The North Georgia Classic in Helen What to Expect - Places to Go By Tom Blake

[Ed: Although this article previously appeared in the 4/2017 edition of this newsletter, the content may encourage our readers to attend the North Georgia Classic Just-For-Fun event this year. Photos and maps by author except as noted. Updated by author.]

The NGC is coming up April 26th thru 28th. There's no registration. You don't even need to be an MSTA member. It's one of the best Friday-thru-Sunday get-togethers going in one of the best riding areas in the southeast. I encourage you to go. You can even take non-MSTA friends along. Here's a link to the event posting with all the pertinent information on the MSTA's Southeast Region website: msta-se.com/helen/

I typically arrive late on Thursday afternoon, a day ahead of the

rally's start. By dinner time, several more eager riders have pulled in. Motorcycling stories ensue in the parking lot and several of us decide to walk the short distance downtown for some good German or Mexican food and a libation or three. The next morning by 8:30 or 9:00 the temperature is up to a reasonable 50F and those undulating and curvaceous mountain roadways are beckoning.







Unlike in Florida, there are excellent ride options in almost every direction. But, given the short duration of the event, I've whittled down a long list of possibilities to what I consider the top tier of rides to recommend along with some to and from options. I admit that I can be a bit of an adrenaline junky at times and each of these rides can feed that addiction. But they can be equally enjoyable at whatever pace you feel comfortable with.

My list includes 1) <u>Wayah Rd</u> to the Nantahala Gorge and lunch at the <u>River's End Restaurant</u> at the <u>Nantahala Outdoor Center</u> (NOC); 2) the <u>Cherohala Skyway</u>; 3) <u>Tail of the Dragon</u>; 4) US 60 between Morganton and Suches; 5) <u>GA 180</u>; 6) US 129 over <u>Blood Mountain</u>; and 7) the <u>Richard B. Russell Scenic Highway</u>.

NOC via Wayah Rd. Always at the top of my list is lunch at the Nantahala Outdoor Center in NC and going by way of Wayah Rd promises a good challenge. I like to include US 76 over to Clayton early on. It's curvy but not overly challenging. It's a good road to begin re-adjusting your mind and muscle memory on for mountain riding... getting the *rhythm* of the mountains at moderate speed. The quickest way to 76 is to take GA 17 north over the mountain from Helen. It's plenty twisty and steep with its share of tar snakes so you may want to take it easy the first time over. A more laid back alternative is to turn right on GA 356 from just north of Helen. Ride past <u>Unicoi State Park</u> and go left on GA 197 past picturesque <u>Lake Burton</u> to 76.

Either way, I begin thinking about safe corner entry speed and lane position, pondering what the optimum track through the corner to the exit should be and trying to hit it precisely, keeping the engine in its power band and applying throttle and braking inputs smoothly. It's an iterative process of mistakes and refinement that continues the whole time I'm up there. It's all about technique and precision, not outright speed.

At Clayton, turn north on US 23/441 toward Franklin, NC and then take US 64 west. Wayah Rd heads north from US 64 about 4 miles west of 441. The road meanders past an LBJ Jobs Corp campus then climbs steeply up the mountain before descending past very picturesque Nantahala Lake and onward to US 19/74 in the Nantahala Gorge. Take 19 east about 8 miles along the river to the NOC. Estimate about 3 hours plus breaks for the whole journey.

Wayah is a good workout with plenty of second gear switchbacks, dips, climbs and twists. Downstream of the lake, it also has some abrupt turns onto bridges that come into view

suddenly – not a time to be carrying too much speed. And not all the pavement is in the greatest condition. It's not, by any means, a dangerous ride but it is prudent to ride a bit conservatively and stay alert. By contrast, the ride along the Nantahala River in the gorge is utterly relaxing as you meander along the river's rapids.

The Nantahala Outdoor Center's setting is picturesque and inviting. In fact, this is one of my favorite places in the world. I never miss a chance to stop. After a hearty and warming lunch at the River's End Restaurant overlooking the river, I usually pop in next door to the well-stocked outdoor gear and apparel store for a quick look-see. Then walk over the foot bridge and down by the water to soak in a bit of the place's tranquility. There are often kayakers practicing their skills in the rapids below the bridge.

The river is usually teeming with white-water rafters, especially during summer months.



That done, some may want to head for the Cherohala Skyway. This is one of the most exhilarating rides in the eastern US. To get there, point your bike west on 19 and as you come up out of the gorge, turn right on US 129 and head for Robbinsville. Just a little north of town, turn west on NC 143 and you will soon be on the Skyway.

The Robbinsville end of 143 is very technical. But then it opens up and allows you to build good speed as you ascend the mountain. Depending upon conditions, you may ride up into a cloud and then come out into clear skies near the summit.

The route number changes to TN 165 as you descend into Tellico Plains. From Robbinsville to Tellico plains there is close to 50 miles of superb tarmac and stunning views.

There are numerous pull outs for great views although, truthfully, you may be having too much fun to stop. In Tellico Plains, take a break and gas up, if necessary, at either of the convenience stores. Other smiling riders are usually there and anxious to share stories.

