Moonshine Lunch Run 2018

My game plan was to leave early Wednesday (April 11th) morning taking I-75 as far as Tifton, Georgia, followed by ALL back roads up to Casey, Illinois, and returning through Tifton back to Lake City Florida. The way back would be somewhat different than the way up as I had some more out-of-the-way curvy/scenic back roads to ride. The only interstate I planned to be on would be I-75 from Lake City to Tifton and Tifton back to Lake City – a total of 210 miles in all.

I wanted to get somewhere around Scottsboro, Alabama or Fayetteville, Tennessee for the night and the next morning take the <u>Cave in the Rock Ferry</u> across the Ohio River to Illinois Hwy 1 northward to follow some back roads over to Casey, Illinois. I would stay there on Friday and for dinner on Friday night, and on Saturday

morning have a Moonburger before leaving about 10 or 11 AM for a two day ride home. I believe this, with some give and take, is what I gathered Jim Park did according to his article in the May 2017 issue of this newsletter.

As with any trip I plan, I have options that I try to do as far as beautiful back roads that are full of curves, hills and scenery. If time and weather permit, I try to do them. I had some excellent ones picked out for day one. I was able to do all three of the ones I had picked out on the first day in Alabama and Tennessee. It was a beautiful day with clear skies and a high of only 68° with no wind to speak of. So I went out of my way to do some "option roads" and ended up in Lewisburg, Tennessee with 608 miles for day one. I found one to be like an extended Deal's Gap and another to be somewhat like a miniature Cherohala Skyway. They were all good.

Day two started out great, but the winds really kicked in around 10 AM. I was still on back roads and enjoying every single mile. While I was still seeing Mom and Pop America, just outside of Marion, Kentucky and 12 miles from the Cave in the Rock Ferry, I passed a sign that says FERRY CLOSED. Well, I can read but I thought that I'll go anyway just to see why. I was also thinking that maybe, just maybe they had forgotten to take down the sign. The sign ended up being correct as you will see by the attached pictures as the Ohio River



was WAY OVER its banks. I had never called as I "assumed" that it would be running but as I parked my bike at the water's edge and looked in the distance, I saw a water tower and a blinking red light which was likely the light on the dock, probably a half a mile away if an inch. I have never seen any flooding like this first hand – always just on the news. It was an unbelievable sight. Even 100 miles north of the Ohio River, there was flooding in many creeks, small rivers and also farm fields – I found it amazing.

At this point I had no idea which would be the shortest way to get across. I turned around for Marion where I met another rider on an FJR at a gas station who had been there four times already and had a way planned

around. So I ended up riding with him. He was from Niceville, Florida over on the gulf near Eglin Airforce Base. He suggested that we ride up through Evansville on US 41 and cross some quite old wooden bridges across the Wabash River to see some other sights that he'd discovered in his travels up to <u>Moonshine</u> over the years. So we did and also ended up stopping to see the old Mug Tree on Hwy 49 as well as at the <u>Moonshine Store</u>.

By this time it was Thursday night and I was at the Day's Inn in Casey which is only 14 miles from the Moonshine Store after 464 miles for the day and 1,072 for the two days. **However**, there was a **huge storm** coming my way. Not only was it coming through Casey on Saturday morning but I would also have it the entire way home to Lake City on Sunday. My first thought was to stay in Casey for the Friday night dinner and the actual function at the

Moonshine Store on Saturday morning before leaving to hole up somewhere on Sunday and arrive home on Monday. But that would not have worked out as I had a doctor's appointment at 7:45 AM in Lake City on Monday that I <u>must make</u> and then on Wednesday I must go to the hospital in Gainesville for what looked like will be two days. (Heart issue)

I had to make a choice and decided to go to the Moonshine Store on Friday morning at about 7:30 for a Moonburger and then head home. It turned out to be the correct decision for me, as the weather I would have encountered anywhere coming home on Sunday was forecasted to be 3-5 inches of rain, winds 15 to 25 with gusts to 40, severe thunderstorms with lighting and even some tornado warnings. After I was safely home on Sunday, I not only checked the status of that storm on the weather channel but experienced it firsthand here in Lake City. I realized it truly was a no-brainer to come home on Saturday. It was as bad as the forecast said it would be.












It turned out very well. When I arrived at the store early Friday, the only other people there were the local farmers – just as you see on Facebook or YouTube. I sat right down with them and we all talked for about a half an hour before I even ordered my Moonburger with cheese. I could not have had a better time being with these locals and also the lady who runs the place. After the locals left, she and I sat and talked for a while. I would have never got to do this on Saturday morning. To me it was special as I like to hear the stories that people have. These folks were so refreshing vs all the BS people we see on the news every



day. In short – I had a <u>GREAT</u> morning. I got one Moonburger with cheese, two T-shirts, two stickers and two fridge magnets and I was on my way at 10 AM.

