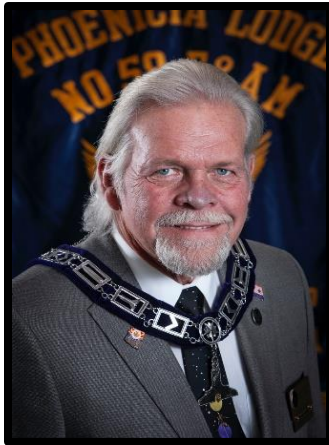

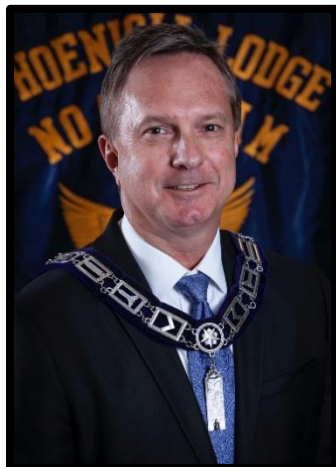

The result was astounding.

Fast forward to 1997 and who should arrive at the Casa Grande

Station but Joe. He was the same guy as I remembered. He had transferred down from Maine and the first thing I asked him was “what the ^%\$ is wrong with you. He just laughed and blamed it on Dale. Wherever he was he was the consummate professional, while still having that little boy gleam in his eye when he was up to something. He was my smoking buddy, my drinking buddy, and a great friend. In spite of that, one thing is for sure, he was a Border Patrol Agent through and through. W.B. REED HOUGE – JR. WARDEN



Brethren,

This month's Trestle Board article doesn't focus on education or thoughtful insight which is the normal thing to write about for TB articles. For that I apologize. This article is more about one of the most important rights as a Mason; to travel, visit other brothers, and to learn about the brothers that went before us.

I was recently traveling to my hometown in central ND. Due to the long drive, I was perusing the web on masonic events and stumbled upon a Masonic event at Yellowstone Lodge #88 in Buford ND. Growing up in ND, I'd heard of Buford but wasn't sure where it was and certainly had never visited there. I thought I better find out

more about this area and its history. It is located in central western ND not far from the Montana/ND Border. It is near the confluence of the Missouri/Yellowstone River about 23 miles from current day Williston ND.



Company C, 2nd Battalion, 13th Infantry, 3 officers, 80 enlisted men and 6 civilians commanded by Capt. (Brevet Lt. Col.) William G. Rankin, first established a camp on the site on June 15, 1866, with orders to build a post, the majority of which was built using adobe and cottonwood enclosed by a wooden stockade.

Fort Buford was a United States military post named in honor of General John Buford of Gettysburg fame. It was established in the fall of 1866. Prior to the fort, two trading posts (Ft William erected in 1833 and Fort Mortimer, erected in 1843). It being of strategic importance at the focal point of steamboat traffic to the west. Fort Buford played an important and colorful part in the frontier for permanent settlement. Famous Indian were prisoners at the fort include Chief Joseph, Crow King, Rain-in-the-Face, Gall, and Sitting Bull. Sitting Bull, with 200 followers, were the last of the hostile Sioux and surrendered here in 1881.

In 1893 the fort was dismantled and the garrison was transferred to Fort Assiniboine, Montana.

The original adobe buildings, which provided quarters for 300 men, were later replaced by about 100 frame buildings. Most of the buildings were removed after dismantling the fort and only the Stone Powder Magazine and the Headquarters building are preserved at the original site.

Yellowstone Lodge #88 Ancient Free and Accepted Masons at Fort Buford, Dakota Territory under dispensation and charter from the Grand Lodge of Minnesota. The Lodge was active from January 26, 1871 to June 6, 1874 and occupied the first Masonic Hall in the area which is now North Dakota.

The site is kept active with Degrees from the surrounding lodges as well as other historical events and works closely with the Northwest Mounted Police association which is made up of mostly Masons and dates back to their founding. The Premiere of Canada at that time was a Mason, and this tradition carried on, including the Chartering of the Northwest Mounted Police Lodge No. 11 on August 9, 1906.

