φιλαλήθης

The Greek word φιλαλήθης (pronounced "fill-a-LAY-thayss") was used by ancient writers such as Aristotle and Plutarch, and means "a lover of truth."

One of the early uses of the word was as part of a nom de plume of Eirenaeus Philalethes (the peaceful lover of truth) who was a 17th-century alchemist and the author of many influential works.

The word came into Masonic circles through alchemical mystic Robert Samber (1682–1745), who used the pseudonym Eugenius Philalethes; Samber's use, in turn, was an homage to Thomas Vaughan, an earlier alchemist who had used the same name.

Finally, a Rite of Philaléthes was founded in Paris in 1772, devoted to the study of esotericism.

Founding President Cyrus Field Willard wrote in 1936 that the Philalethes Society took its name from the Parisian Philaléthes.

The 2024 Arizona Masonic Code (AMC)

Submitted by Worshipful Brother Ray Brigandi, Secretary of Phoenicia Lodge No. 58

The AMC is composed of the Constitution and Statutes of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Arizona - Including Amendments adopted June 2024

134 pages comprise the "AMC proper" that is the Constitutions, and the Statutes combined.

151 pages if you include the Reception of the Grand Master and the Installation Ceremony of the Constituent Lodge Officers.

What is the difference between Constitution and Statute?

Understanding the Difference Between Statute and Constitution in Legal Systems

In the realm of law, two fundamental pillars govern our legal systems – statutes and constitutions. While both play a crucial role in shaping our laws, they differ significantly in their scope and impact.

Statutes:

- Statutes are laws enacted by legislatures at the federal, state, or local level. They are specific rules and regulations that dictate how individuals and entities should behave in society.
- Statutes are created to address particular issues or regulate specific activities. They can be amended or repealed by the same legislative body that enacted them.
- Statutes are essential for addressing the ever-evolving needs of society and ensuring that laws remain relevant and up to date.

Constitutions:

- Constitutions, on the other hand, serve as the supreme law of the land. They establish the framework for government, delineate the powers of various branches, and enshrine fundamental rights and freedoms.
- Constitutions are not easily amended and typically require a more rigorous process than statutes. They serve as a foundation for all other laws and government actions.
- Constitutions are designed to provide a strong and enduring structure for governance, ensuring stability and protecting individual liberties.

Key Differences:

- Statutes are specific laws created by legislatures to address particular issues, while constitutions are foundational documents that establish the framework for governance.
- Statutes can be amended or repealed relatively easily by the same legislative body, whereas constitutions have a more stringent amendment process.

- Statutes focus on addressing immediate needs and regulating specific activities, while constitutions provide a long-term framework for government and protect fundamental rights.

In essence, statutes are like detailed instructions for specific tasks, while constitutions serve as the guiding principles for the entire legal system. Both are essential components of our legal landscape, working in tandem to uphold justice and maintain order in society.

Here is how the laws or Masonic code can be changed and other interesting parts of our legislation.

Proposed legislative changes - Amendments, Quorum, Committees of the Grand Lodge, Reporting, Fiscal Year and Reading of Annual Reports

10-1.2 Notice of Amendments.

The Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge shall send a copy of all proposed amendments that are in proper form for consideration at the Annual Communication to the members of the Jurisprudence Committee, the members of the Committee on General Policy, each Grand Lodge officer, each Past Grand Elective Officer and the Secretary of each Lodge, at least sixty (60) days before said Annual Communication. The Secretary of each Lodge shall read the synopsis only of said proposed amendment at the next stated meeting of his Lodge following receipt thereof and ensure that a complete text of the proposed amendment is available to any interested member.

§10-1.4.2 Amendments to Constitution. For amendments to this Constitution, upon the report of said committees, if five-sixths of the votes cast shall be in favor of such proposed amendment, it shall be declared adopted and, from and after the close of the Communication, it shall become part of the Constitution. If the vote in favor of such proposed amendment be less than five-sixths, but there be a majority therefore, it shall lie over for one year and shall be published with the proceedings, under the caption of "Proposed Amendment to the Constitution"; and if, at the next succeeding Annual Communication, it shall receive two-thirds of the votes cast, it shall be declared adopted, and from and after the close of that Communication, it shall become a part of the Constitution.

§10-1.4.3 Amendments to Statute. For amendments to the Statutes, upon the report of said committees, if two-thirds of the votes cast shall be in favor of such proposed amendment, it shall be declared adopted and, from and after the close of the Communication, it shall become part of the Statutes. If the vote in favor of such proposed amendment be less than two-thirds, but there be a majority therefore, it shall lie over for one year and shall be published with the Proceedings, under the

caption of "Proposed Amendment to the Statutes"; and if, at the next succeeding Annual Communication, it shall receive two-thirds of the votes cast, it shall be declared adopted, and from and after the close of that Communication, it shall become a part of the Statutes.

Section 15-501 - Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of this Grand Lodge shall begin with the first day of July of each year and end with the last day of June of the next succeeding year. The budget period shall be coterminous with the fiscal year, and the reports of all officers and the report of the Trustees, submitted at each Annual Communication, shall cover the fiscal year.

