#### FROM THE WEST



Brother Christopher B. West - Sr. Warden

On February 19th, we will observe Presidents Day, a federal holiday celebrated on the third Monday of February in honor of George Washington, the first President of the United States, who was born on February 22, 1732

Washington is by far the most heralded of the American Freemasons, and rightfully so. His life was one of incredible achievements and accomplishments that shaped and molded our country when it was in its infancy.

Freemasonry played an important role in George Washington's life, starting at the early age of 20 when November 4th, 1752 he first became an Entered Apprentice in the Fredericksburg Lodge until the day he died December 14, 1799, when a brother in his Alexandria lodge was one of three doctors at his bedside.

On March 3 rd., 1753, about ten days after his 21st birthday, George Washington received his Fellow Craft degree, also in Fredericksburg Lodge in Virginia. Celebrating your 21st Birthday in 1753 didn't have quite the same meaning that it has in today's society. Figure, the average life expectancy for a male during that time was a meager 36 years old. Washington would go on to live 67 years before passing from acute laryngitis.

Presidents Day was established in 1885.

"The position of eminence, the great respect and the profound reverence in which the name of Washington is enshrined in the hearts of the American people, and particularly so, with the members of this Fraternity, and of all true lovers of liberty and freedom wheresoever dispersed, is the reason, if any be needed, why everything relating to this great man and worthy brother should be preserved for the future generations, to be used by them as a guide, in the cultivation of those cardinal virtues of Honor and Integrity, that should ever characterize the conduct of a good man and a good Mason. "- J. Henry Williams, R.W. Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, February 22nd, 1915.



Tips for Talking to Lodge Visitors

When is the last time you walked up to someone you didn't know and just started talking to them?

It's not as easy as it sounds. When I was first brought into Marketing for my career, I had a manager who was very much like me: we were both far more comfortable with numbers and charts, and not as comfortable talking to others. With great foresight, my manager signed me up for some speech classes where I learned how to write and present speeches in front other others who were also

learning. We were given books to read, and then had to write summaries and present to the class. I finally learned how to speak in front of a group, with comfort and ease.

But what about one-on-one talking? How could I learn to talk to people I didn't know? I had to talk to these people so I could do my new job, which had a large focus on market research. I was tasked with visiting several trade shows to investigate our competitors, and speak to people about their products and applications so that I could bring valuable market information back to our product development team.

I went to my first trade show and found myself at a total loss. I could hardly bring myself to talk to anyone, but I was able to get some good product information from brochures at various exhibition booths. I felt like a failure on the plane ride home, and was determined to find some way I could break out of my habits.

I researched the topic, and I found a great book with some easy tips that I used to learn how to talk to people. Several of the tips seem self-evident, but until you actually think about it, it's not easy to see yourself in these situations.

Here are the tips I learned that I use the most:

- 1. Don't talk. Ask questions instead. Most people love to talk about themselves, so give them a few questions to start, and follow up with more questions. This shows your interest in them, and they usually respond favorably. Remember, they also might have challenges talking to people they don't know, so you've given them a few easy ways to break the silence.
- 2. During your conversation, try to say the person's name at least three times. In their brain, when they hear their name, endorphins are released making them happy. They'll have a good memory of talking with you, just because you remembered their name and you used it several times. Three is the best number—think of the jingles you might hear on a radio station, and note how many times they repeat a phone number. Research shows that hearing something three times helps reinforce memory. So, not only will the person appreciate hearing their name, but you will be reinforcing their name in your own memory.
- 3. Focus on the person. Face them directly while you're talking with them. Show recognition of some kind, if they mention something you know. They are looking for a positive, shared experience. If you confirm that you have a similar thought, interest, or history, it helps them feel as if they're in like-minded company. Human nature is to be drawn to those who look, act, and think like we do. It's a measure of approval within social circles when others share similar goals, ideas, activities, and histories. If you focus on them and your facial expression is positive and friendly, they are given assurance they are in a good place.
- 4. Finish with a good close. A call to action, so to speak. If they're visiting your lodge for the first time, ask them to provide their contact information so they can be kept up to date on lodge activities and events. Just like in field of Marketing, it takes on average from 6 to 12 contacts of various types to convert a prospect, if they are going to convert. They may just be interested in information, and that is okay. Leave them with a good impression, and they will remember it. Verify they are added to your lodge's contact list so they'll receive information. Some lodges share their Trestleboards with visitors who want to keep up to date with the lodge. Sending an electronic version through email is easy to set up with no additional cost to the lodge, and this will leave the visitor with another good impression.

So, the next time a new person visits lodge or contacts you by email, just remember to ask questions, repeat their name three times, focus on them, and bring them to an action. They'll remember you in a good light, and you'll remember them as well!
