SOCIAL EXPECTATIONS AND ASSIMILATION CHALLENGES

Masonic Education By Rodger Marx, Phoenicia 58 July 27, 2023

Masonic precepts expound on acceptable social behaviors and interactions among people. To be clear, in the biblical sense, a "precept is a rule or direction, often with some religious basis, dictating a way you should act or behave". These precepts are basically little life lessons and are generally passed down to children by parents or other authority figures. In our masonic fraternity, we experience a diverse set of behaviors, most of which have resulted from Americanized precepts of social behavior. These behaviors have become our social expectations and could be challenges for someone who was raised with a different cultural background while trying to assimilate with our customs and culture.

Generally, the first interaction between brothers or friends is a friendly handshake, a grip. Even this act has expectations which are influenced by our personal precepts. Growing up, many of us were taught that a handshake needed to be firm and convey strength, and the stronger the bond between brothers, the firmer the grip, otherwise, you could be perceived as a wimp. A handshake with a lady was to be gentle and short, as ladies are to be respected and treated gently. This describes only one set of social precepts, yet one that is quite prevalent within our culture.

Often the next interaction between people is eye contact or body language. It is expected in our culture to establish and maintain eye contact when you are having a conversation between two people. How many of us remember our parents saying, "look at me when I talk to you!" well I do. Without this eye contact, one of the parties in the dialog often jumps to the conclusion that the other is simply not interested and therefore not adequately engaging in the discussion, or totally ignoring what is being said. This is a sign of effective communication. Another perceived tell is body language. Worshipful Brother George Washington wrote in his rules for Freemasons, "The gestures of the body must be suited to the discourse you are upon". Simply, the precept is that if the conversation is of importance, your body should be erect and attentive, if you are having relaxed social discourse, your body posture can be more relaxed and casual. Reconsider your perception of a

person who is casually relaxed when you are trying to define what your lodge and masonry is all about. It would be easy to conclude that that person is not really interested, and thinks it is all a joke. Again, these are social expectations in our American culture.

Simple words used in communication between brothers can exemplify the diversity within our culture. Greetings from brothers are as simple as: good morning brother, good morning pops, good morning sir, or even good morning sir Rodger (using myself as an example). All forms of which are greetings that convey a form of respect and sincerity, yet often they reflect an individual's precept which could also indicate cultural as well as personal influences: Typically the "Good morning brother" greeting is indicative of a mutual bond of respect within our fraternity; "good morning pops" is a derivative form of respect on a more personal basis between brothers, "good morning sir" is a form of respect that is more often influenced by parental or cultural precepts; "good morning sir Rodger" (using myself as an example) is a combination of cultural and personal respect which often is an indication of regional norms.

By now, you are probably wondering where this rhetoric is going and why it is a subject for a masonic education piece! It is our purpose and objective to facilitate making good men better, to build character, and to foster personal liberty based on ethical and moral values.

Within our jurisdiction when a candidate approaches a lodge for membership, there is a six-month waiting period, during which the candidate learns about masonry and our lodge to assure that they want to become part of the fraternity, and where the lodge members assess the candidate to make sure that he is worthy and can qualify for membership. For most candidates this is relatively straight forward. However, occasionally a candidate's circumstances will challenge our character, and our expectations can conflict with their assimilation efforts.

Case Example

We recently had a candidate reach out through Grandview with an interest in Masonry. This initiated a series of communication via text messages. It became apparent that English was not his first language and that he was struggling a little with sentence structure. Regardless, his responses were respectful and short. For example, an introduction text sent by me explaining who I am, why I was texting him, inviting him to respond back and providing him with my personal contact information, was answered later that day with the following:

"I am at job today my sir that's reason why I didn't response you earlier"

Communications continued and he was provided with information as to when I would be at the lodge early so that we would have an opportunity to meet. After an EA degree meeting, I received another text from him.

"I was outside yesterday." And when asked why he didn't come in, his response was "because I came late because of traffic."

Over the course of communications, the candidate was finally able to meet at lodge for a face-to-face meeting with me. And this is what prompted me to write this narrative.

Our candidate sat quietly along with another candidate as I explained what masonry is and what it is not. When he spoke, it was in a very quiet tone of voice and avoided eye contact with me. He was very respectful, and I was a little conflicted with his body posture. I felt like I was having difficulty getting him to understand what I was trying to tell him. During the night and after he left, I was told that the candidate really upset one of our members because of the way and where he parked his car. I responded that "he appeared to be scared to death".

I recall that I met him outside the lodge when he arrived. He had not park in our parking lot, rather he parked in the street because he didn't know if he was allowed to. He did go back to his car and move it into the parking lot prior to us going inside the lodge. His driving skills were awkward as he tried to make a U turn in the street to get into our lot.

It was obvious to me that my expectations were also playing a part in my initial assessment. Regardless I have kept in constant communication with him attempting to form a bond and to understand him.

This candidate's circumstances alone should challenge all of us to assess our masonic values, and reactions to our own precepts and expectations!

He is from Tanzania, South Africa.

He moved into a refugee camp when he was 5 years old in 1999.

The Nyarugusu refugee camp has over 150,000 refugees

He came to America as a refugee only 8 months ago.

Being 29 years old, that means he has lived in the camp for 24 years.

He moved here with his Father, Mother, Brother, and Sister

Since his arrival he has worked at Goodwill and at a laundry company.

Of two of the questions that I asked him, his responses resound in my mind.

How do you like America? And is English your primary language?

"America is the best country to world. Is number one country I like it"

"the language that is spoken is Swahili"

As it is my responsibility to effectively communicate with candidates and help them understand our brotherhood and masonry in general, understanding his journey has added more light to my tasks. I am now texting messages written in both English and Swahili. I have a greater appreciation for his assimilation efforts and have adjusted my expectations.

I challenge you to contemplate on how you would manage learning a new language, finding a job, learning to drive, and trying to become a mason in 8 months.

The preceding narrative is that of one man's desire to improve himself and find a lasting brotherhood within Masonry.

May I encourage you to let your thoughts and actions pass through the three gates of your masonic heart; is it true? is it necessary? and is it kind?

From the words of Dr Ralph Smedley, remember that "Understanding comes through communication, and through understanding we find the way to peace".