Chapter 16 – Committees of the Grand Lodge Section 16-101 - Standing Committees. The following standing Committees shall be appointed by the Grand Master at each Annual Communication just before its close, viz: on Jurisprudence, which Committee shall consist of five members; on Grievances, on Fraternal Correspondence, on Returns, on Finances, and on Charters and By-Laws, which Committees shall consist of three Members each; on Credentials, on Masonic Education and Service, and a Ritual Review Committee, to consist of a minimum of three Members; and a Committee on General Policy to consist of five members, to which shall be referred all matters of Policy or matters not referable by law to some other Committee. The duties of such committees shall continue during the year and shall cease at the close of the next succeeding Annual Communication. (a) The Committees on Finance, Jurisprudence, General Policy and such others as may be deemed necessary by the Grand Master shall meet prior to the Annual Communication to consider such legislation as may properly be brought before them. Reimbursable travel expenses are to be borne by the Grand Lodge. (b) No business of any kind shall be finally acted upon until after reference to and report upon by a committee, unless by unanimous consent; and no appropriation of money shall be made until after reference to and report by the Committee on Finance. (c) It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to make a study of the condition of the General Fund relative to its receipts and expenditures and at each Grand Lodge Communication make a report thereon, with any recommendations it deems necessary. It shall carefully consider all items referred to it by the Grand Lodge, calling for any appropriation of monies to be budgeted for the ensuing year, and make its report in the form of a budget to the Grand Lodge for its approval.

Section 16-101.1 – Committees Mandatory Reporting. Unless otherwise specified, it shall be the adopted policy of this Grand Lodge that a written report of activities shall be submitted by all standing and special committees at each Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge. (a) When more than one officer or committee member attends the same special activity or function requiring a report, it shall be the prerogative of the Grand Master to designate who shall make the report.

(b) Unless otherwise specified, any recommendations contained in the aforesaid reports shall be submitted to the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge at least sixty (60) days before the date on which the Annual Communication is to be convened, and a copy thereof shall be forwarded by the Grand Secretary to the members of the Jurisprudence Committee, the members of the General Policy Committee, each Grand Lodge officer, each Past Grand Elective officer and the Secretary of each Lodge, at least thirty (30) days before said Annual Communication. The Secretary of each Lodge shall read said proposed recommendations at the next Stated Meeting of his Lodge following receipt thereof. (c) The General Chairman of the Grand Lodge Communication shall prepare a report on all facets reasonable, as to numbers, costs, facilities, etc., to be page 116 turned in to the Grand Secretary's office as a permanent file for the use of chairmen of future communications. (d) Unless otherwise specified, any officer or committee for whom Grand Lodge funds are budgeted, shall be required to make a written report at each Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge. (e) When reading the reports of Grand Lodge Officers, the Committee on General Policy recommends that detailed figures can be omitted, with explanations to clarify as the presenter sees fit. Foreign correspondence need not be printed in the Proceedings.

On Masonic Civility

A Reflection by Brother Rodger Marx, Treasurer of Phoenicia Lodge No. 58

Freemasonry and the Civility Mosaic It's no wonder that Freemasonry in all its wisdom has determined that discussion about politics is not allowed in the lodge. But that has not prevented these and other volatile topics to emerge in other places where Freemasons gather, both in person and virtually.

The M:W: Past Grand Master of California, Brother Russ Charvonia, in his book The Civility Mosaic, shares that in his search for the definition of the word "civility," what he encountered was not a definition, but rather the words "see incivility." In other words, to define what civility is, one had to understand what it was not. I found that interesting.

Have we all become so attached to our own way of thinking that we cannot understand that our way is not the only way? Are we tempted to believe that our way is right, and any other way is wrong? And if we were to dig a little deeper, dare we admit that our own self-identity or sense of self-worth is in some way intricately tied up with what we believe to be the truth?

While the relativity (or not) of truth is an interesting topic in and of itself, we can leave that for another time. The reality is that trying to understand what we each believe and perceive to be true will sometimes be disparate. At times, I think it's amazing that we can even agree upon anything at all!

Unfortunately, differing opinions have somehow caused us to be polarized and the more passionate one is about a particular topic, the greater the canyon grows between another with a differing point of view.

Five Steps to Cultivate Civility M : W : Charvonia believes that five steps are necessary in order for civility to begin to take root in our lives and in society as a whole:

- 1 The first step is to acknowledge that we may have differences and that this is OK. Just because someone thinks differently than we do does not necessarily make them our enemy.
- 2 The second step and this takes courage and grit is to really try and understand why someone else believes what they believe and thinks what they think.

3 The third step is to genuinely tolerate someone else, even if you don't agree with them (M : W : Charvonia believes that it is at this point that a person begins the path to enlightenment.)

4 The fourth step is to recognize that the goal is not to change another person, but rather to live with them and live with their perspectives.

5 The fifth step is to appreciate the unique qualities in someone else so as to improve their situation, and he believes that this is true enlightenment.

We Have the Tools to Make a Difference He believes that we as Freemasons have the unique opportunity to become beacons of civility in our world. We have the tools that are needed to live civilly in our society and to teach our society how to be civil.

The Entered Apprentice learns about the cardinal virtues of Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice. He also learns in that same degree that our most exalted tenets are Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. If a Freemason truly embodies these virtues, then civility becomes as easy as the air we breathe, and a brother effortlessly becomes an example to others, no matter his station in life – anywhere on the planet.

Civility requires dialogue and mutual respect. Civility requires us to constantly be aware of, master and combat Freemasonry's Public Enemy No. 1: The male ego.

In a world that supplies each of us our own personal soapbox through the use of social media and other venues, we would do well to step down from these places of virtual altitude. Instead, we could learn much from both virtually and figuratively, putting our arm around our brother or sister and just simply walk with them, really listen to them, and even though you may not agree with them about everything, never remove your arm from their shoulder.


Introduction

Near the end of the Entered Apprentice Degree, new Masonic initiates are introduced to the symbols of Chalk, Charcoal, and Clay. In this first article of a three-part series, we examine Chalk, which represents freedom, for, under the slightest touch, it leaves a trace behind as it glides freely along a smooth surface. Yet Chalk, as we shall see, also teaches us the necessity of prudence.

Within the Entered Apprentice Degree, there is a small section, not standing, and creation. Before the Chalk is more than a simple tool for more than three sentences long, advent of modern "dry erase" boards, recording ideas temporarily. 