DRESS CODE

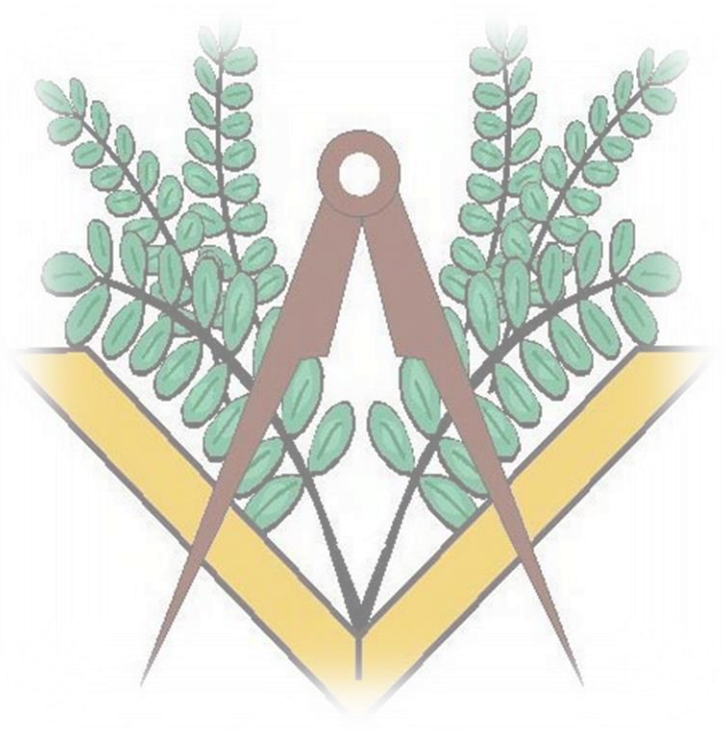

Tributes to Our Departed Brother

Brother Joe Papas was a great man. He was kind and was a friend to all who knew him. He will always be remembered. – **WB Jeff Hinson, PM**

I fondly remember that when Joe would join us at Low Twelve at the Half-moon Bar and Grill after meetings, he would usually order a "virgin Cuban Libra" (a Coke with ice), or a "Pine Float" (ice water with a toothpick). He also taught me some few things of great importance, like how to use a large Tupperware bin to toss salads at our pre-meeting dinners.

Joe Papas was a kindred spirit. He served in the Marines, which was my service, as well as the U.S. Border patrol. I had served in the USMC Reserve, while he had served in the regulars and spent some time in Vietnam. He didn't make any distinctions between the regulars and the reserves. "Don't matter what kind of Marine you were, you were equally likely to 'catch a bullet.'"

Some people have a "gun safe" in their home. Joe had a "gun room". And it didn't just have guns. He had swords, knives, and just about any kind of implement that you might find useful for killing a bad guy. He was absolutely fanatical about knives! He's the one who sold me a U.S. Model M-14 with a match grade rifle barrel which was glass laid. He also accused me of tying knots "funny". Hell, I was never a Boy Scout! But he was impressed with my shooting. I wish I was still that good. I'm out of practice.

Joe was devoted to his wife Dale, and he was nearly equally devoted to his Lodge and to the various other bodies that he was a member of. At AASR reunions, he was always there to get everybody properly set up with a microphone. He also was a dedicated student of the symbols and history of our Craft, and always had something to share. He happily gave brethren small presentations like 1/2 shekels of silver, a traditional "Masonic Wage." I believe he provided 90% of the educational features presented in Lodge, and he was just about the only other member of Phoenicia that would send me educational articles for the Trestle board while I was the editor. His wisdom, wry sense of humor, devotion to duty and responsibility and love of Brother and Craft is sorely missed by all who knew him. As we say in the Marines, he was a member of the "old breed."

I was proud and honored to be there when he was presented with the Phoenician Mason of the Year award on December 30th, 2014. It was a just recognition of a man who was dedicated to virtue, brotherly love and the Craft. – **WB Glen Van Steeter, PM**

He was a good friend, a good man, and a good Mason. – **WB Tony Hernandez, PM**

I'll never forget the first time I really met Joe. It was during my investigation when I applied for membership in the Lodge. At this point, I had already met with two other Brothers from Phoenicia who were also on the Investigation Committee assigned for me. Each of those prior meetings last about 15-20 minutes each. When Brother Papas showed up to my house, he had brought lunch. I knew then this wasn't going to be a quick 15-20-minute meeting. It wasn't. It went for 3hrs. Joe went meticulously through my application, word by word, line by line, making sure each and every thing was true and accurate. He took

Masonry, like everything he would get involved in I would eventually learn, very seriously. At the end of our meeting, he asked me if I would be okay with him requesting of the Lodge that he be assigned my mentor. I felt honored after seeing and learning of how important Masonry was to him. Brother Joe would go on to not only be my mentor through the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Degrees, but through all the various parts in all the degrees, lectures, everything. He always encouraged me to learn more and do more in and for the Lodge. He never stopped being my mentor through my entire masonic experience up through to his passing.