I took the back roads northeastward to I-70, east to Indianapolis, I-65 down to Louisville, I-64 over to Lexington and I-75 south. I spent the night 10 miles north of Chattanooga which allowed me to get straight through Atlanta on a Saturday morning vs during Friday afternoon rush hour traffic – a world of difference. The only drawback on the trip home was taking all the interstates since I had to make time to beat the storm. However, all in all I had a wonderful trip and would not hesitate to go again. Although this was scheduled to be the last <u>Moonshine Lunch Run</u>, riders will still continue to come on this date. Everyone I talked to said the same thing. The lady who owns the place told me that on any given Saturday during the summer they will serve at least 1,000 Moonburgers if not a few more. She also said that the Labor Day Weekend is like a mini Moonshine Lunch Run. Hint-Hint for all you MSTA members.

I'll leave you with this: We should all be extremely thankful to live in Florida and have the roads we are blessed to have as the winters just beat the roads up north to death. Bump after bump, pothole after pothole and tar-snake after tar-snake. Night and day from down here.

I hope everyone enjoys the story and pictures.

It's Your Path

Right now, Becky and I are in Ohio, working yet another motorcycle event. We took time out for dinner and were sitting at the local chain dining establishment when it happened.

As we were looking out the window at the parking lot, we saw a rider pull in, astride a (Not Further Identified) large, V-twin motorcycle. You could tell he was a new rider. Both feet were paddling at slow speed, he was looking down...all of the signals were there. Then he tried to back his huge "potato-potato" beast uphill into a parking spot. That didn't work for him; go figure. Then he tried going forward, downhill. He almost lost control as he tried to turn at the same time, still looking down at the pavement. Look there long enough and you will go there. He just managed to save it. The drama went on until he managed to get his behemoth parked.

There is a time and a place for everything and every motorcycle. Unfortunately, lots of riders either don't understand the potential consequences of selecting the wrong motorcycle, or at least one that they are either not ready to handle, or physically can't manage.

This doesn't just apply to the new rider, captivated by his purchase of the tool for entry into the bad boy lifestyle. I've witnessed older, much more experienced riders struggling with larger, heavier bikes, just because they have an expectation to meet, either personal or community.



So how do figure out what bike is right for you? I am not about to touch that one, other than to say what the heart wants, it wants. However, there are lots of signs pointing to selecting or riding the wrong motorcycle.

The aforementioned event offers up just some of the signs. Here are some more:

- A If you can't put your bike on its center stand (if it has one), you're on the wrong bike.
- A If come to a stop and are balancing on your tip toes, you're definitely in the wrong dimension.
- lf you've bought your bike because all your friends ride the same kind/brand/size, rather than considering what you really want to ride, you may be riding the wrong steed.
- * If you look longingly at another bike passing you by, and feel your mount is somehow inferior, you probably have not achieved motorcycling self-fulfillment.

So what does all this have to do with safety? It's actually very simple. The wrong bike means you may not be comfortable with it. You may be struggling to maintain control. The motorcycle may have performance parameters you are either not comfortable with, or are even scared to experience. This list again goes on.

No one should tell you what you should ride. Sometimes bigger is not better. Sometimes simpler is more enjoyable. You need to assess your own skills and riding desires, not just join the crowd.

Motorcycling is about being one with the bike and the path. If someone else wants to come along, that's fine, but it's your journey.

Choose wisely.



Member Comment

Rich Peabody submitted the following email to the newsletter in hopes of locating others who might know a thing or two about the event mentioned and any subsequent developments.

Pics from the time that we rode from Cleveland to New Orleans....I promoted it in my newsletter and seven from the store participated, including me. Frank and I rode 1,076 miles in 16 hours, 13 minutes....



The group, Forest City Riders, was from Illinois and had a process whereby we signed out and in to certify. Referred to as an "Iron Butt" ride...

As far as I can determine, there was no "Iron Butt" association then.

My friend Gary Patterson, owner of Montgomeryville Cycle Center in PA was real interested (always read my newsletter, and wanted me to work for him). Gary and I got together over the winter and outlined a ride sponsored by his store, and he named the event "Iron Butt". We plotted a triangle course and he staffed two places (24 hour diners) to hand out verification. He promoted the event heavily (radio and TV even) and drew around FIFTY entries! Great fun! Almost half dropped out (none of my group that started dropped out....in fact, all made the 1,000 miles in 24 hours!). Gary made it an annual event and it drew about 50



riders in 1984, but the finishing percentage rose. Sadly, Gary was charged with some sort of criminal activity and forced to sell the place and most of his nifty promotional activities were curtailed by the new owners.

Today there is an Iron Butt web site and "official" organization....and there are a BUNCH of rides. There is even a "history" section with records back to 1984. I have seen a bike that regularly participates in these long distance rides: besides an extra fuel tank, the forward view resembles a 747 cockpit. Three GPS units, two phones, front and rear radar detectors and time-distance computer. We did it with maps and Frank and I got a bit lost in New Orleans....

I am curious if Gary coined the phrase "Iron Butt"? The Forest City Riders appear to have morphed into an off road/dual sport club, sponsoring no street rides.

Of the guys pictured, Frank is still with us, but hasn't ridden for 20 years or so, Joe Pallotto still has the same Rickman and is riding still. I have lost track of the others and I'm happy as if I had sense with my ST-1100....

If anyone can provide further history on Iron Butt stuff, I would appreciate it.
