Riding the Auto Train By Doug Westly

If you live in the southeast U.S. and have never ridden the Auto Train, you are missing out. The <u>Amtrak Auto Train</u> runs non-stop between Sanford FL and Lorton VA. An overnight train that carries passengers as well as their cars and motorcycles, the Auto Train is a great way to avoid the riding horrors and/or boredom of I-95 or I-75.

The Sanford/Lorton (and reverse run) Auto Train is the only passenger/car carrying train in the U.S. Starting either in Sanford, just to the east of Orlando, or in Lorton, just south of Washington DC, the half-mile long train leaves at 5 pm and arrives at its destination around 10 am the next morning. Amtrak uses

and unloaded at the other. While the cars (and motorcycles) ride in the car carriers overnight, passengers can choose from a range of accommodations, from standard upright (and fairly roomy) airline-style seats, to full private cabins. The cabins are complete with their own toilet/shower facilities, a

specially-designed car carriers to transport the passengers' cars, loaded by the Amtrak yard workers at one end

cabins. The cabins are complete with their own toilet/shower facilities, a roomy couch which converts to a bed for the night and a second overhead bunk, a separate airline style chair, as well as a sink and some minimal storage space.

To use the Auto Train, you simply go on the <u>Amtrak website</u>, select date(s) of travel (you can go one-way or round trip), indicated number of passengers, pick your choice of accommodations, indicate you are bringing a motorcycle(s) and buy your tickets. Make sure you read all the rules for bringing on your motorcycle. By the way, 3-wheelers are not allowed.

On travel day, vehicle check-in and loading starts at 12:30 pm and goes until 3 pm. All vehicles must be checked in by 3 pm. The Auto Train staff is usually very accommodating to motorcyclists, allowing them to bypass the car check-in line and go straight to the motorcycle loading area. There you show your ticket, which has your motorcycle listed on it, and ride your bike up onto a loading ramp, where a specially-designed trolly is waiting. You ride your bike onto the trolly where you hold it while Amtrak staff strap it down. Then you get off the bike, grab your overnight bag, and head into the station to check-in and wait for boarding. It really is that easy.



At the destination, you get your riding gear back on, hop off the train and head over to the motorcycle unloading area. The motorcycles are brought out on their trolly cars and pushed up to the loading dock. When it's your turn, you get back on your bike as they unstrap it, and then they push you off the trolly back onto the loading dock. After that, it is all up to you.

We've done the Auto Train on a few occasions. As we live in Florida, it's a great way to travel in comfort overnight to VA, get the bikes off in Lorton, ride over to the <u>Blue Ridge Parkway (BRP)</u> which is only a couple of riding hours from the train station, and enjoy a couple of days riding back south on the BRP and backroads. As seasoned Auto Train travelers, we would like to offer a few tips...

First and most important, spring for the private cabin. Not the regular coach seats, or even the "roomette", as the latter does not have a private toilet/shower. The private cabin gives you complete privacy and a full toilet/shower, comes with complimentary dinner service in the dining car, bed turn-down service at the time of your choice, and a good night's sleep. You also get complimentary breakfast in the morning, during which time your room is made up. The room has a large couch that folds down into a bed, a 2nd smaller bunk above it, and an airline-style seat alongside the window. All of that, along with a shower after the ride to the station as well as another first thing in the morning and being refreshed for the ride makes the extra cost for the cabin well worth the price. The private cabins are all on the upper level of the cars, so you are also away from the track noise and get a great view of the passing countryside.

Get to the station and check in early. You will have to wait a couple of hours until boarding, but it's worth it. That lets you choose the dinner time of your choice, since there are at least a couple of seating times for evening dining. By the way, the dinner meal is usually very good and complete with salad, drink, entree, dessert and a complimentary glass of wine. Becky had salmon, and I had a really good steak on our last trip. As another unique offering on the Sanford end, the city offers a free shuttle ride to/from downtown historic Sanford, if you want to go hangout there for an hour or two before boarding.