Brother Joe Papas will always be the standard to me for what it means to be a Freemason. Joe would do anything, literally anything, to help a Brother of our Lodge, or any other Lodge, if he was ever asked. He gave of his time, of his talents, and of his finances to Phoenicia without ever asking for or expecting anything in return. He almost single-handily supported our Bikes for Books Program during my 6-7 active years in the Lodge, every 2-3 months donating another \$100 to buy yet another bike for a deserving child. He loved supporting other Lodges, loved visiting other Lodges, and so enjoyed being involved in both the York Rite and Allied Masonic Degrees. He isn't the reason I became a Freemason, but he is damn sure the reason that I am the quality of Mason, that I am today. The Great Architect of the Universe now has the best Chaplain and Prompter by his side. – **WB Christopher West, PM**

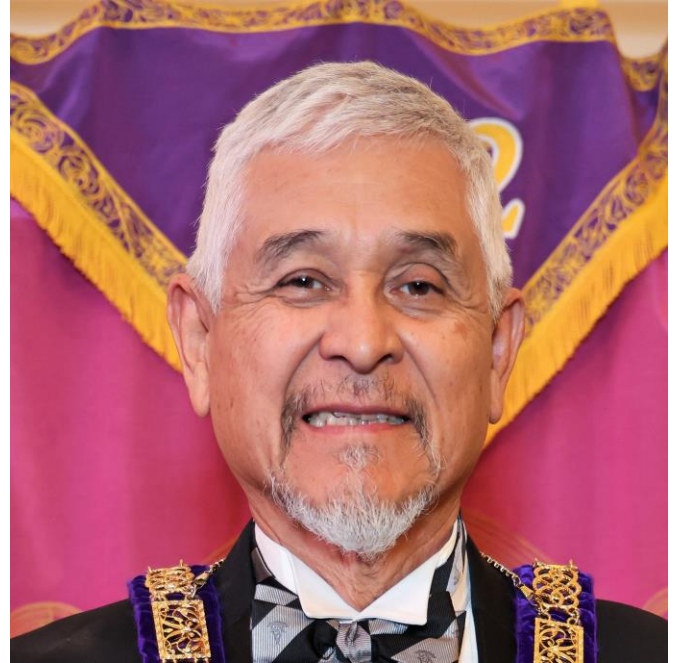




The Allegory in in Ecclesiastes XII verses 1-7.

In Masonry we use allegory in many instances during our rituals. An example of this is the way we refer to the usage of the square, compasses and level in operative masonry versus speculative masonry.

We also find allegory in some passages in the Holy Bible that may require some study to perceive their true meaning. One such passage that I found particularly interesting is found in Ecclesiastes XII verses 1-7. Upon the first reading of this passage, I thought I understood it. A friend whom I truly respected and whose knowledge I admired pointed out another interpretation which I had not considered. I found that I had no idea what this passage really meant. As an interesting exercise, before you read further take a few minutes get your bible and read Ecclesiastes XII versus 1-7. What comes to mind? Is the meaning of this passage clear to you?



Now consider my friend's interpretation:

Remember now thy creator in the days of thy youth, while the evil days come not nor the years draw nigh when thou shalt say I have no pleasure in them:

The bible is telling us to include God in our daily lives at an early age while there is still pleasure in our young lives.

While the sun, or the light, or the moon or the stars, while the clouds return after the rain:

While we are still in our youth and our vision is clear.

In the day when the keepers of the house shall tremble:

The house is our body and the keepers are our hands and they tremble is due to the passage of time.

And the strong men shall bow themselves:

The strong men are our legs which bow in time.

And the grinders cease because they are few:

The grinders are our teeth.

And those who look out the windows shall be darkened:

Our eyes start to fail us.

And the doors shall be shut in the streets:

Referring to our lips and mouth as the doors and the throat/esophagus as the streets.

When the sound of the grinding is low and he shall rise up at the voice of the bird:

As we age it is too painful to lie in bed, so we are glad to be up.

