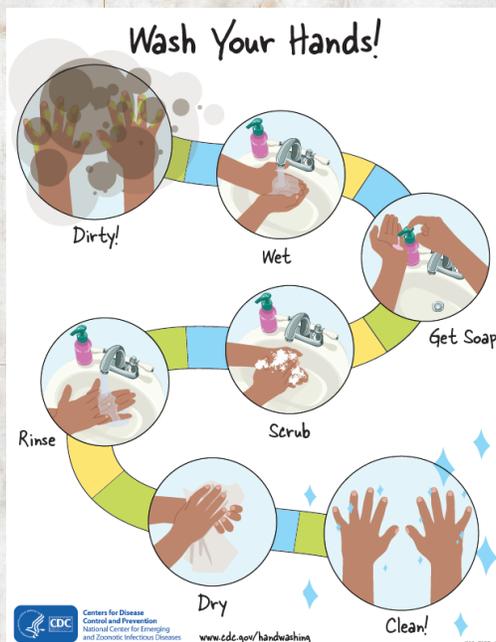

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FROM THE EAST

Brethren –

Can you believe we are already through ¼ of 2020? Time passes ever faster with each passing day it seems. Do you ever wonder why that is? Here is one theory that I've subscribed to and what I do daily to attempt to slow time down. Not literally of course, but perceptually.

One article I read many, many years ago talked about how the brain stores memories. It is much like saving a file on your computer and just like your computer there are two different ways in which you might store a file.

The first is the creation of an entirely new folder, storing something you've created entirely from scratch. By content it doesn't resemble anything else created prior. The second is simply editing or updating an existing document. This doesn't require a totally new folder, but more simply just some slight changes and modifications to an already existing one.

Think about each and every day in your life. How much is each day the same, or different, than the previous? For those of us that work 9-5 jobs, Mondays thru Fridays probably seem nearly identical both day-to-day as well as week-to-week, month-to-month, even year-to-year. It's tough to tell some days apart! Even on weekends, do you find yourself doing much of the same things? Running the same errands, hiking the same trail, eating at your same favorite breakfast or lunch spot, attending church every Sunday AM, visiting with the same family or friend? Are you creating completely NEW memories or simply editing an older similar, albeit previous, memory?

If all your days, weekdays and/or weekends, all look the same then time will have the perception of speeding up to you, because your brain can't find much to differentiate between one day and the next. The memories of these days all sort of run together. You're simply editing or updating an already existent memory.

On the contrast, if you are going and doing something totally different each daytime slows down. Think about this for an example; Why is it when you drive to a totally new place along a completely new route where you've never been it seems to take so long to get to your destination? (Are we there yet?) But on your return drive home it seems so much shorter in length even though it's the very same distance traveled? It is because on your way there you're experiencing something for the first time, creating a totally new memory in your brain storage, but on the way back you've already seen it all before, so your brain simply updates the already existent file. This is why going on a vacation is so highly recommended! (and why timeshares are the worst vacation idea!) It's new and different, your brain is active, absorbing, and experiencing something entirely new! This gives your brain a break from the redundancy of daily life and allows it to again begin creating entirely fresh, new folders and files expanding your memory and thus, in perception at least, expanding your time.

This also explains why time seems to speed up the older we get. When we are younger the whole world is new to us! New places. New friends. New experiences (good and bad). Every day in school we are learning something totally new. Everything is experienced for the first time. But as we age, we see so many of the same things again and again. Our daily lives are just repeating of the day before. Be it our families, our jobs, our lives as a whole, we experience less and less of those 'first times'. Retirement may be the worst of these, further fueling that speed at which time seems to be passing one by. You don't have work anymore to teach you things that are new or offer you opportunities for something different in your day. Being older, friends and family that you once hung out with and did things with are now gone or moved away. You travel shorter distances due to age, eyesight, or some other health issue, so you don't see much in the way of new views and progress. Heck, you may not get out of the house much at all. Looking back on time seems lightning fast. You constantly ask yourself where did the days, weeks, months, and/or years go?

Do not let time manipulate your life, you manipulate time. Whether you're driving an automatic, a 4-speed, 5-speed, or 3-speed on the column – YOU control the speed that time passes. Do something new EVERY day. Watch something new EVERY day. Try something new EVERY day. Eat something new EVERY day. Go drive, bike, walk, Uber, somewhere new EVERY day. Take a different route to your job or that next doctor's appointment. Go to 2nd closest McDonalds, not the closest for lunch or try someplace entirely new. Attend a different Lodge for a change. Don't watch an old classic you've seen 20 times, watch a new(er) movie or read a new book.

In summary, get your brain back to experiencing BRAND-NEW things again – create NEW folders and files each and every day instead of just routinely editing older ones. Find new interests, new friends, new goals. Slow time down by breaking life's monotonous repetition.

When I strive to do new things, go new places, I can see and feel the difference in my life, my attitude, my overall health. Greetings Brethren from the South Gate

Every day is a new day, every new day has it's challenges. And here we all are having survived all of the other challenges. And we will survive this one, too. Nobody has ever swam through these waters. So, the best we can do is use good common sense and practice the power of prayer.

Our Lodge room, and the whole building actually, has always been a sanctuary for me. When I drive through those gates and see all the other cars and trucks already there, I breathe easier because I know I am entering my sanctuary of brotherly love, relief and truth. A gathering of brothers who share the same belief in a Supreme Being, everlasting life and practice charity. The particulars of any brother's politics and the doctrine of any brother's faith are left at the door through which we pass clad in white aprons, pure and unspotted before the world. That, my brothers, is a true sanctuary. Not every brother is a Christian or a Jew, and in the Lodge, it doesn't matter. Not every brother harbors the same political convictions, and in the Lodge, it doesn't matter. In the very first charge we received as an Entered Apprentice Mason we were all challenged. And, I am proud to say that Phoenicia #58 upholds that charge to the utmost degree, and to that, thank you.

We are not to permit or tolerate disloyalty of rebellion, but patiently submit to legal authority and conform with cheerfulness to the government of the country in which we live. Be true to your government and just to your country.

All the way back to medieval times, churches offered a "right of asylum" where those charged with a crime could flee and to varying degrees be free from some legal action - a place of "timeout" where the passions of the moment could cool and dissipate. In our modern times, Sanctuary movements were born again in the 1980s. By 1987, four hundred forty places in the United States were designated as "sanctuary cities" that were open to migrants fleeing the civil wars in Central America. Similar places also existed in such diverse places as Germany, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Switzerland and Canada. I would suggest that the Masonic Lodge has long been such a place. It is the one place where families divided by politics could go and, at least from the moments between gavels, we can let go of our differences and be good men and true as brothers. Indeed, there are dramatic and moving stories of how our Masonic institution provide a safe haven in troublesome times in every war for soldiers of opposing sides. Freemasonry not only takes the weapons from our hands, it links brothers to grasp the hand of their enemies and recognize in a grip, a word, and the perfect points of our entrance, a brother whose values far exceeds our differences.

In a message to the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Dan Brown, who has written so much about Freemasonry, commented:

"in a world where men do battle over those definition of God is more accurate, I cannot adequately express the deep respect and admiration I feel toward an organization in which men of differing faiths are able to 'break bread together' in a bond of brotherhood, friendship, and camaraderie."

Once again, our Lodge needs to be a safe haven of diversity, tolerance and sanctuary in our world torn by divisions and distinctions.
