Community BBQ

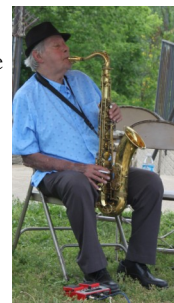


On June 15, community members came together at the community building to enjoy a meal of hamburgers and hotdogs and a ton of side dishes brought from those who attended.

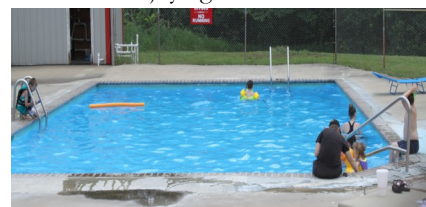
The band, Bouncy House played a variety of music from the 60's and 70's that had the crowd tapping their toes and singing along.

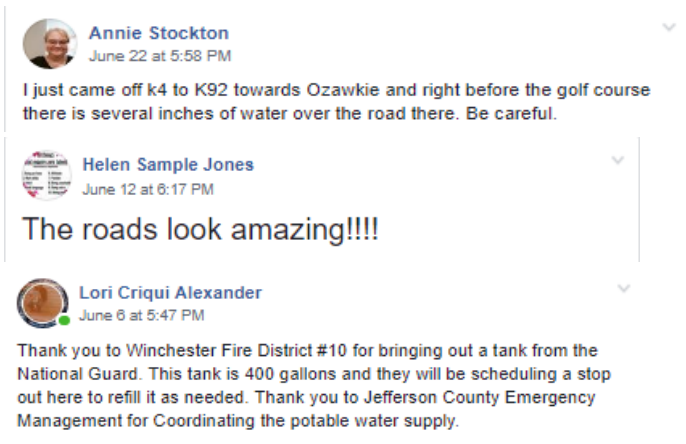


Photo Challenge