And all the daughters of music are brought low:

Man's voice is no longer able to sing; his voice becomes weak.

Also, they shall be afraid of that which is high and fears shall be in the way:

A man's balance starts to fail him and he fears heights because of it.

And the almond tree shall flourish:

The almond tree's leaves turn white as does a man's hair.

And the grasshopper shall be a burden:

A man's skin is now so thin a grasshopper landing on it can break it open.

And desire shall fail: because man goeth to his long home, and the mourners go about the streets:

Man's only desire is the final resting place and the long home is the casket where a man will one day lay. The only sounds are the moaning a man makes as he awaits the end.

Or ever the silver cord be loosed:

The silver cord is a man's spinal cord and loosens at death.

Or the golden bowl be broken:

A man's skull is broken because it holds the intellect no more.

Or the pitcher be broken at the fountain;

This refers to a man's heart which finally fails to pump his blood throughout his body.

Or the wheel broken at the cistern;

Reference to the left side of man's heart no longer pumping.

Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it.

Remember that we are dust and unto dust shall we return and to our final judgement we must go.

You see my brothers; this passage admonishes us to be true and faithful servants to our God and to be good men and true to ourselves and to our brethren. All this in preparation for the inevitable changes in our body

as we age and approach death where our journey will end and we will stand before the Great Throne and face our judgment.

I have taken this work from a paper written by Bro. Bob Beer, Chaplin (at the time), Scottsdale 43, and with his permission I have added my thoughts and interpretations to the passages.

Take 5 For Our Brotherhood

A profound fact of life is that: Some people will be there for you in their free time, yet your true Brothers will make free time to be there for you.

For me, this is the true essence of “Brotherhood” and my commitment toward all my fraternal brothers in our lodge.

The underlaying question is: What do you value most, your time or brotherhood?

Masonic values recognize that member communication is a vital part of our sustainability. Lodges encourage the formation of “calling committees” and most lodges actually report on the results monthly. But are they effective? Or has it become a “check the box” activity?

What actually is the purpose of the call? And who are we calling?

Generally we are calling current members who have not been coming to lodge. It should be our objective to first find out how our brother is doing in general, do they have health issues, family issues, work issues or anything that is keeping them from coming to lodge. Often times our brothers have transportation issues which to them may be perceived as insurmountable. Yes, these are some of the stated objectives for calling. Coming up, we will also discuss the unstated benefits.



Besides our current members, we often have candidates who have expressed a desire to join our lodge. It is even more imperative that we have an effective communication plan in place. Keep in mind that most candidates don't know what to do, what to expect nor how to do it. Remember that these candidates are the future of Masonic organizations including our lodge.

Recent communication activities with 18 new candidates have shed some light on effective forms of communications and how to engage in conversations with them in general.

After initially compiling an email and sending it to all of the candidate as a group email, the next few days netted only a couple responses. A second email attempt was sent out individually with similar results. Subsequently changing to a group text message asking what their communication preferences were, resulted in a resounding response asking for text messages first. Each and every response from the group text has been followed up with a personal response. My impression is that most of the candidates are now starting to bond with our lodge.

Again, my position is that the key is either renewing or establishing the brotherhood bond

Remember that true Brothers will make free time to be there for you, this applies to all communications for the benefit of our lodge

I challenge each and every one of our active brothers to:

Take 5 (minutes) for our BROTHERHOOD

You can afford 5 mins to build or rebuild relationships. It's not tough and current technology helps you save time.

Make it easy and convenient for yourself. I have adopted a protocol for my contact list on my cell phone. All my lodge contacts are identified like: "P58 A — Rodger Marx". Obviously the P58 keeps all the lodge contacts in one convenient place in my contact list. The A indicated the active members within the lodge. This keeps them on top of the list for easy access.

For candidates I use a variation like "AAP58 — AC 5 Candidate name". This files the name at the top of the contact list

Both of these techniques make access to communications fast and ease.