Pack an overnight bag you can easily access on the bike, so you don't have to go shuffling clothes around. Also, bring some warm room clothes, as the train car air conditioning is usually fairly cool. The more you can leave on the bike, the better. Even the private cabins have only minimal storage space. We usually use one larger bag to stuff our riding gear in, leave our hel-mets in the bikes and carry a small overnight bag for casual clothes on the train.

Bring snacks and reading material, or your iPad/tablet to watch a movie, etc. You can buy some drinks and snacks in the bar/dining car, but the selection is limited. Other than piped-in music on the train, there is no other entertainment. The train does have WiFi, and since you're traveling on the ground, you almost always have an internet/phone connection as well.

The train will slow down and stop occasionally as it makes its overnight trip, once to change crews and at times to avoid other rail traffic. You do have to get used to that while sleeping, although we usually don't even wake up for it.

You also get to sit by the big picture window and look down at the passing scenery as you kick back and relax, avoiding all the hassle of the interstate and crazy driving. The Auto Train can't be beat. Now, if they only had one that ran from the East Coast to Denver, so we could avoid that whole Kansas/Nebraska/Oklahoma ride...

Do Smarter Bikes = Dumber Riders? By Doug Westly

There has been a debate in racing venues for some time on the electronic / mechanical aids now being utilized on race bikes. The basic discussion is whether or not the use of advanced motorcycle technology actually substitutes for rider skill. Maybe, we should take a look at this from the average rider perspective...



Over the past 35 years, motorcycling has seen tremendous advancements in systems designed primarily to enhance rider safety. Starting in 1988, when BMW introduced the first Anti-Lock Brake System (ABS), and up to today, where we see advancements like Lean-angle ABS (L-ABS), traction control, wheelie control, electronic suspension, ride modes, and now even rear-wheel slide control, the sport has steadily applied more and more technology to riding. However, with this increase in technology application, are riders starting to depend on these safety and ride systems as a substitute for their own skills, and (another thought) is this even possibly changing how we ride?

So, are we starting to depend on these systems too much? After a lot of thought, and discussions with several industry professional riders, here are a couple of examples:

ABS - ABS was initially designed as, and still remains, almost exclusively a safety system. It only activates once the system detects a wheel lock-up or pending lock-up. In other words, in poor traction conditions or when the rider otherwise requires emergency braking, ABS is there to ensure traction between the tires and riding surface are maintained. Even this probably influences our riding skills to some degree, as how many average riders go out and practice threshold braking anyway? Even those that used to practice the technique probably don't anymore, once they start riding an ABS-equipped bike. When was the last time you practiced threshold braking?

L-ABS - Lean-angle ABS has been an outgrowth of further electronic advancements in motorcycling, as high-end motorcycles now typically utilize a 5- or 6-axis electronic measuring unit (EMU) to detect acceleration/braking, lean angle, etc. By doing this, they can adjust the amount of ABS (and even normal) braking force while the bike is leaned over, forcing sharing of traction. So, knowing this, would riders deliberately run faster into corners, relying on the L-ABS to keep them out of trouble if they have to apply later or more braking force? How many riders know about and/or practice trail braking?

We can go on and on. Does wheelie control really have a place in street riding? Does it simply encourage more aggressive riding behavior? Traction control is a great system, particularly in rain or other minimal traction conditions, but does it mean we're going to be less cautious on rain-soaked roads? Does electronic suspension allow us to start tackling obstacles that are at (or past) the limit of our skill set, and hope the system can compensate for any (possibly fatal) errors?

The bottom line is that advancements in riding technology have provided enhanced experiences in motorcycling, as well as offer additional safety margin in extreme or emergency riding situations. Knowing what these systems really do and are able to provide a rider, given specific riding conditions, is key to utilizing them properly. Simply knowing the system(s) exists on your bike and expect it to get you out of a jam is probably not a smart way to approach riding. Using them to become even more aggressive with riding behavior probably isn't the best approach to rider longevity. Riders need to SAFELY learn what their bikes are capable of doing with these systems, and ensure advanced motorcycle electronic/mechanical systems don't become a substitute for prudent, capable riding.
