurant locations.

I would love to hear any suggestions or to see if anyone wants to get together for some scouting trips to discover new places to ride and visit, but first I need to make you aware of some of the lessons learned in selecting an RTE location.

Lesson 1: Restaurants need to be in, around, or near some sport-riding roads. As much as I enjoy going to Clearwater Beach, that would be an awful place for a motorcycle ride. The best places have rural roads, nice scenery, less traffic, curves, landmarks, or something of interest. People travel to our lunches from many different directions, so you can't always please everyone, but you can try.

Lesson 2: The restaurant needs to be big enough to handle anywhere from 10-20 riders all coming in at about the same time and it is preferred that it would have space where we can sit as a group or at least in the same vicinity. Big enough is more about space available then physical size. We have some locations, like Carol's in Mulberry, that is not physically very big, but they also don't typically have a large crowd on Saturday. They usually have room for us without much problem. I had originally set up the Sept 6th Central brunch ride for the



Koffee Kup in St. Cloud. It has good food, good size, good location and many other great traits for a nice ride location. The problem is that it is very popular and can get very crowded even in the summer. We likely have to stand in the heat waiting on a table and would have been spread all over the place.

Lesson 3: You really need to scout out the location. A place may sound great on the Internet, but all too often you find out that it just won't work for one reason or another. If you can't get there, you can send out an email and ask if anyone has been there, or if they would like to scout it for you. I scouted the Koffee Kup a couple of weeks ago and that prompted me to change to another location.

That's about it. Please drop me an email (<u>boju29@msn.com</u>) if you have a spot to suggest or a current favorite that you would like to make a regular. Please don't get your feelings hurt if we don't pay a visit to your suggestion right away. Sometimes there is a method to the madness of picking our riding locations and we try to spread things out around the riding areas.

If you have an interesting ride location centered on an event or maybe a place to visit that isn't a restaurant, we welcome all suggestions. You might find that it will be a great spot for an informal ride that does not have to fall on one our organized dates.

Enough Is Never Enough

You read about it all the time in the motorcycle magazines. The editors and test riders are always gushing about horsepower. They always want more, more, more. Riders are always bragging about how much horsepower they have in their bike. So the question is: How much is enough? And...what does all this have to do with safety?

My current 2012 <u>BMW R1200GS</u> is OEM-rated at about 110 hp. Before that I was riding a <u>Ducati Multistrada</u> with about 165 hp. "Whoa!" you say. Doesn't that fly in the face of "...more, more, more?"

I had been riding my Multistrada for about a year when I noticed a change in my riding style. The power and handling of the Multistrada had actually changed the way I rode. I was more aggressive in traffic, using the power and handling of the bike to push through traffic and gaps in the vehicles. It took a polite discussion with the local constabulary to get me to realize I was probably overly aggressive in my riding, just because the motorcycle would let me.



"Wait a minute!" you say. "That's your fault." Yep, you're right.

I just don't have the willpower to not ride a bike to its potential. As a result, I gave up the Multistrada for the GS. You know what? I'm much happier on the GS. I don't have to be as focused on the bike with the GS, can relax and my street riding has calmed down more than a little.

(Oh, and I do have my <u>Ducati Hypermotard SP</u> when I feel the need... ①)

So why do we think that more is always better? I'm sure it has something to do with our culture; our consumeroriented society, advertising, etc. We're constantly being told more is better. 165 hp is better than 110 hp. 190+ hp on the <u>BMW S1000RR</u> is better than...well, you get the point.

I'm going to commit heresy here and suggest that perhaps more isn't always better. How much horsepower does it take to accomplish the kind of riding YOU want to experience?

Becky (awesome wife and best friend) recently had the same experience. She had been riding her 2012 R1200R for a couple of years, then jumped on a 2013 Honda NC700X with automatic Dual Clutch Transmission (DCT) that we just purchased. The R1200R has the same 110 horsepower motor as my GS. The NC700X is doing well to just put out 60 horsepower. But Becky discovered she enjoys the NC700X a lot more, for a number of reasons, not the least of which is the DCT. In fact, she's just put her R1200R for sale (email me if you're interested, LOL! [Ed: Check out their ad in this issue.]).

What about you? Have you taken a look at the horsepower under your...uh, seat? Are you riding what you really enjoy, or is it important to have more, more, more? Is your riding being influenced by the seductive lure of power?

Why not take a moment for some introspecting thought into what you're riding?
