Travel Planning

[Ed: As the summer touring season kicks off, Jim requested that we republish his article from the June 2015 edition of the newsletter.]

It's that time of year again. The ice and snow have gone away up north, the trees and plants are starting to green and kids are getting out of schools for their summer break. In other words, it's time to ride!

Pre-planning is key to a great road trip. Granted, some of the best rides have been when you were lost, but spending a couple of weeks "lost" will get old real fast and you may miss the good stuff. Knowing in advance where the great roads and sights along the way are located will greatly enhance any road trip, especially if you have

limited time.

I always carry State Highway maps with me while on the road. However, I use my GPS and related software to plan my rides and to navigate my route. My personal choice for a GPS unit is *Garmin* and their related *BaseCamp* software but note that this is an expanding market and there are several choices available to the consumer.

I usually begin my planning by going to the Internet for nearly all of my information. I start with State Department of Tourism sites. Most States provide a wealth of information at no charge in either a digital format or better yet, maps and brochures can be mailed directly to you. Note that it may take up to six weeks to receive this information in the mail from some States, so order early!

The next step in the planning stage is the nitty-gritty stuff; the twisty roads, the State and National Parks or even the unusual or weird stuff along the way. I have accumulated several sites that work as a planning tool to aid and enhance your trip.

Let's start with roads. Most of us know about the Blue Ridge Parkway, Natchez Trace or the Skyline Drive but there's a lot more, less-traveled highways out there. A good source for those off the beaten path roads are rider's forums. Sites like our own <u>ridemsta.com/mstaforums</u> will have members that have a wealth of information on local back roads. More often than not, they will email you their favorite routes in a GPS file format so you can simply incorporate the route into your trip. Also, if you subscribe to *RoadRunner Motorcycle Touring & Travel* magazine (<u>roadrunner.travel</u>) you can download the GPS & printed routes of their monthly articles. Here are but a few sites to consider when you are doing your route research:

Although our National and State Parks are getting loved to death and often over crowded, it is still worth the time to make them a part of your trip. These are a few of the sites that I reference for maps, food and accommodations within the parks:

Then there's the part of your trip where you see the unusual or even weird stuff. Usually you just stumble upon things like the "world's largest ball of twine" but there are actually books and websites that will give you the details on these sights. So if you are into the weird, here you go:

I sometimes pick up a travel book that tweaks my interest. I tend to stay away from those books that tackle the "best roads" for the entire country as they tend to leave out details and side trips that the regional travel books include. Here is a recommended list of just a few:

There is virtually an infinite amount of information available today for planning that perfect road trip. There are books and Internet sites that not only list such things as lighthouses, caves or wineries but also provide detailed directions and/or GPS coordinates. Bottom line is to do your homework before you travel and make the most out of your trip.

Statistics for Mature Riders

The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (*iihs.org*) just published its accident statistics for 2016, and there are some interesting, and ugly numbers in it for some motorcyclists.

You can find a lot of data in the statistical charts, but here is one set that really caught my attention...

In 2006 (10 years ago by the data), the largest group of motorcyclists, by age group, involved in crashes was the 29 and under category, comprising 32% of all incidents. The over 50 and over category comprised 24%. In 2016 those percentages have reversed themselves. The 29 and under

category is no longer the largest percentage of crashed riders. They now comprise 29% of the total, while the 50 and above age category is 36%. So what does that tell us?

Well, we know that motorcyclists in general are an aging demographic. No one knows that better than the OEMs, who are in a current effort to attract younger riders into the sport.

However, could there be other factors as well. We could argue that older riders shouldn't be as overly represented in the statistics, since theoretically they have more experience and could also be expected to exercise more mature judgement and caution. But is that the case?

Mature riders often comment that they don't take the chances on two wheels that they did in their youth. I'm going to dispute that, at least a little. I've seen some older riders doing some brave, bold and even stupid stuff on their bikes. Could it be a case of the motorcycle being an outlet for aging riders attempting to recapture their youth?

Another thought is one of attention and reflexive response. Well established facts say that as we age, our attention focus can diminish, and our reflexive response time can increase. If we continue to ride at the pace and level we did when we were in our 30s, are we leaving enough response and recovery time when things start to go bad?

Endurance is another issue. I didn't do my first Iron Butt ride until I was in my 40s, but I had the stamina to pull it off. Now that I'm older than that (by more than a little), I find that my endurance on two wheels has fallen off. A 500-mile day is about the most I want to take in on a regular basis.

As older riders, we have to consider what time does to us, our mental and physical capabilities. While we may not want to admit we're slowing down a little, reality can be a hard slap, particularly if it involves an impact on pavement.

All mature riders (and yes, I'm including myself) should take a good hard look inward, with regards to our riding activities. We need to ask ourselves are we pushing too hard? Is it time to adjust our riding, maybe just a little? Is that 800+ lb. motorcycle still right for me? You know the questions...

Maybe by asking these and heeding honest replies, more mature riders can increase their safety and extend their riding enjoyment long into the future.

Central Director's Report - June 2018

Don't let a bad forecast deprive you of having a great day!

Mother Nature had been showing signs of cooperation all week long with a dry, sunny day expected Saturday and rain holding off until Sunday. I was eagerly anticipating a nice two-and-a-half-hour ride to <u>Lake Harris Hideaway</u> in Tavares using some of the best roadways central Florida has to offer. But Friday evening's

report moved the 60% chance of showers ahead to Saturday, with more to come Sunday. Nuts. Here we go again!

Part of me wanted to send an e-mail to everyone right then and there stating I was pulling out. And then I could lazily sleep in Saturday morning. But I've sworn not to do that. Besides, it occurred to me that conditions would probably be just fine for riders coming in from other areas. Folks would show up. And besides, it was just showers. I've been rained on before. Okay, I'll take another look in the morning.

The early Saturday TV forecaster talked about off shore showers working east-to-west with the greatest impact being to the central east coast (where I live). My weather app's radar wasn't showing anything eminent. The hourly forecasts for various locations along intended routes were showing rain chances at 0% until midafternoon or later. Worst case, then, was getting a little wet on the way home. I'm good with that.

Lifetime member Doug met me at the rendezvous place near Melbourne and we headed west taking Hickory Tree Rd - with its half-dozen or so **really** nice sweepers - and other backroads into not yet congested Kissimmee. After a brief break, we pressed onward through Champion's Gate and across curvy Deen Still Rd to Hwy 33. This time we didn't get stuck behind slow traffic so Deen Still was great fun. Same for 33. In Groveland we turned north again on Villa City Rd, with its really enjoyable curves, undulating terrain and ultrapleasant scenery, to Hwy 27. That got us quickly to Hwy 19 and then onto Lane Park Rd to our destination. All

in all, it was a very satisfying morning's ride.

Eleven riders showed up, which. under the circumstances, was gratifying. The place was just getting going so we pulled enough tables together to make one long one that we could all sit around together.