You have options for leaving (or getting to) Tellico




Plains. One is the Skyway, of course. A second is to head south on 68 and then GA 60 – perhaps all the way through Suches, GA via Copperhill and Morganton (described below). Or a third is to take 68 to TN 123 which becomes GA 294, and that takes you to US 64 west of Murphy. The latter is a lot of fun.



A fourth is to go north and east through the Tail of the Dragon and then back south on US 28. Stay away from the Dragon on weekends – it's way too crowded. And now, the sports car folks are spending their weekends out there and don't seem to mind crossing centerline in blind curves. It is also heavily patrolled on weekends.

For the Dragon, head east on TN 165 about a mile. Turn north on TN 360 which squiggles along the west side of Tellico Lake to US 411. Turn right on 411 for just under three miles to TN 72. Turn southeast on 72 which roughly follows the eastern side of Tellico Lake until you T-bone into US 129. All very pleasant. Turn

right on 129 as it meanders along the north side of Chilhowee Lake and then the southwest edge of the <u>Great Smokey Mountain National Park</u>. The climax is the Tail of the Dragon's 318 curves in 11 miles to <u>Deal's Gap</u>. The climax, literally, is the Tail of the Dragon's 318 curves in 11 miles to Deal's Gap. Lots of puckering, braking, looking over your shoulder to see where the road goes, cornering and accelerating! And roadside picture takers are out for a buck.

After the obligatory stop and perhaps food or fuel at Deal's Gap, turn east on US 28. You will find 28 to have all you could want in a mountain highway. Follow it across Fontana Dam and all the way to US 19/74. Just keep an eye out for the Swain County deputy. Turn east on 19 about 4 miles and then south on 28 again at the gas station. Below the gas station, it becomes extremely (but pleasantly) gnarly for a ways and finally comes into Franklin, NC where you can hop on US23/441 south into GA. Or take US 64 west and then south on Hwy 175 to Hiawassee. Estimate 3 hours plus break time.

GA 60 between Morganton and Suches is an experience you just don't want to miss. The road surface is good, and you can carry good speed. I love this road! It is exciting from end to end. The northern section nearer Morganton has some excellent higher speed sweepers. The center area meanders through pictorial meadows and farmland. In the mountain approaching Suches things tighten up. It has everything and is on my 'to do' list <u>every</u> time I'm in the area. In fact, it's so much fun that I usually ride it multiple times.

There is one decreasing radius curve to warn you about. It's a right-hander if you're heading north, with a side road joining it mid-curve from the west. It's about two-thirds of the way up from Suches. I was carrying good speed through that sucker one day when a pickup heading south popped into view mid-curve. Fortunately, the



pickup stayed in its lane. I was so focused on my line that I didn't flinch and to accommodate the tightening curve, I had the presence of mind to lean even further over by pressing on the right handgrip. Close!

Suches is most notably known to motorcyclists as the location of the Two Wheels Only (TWO) campground and the western terminus of GA 180. *Two Wheels of Suches* is the rebirth of TWO under new ownership. The entrance and main parking area are now concrete. Inside (M & F dinners, all meals on weekends), the café is clean and uncluttered. The coffee and food are good. Outside, the property is clean and nicely manicured and has cabins and camping spaces. There's usually a crowd of motorcyclists around -

either camping, eating or just sitting on the porch taking a break and enjoying the mountain air. Gas is available at the convenience store across the street.

From Suches, you can head south on 60 to US 19, take GA 180 east (see below) or turn around and go back toward Morganton. South of Suches, 60 is an entertaining road - a paradise of twists and turns. The views off the mountain are spectacular if you are of a mind to peak. Then turn left on 19 to 129 and attack Blood Mountain (also below) or to head to Helen by way of Cleveland. Or go right to Dahlonega, a small college town with a gold mining past and a variety of interesting shops and eateries in the town square.

GA 180 is another good ride. It's called Wolf Pen Gap Rd between Suches and US 129 adjacent Vogel State Park. The section near Vogel is steep and gnarly

and will demand your attention. Then turn north for a couple miles on 129 and east again on 180. You can follow the eastern section past the 180 Spur, all the way to US 17 south of Hiawassee (north of Helen).

Brasstown Bald is the highest point in GA and the visitor center can be accessed via the very steep and squiggly 180 Spur to the north. There's an observation tower at the summit with great views outside and local history exhibits inside. It's said that on a clear day you can see Atlanta from up there.

US 129 over Blood Mountain is great fun. It's steep and curvy including numerous lower gear switchbacks. On weekends, there's always a crowd of motorcyclists on it so it's also patrolled. Up at the summit, the Appalachian (hiking) Trail (remember A Walk in the Woods with Redman and Nolte) crosses 129 running right through Neel's Gap Store. The store has a good selection hiking gear and apparel and other interesting goods. The tree in front, amusingly, has hundreds of discarded hiking boots dangling by their laces from its limbs. There's usually a crowd of friendly hikers around as well as riders catching their breath. And, if nothing else, you can just take a break, enjoy the mountain air and listen to bikes speeding up to the top. Access Blood Mountain on the north end from Blairsville or from GA 180 where it intersects 129. From the south come through Dahlonega, with its gold mining history, Cleveland or Suches.