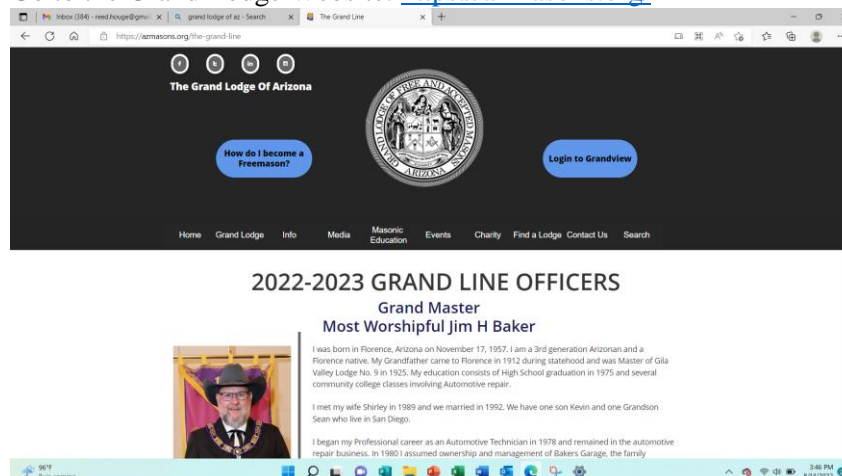
Don't know who to call? Use Grandview all candidates wanting to join and all lodge brothers you don't know are conveniently listed with their contact information.

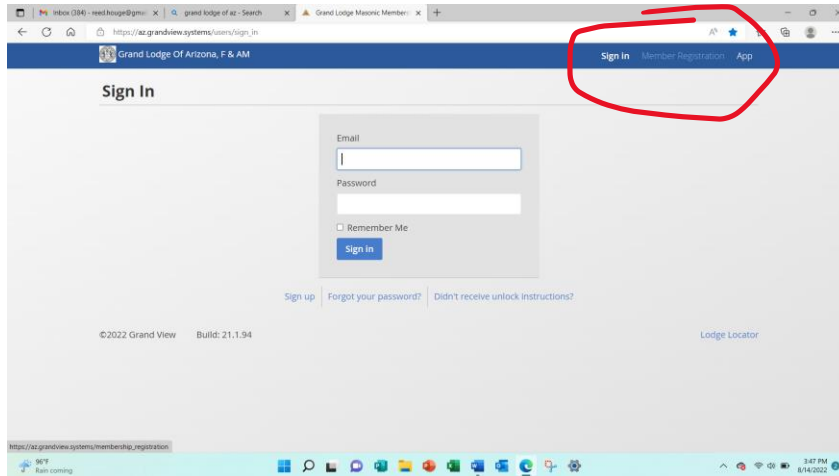
First Time Log into Grandview

- 1) Go to the Grand Lodge Website: <https://azmasons.org/>

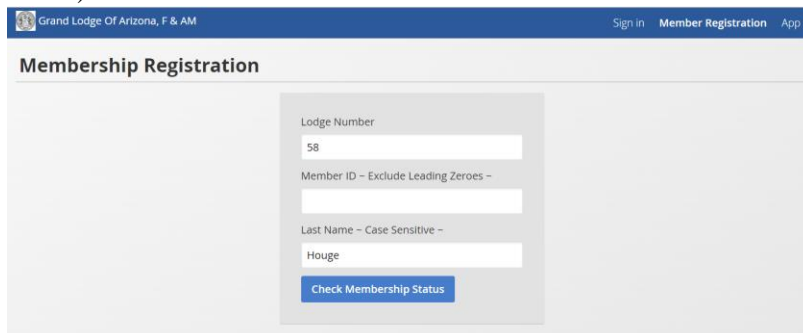


2) Click on “Login to Grandview”

Then Click on “Member Registration” in upper Lefthand corner



3) Enter your information (Lodge Number, Member ID which is on your Dues Card, and Last Name)



4) Peruse the website:

- a. Personal Information: This is information is critical since it is where any e-mails/phone, text messages/ etc. will go. If this is wrong, you won't get any communications.
 - i. You can also choose what messages you want to receive from Grand Lodge by checking the areas you're interested in.
- b. Resources: The Grand Lodge will place pertinent Documents here for the members
 - i. There will be separate sections for EA, FC, MM so an EA/FC will not be able to access the MM section.
- c. Upcoming Seminars: shows events coming up around the state.
- d. Events: Similar to above but is in the form of a Calendar and is more up to date than some other calendars. VERY USEFUL
- e. Grand Lodge: This all the information related to Grand Lodge and is also where you can REQUEST an event. For example, if we have a LOI we would go to this tab insert the information and WB Craig Carlson will make sure the calendar is updated for other lodges to see.

This doesn't cover everything, but it will get you started. I hope you utilize this website; it can be very useful.