Now finally, the icing on the riding cake — the <u>Richard B. Russel Scenic Highway</u>, aka GA 348 It is just thrilling! While only about 14 miles long, it's the perfect exclamation point to a great day of mountain riding. I prefer to run it west to east because the eastern descent out of the mountain has an excellent road surface and is just an incredible succession of fast sweepers. Access it south of Blairsville from GA 180 about a mile east of US 129. It terminates at GA 75 ALT just west of Helen.

I do live to challenge curves. But for me, it's all about technique, concentration, precision and smoothness - not reckless speed.

Be aware: All these roads are also a bonanza to fitness-minded bicyclists. Be prepared to meet them anywhere including mid-turn.

So back in *Alpine* Helen now... it's time to get to the hotel, put the bike to bed, change into street clothes and begin the tall tales in the parking lot. Continue with friends through dinner at a nice restaurant in town

and wash it all down with your favorite elixirs. Then it's back to the hotel for more camaraderie. And finally, to bed.

Next morning... ready to ride, you may get invited to ride along in a small group or vice versa. Some of our riders are real hotdogs, others not so much. Try to match yourself to folks who ride at a pace that's in your comfort zone. Or, select your own new route or combination of routes and get going. If you get into a group that rides faster than you feel comfortable with – back off and let them know you are going to go off on your own. This is supposed to be fun.

Final notes... if you are a fan of mountain riding, that general area is arguably the best place to ride in the southeastern US. April is the perfect time of year to be there if you don't mind that the vegetation hasn't greened up yet. Winter temperatures are moderating but still cool. It's too early yet for the crowds that make driving through towns impossible and out on the highways maddening. Helen is a small community, so

walking to and from a variety of decent restaurants, watering holes and other attractions is easy.

The only downside is that April can also be unpredictable weather-wise. 2016, 2017 and 2018 were perfect – no rain, no fog, cool mornings, lower 70's by afternoon. 2015 was just a little cooler daytime due to overcast. Rain threatened but did not impact riding. It was a last-minute decision on my part not to cancel the room that year. And it was a good decision because we had a great time. My recommendation is to book early (just make sure you can cancel, if necessary) and keep an eye on the forecasts. Don't forget, forecasts do change as the target dates get closer. So, don't panic and cancel too early.

Officially, the event runs Friday thru Sunday. For me though, it's about an 11-hour slog up and back. I love mountains and mountain riding and want to make the most of it. So, I prefer going up Wednesday or Thursday and coming home Monday or Tuesday. But whatever works for you. I'm looking forward to the 2019 NGC. Hope to see **you** there this year, too.

Surviving the Roundabout

Some people call it a traffic circle, although technically the two have slightly different characteristics. Whatever you want to call it, they are becoming more prevalent in U.S. road planning every year. There is a good reason for this increase. Statistically, roundabouts are more efficient than either 2-way or 4-way stop intersections. They move traffic faster and are safer. They actually reduce types of crashes involving serious injury or death by 78-82% (Source: AASHTO Highway Safety Manual). Common sense tells us why. If there is a crash in a roundabout, it usually happens at slower speeds and with lesser angular impacts. Pretty simple physics.



Regardless of size, shape (there are oval, teardrop, peanut-shaped roundabouts, as well as some other oddities out there), roundabouts all have three characteristics, at least here in the U.S.:

- 1. Counterclockwise flow around a center island or marker.
- 2. Entry Yield Control: Vehicles entering the roundabout must yield to traffic already circulating.
- 3. Low Speed: Roundabout curvature results in lower vehicle speeds, usually 10-25 mph.

Roundabouts do offer different types of safety challenges to motorcyclists, among them:

- A Drivers not seeing the motorcyclist trying to enter or already in the roundabout. Not a big surprise...
- **a** Drivers changing lanes in a roundabout, in preparation to exit the circulation.
- Drivers simply not knowing what to do in a roundabout, including entry protocol, lane positioning, exiting, etc.

So how do you survive the roundabout on two (or three) wheels? Here are 3 simple rules to follow:

- 1. Always assume traffic in circulation, or about to enter the roundabout does not see you.
- 2. Always assume traffic in the roundabout is going to unexpectedly change lanes.
- 3. Always assume drivers don't have a clue as to how to navigate a roundabout.

This last one is really important. We don't have a lot of roundabouts in Florida. Combine that with our aging driver demographic, foreign drivers, tourists, etc. and you get a potentially dangerous riding situation.

In short, whenever you come upon a roundabout in your riding adventures, take the time to slow down and look at all the traffic in and around the roundabout, before entering the counterclockwise circle of vehicular chaos. Look for confused drivers, vehicles getting ready to change lanes, and even drivers in the circulation who will stop for other cars to enter, though that is the exact opposite of the traffic rules!

Roundabouts can be fun, but they need to be carefully analyzed as you ride them!
