
Some people try to turn back their odometers, but not me. I want people to know why I look like this. I've traveled a long way and some of those roads weren't paved.

THIS IS HOW <u>LEGENDS</u> ARE MADE: WB PHIL ZEILENGER AWARDED 60-YEAR PIN

"Worshipful Brother Phil", as he is affectionately called, began his Masonic journey when he was Initiated into Fidelity Lodge #51 under the Grand Lodge of Nebraska on May 19, 1964. He was Passed on June 23, 1964, and Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on July 28, 1964, within the same lodge. Phil's Masonic service is deeply rooted, especially within the Blue Lodge. His home lodge, Phoenicia Lodge #58, boasts him as a perpetual member and Past Worshipful Master, having served in 1990 and 1991. In 2019, he was recognized for his unwavering dedication by receiving the first-ever Robert P. Taber Lifetime Achievement Award. His commitment extends to senior membership at Chandler Thunderbird Lodge #15 and regular memberships at both AZ Research Lodge #1 and his original Fidelity Lodge #51 in Nebraska.

Phil's Masonic influence is further reflected in his York Rite engagements. He is a Past Preeminent Governor of Regius York Rite College No. 86 and was honored in 2018 with the Order of the Purple Cross, elevating him to an Associate Regent of the Sovereign York Rite College of North America. His leadership continued as Past Sovereign Master of Saguaro Council No. 367 AMD, Past Excellent High Priest of Goldwater Chapter No. 18 RAM, Past Illustrious Master of Rhodes Council No. 11 CM, and Past Eminent Commander of King of Kings Commandery No. 12 KT. Notably, he is also a member of the Arizona Priory, Knights York Cross of Honor (KYCH), and the Arizona Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine (RCC).

In the Scottish Rite, Brother Phil's commitment earned him the 32nd Degree on October 22, 1977, the prestigious 32nd KCCH on October 18, 1993, and ultimately, the 33rd Degree on

October 3, 2011. Additionally, he is a devoted member of the El Zareba Shrine of Phoenix. Through his decades of service and leadership, Brother Phil's enduring contributions continue to inspire the Masonic community.

Thank you, WB Phil, for your enduring and unwavering commitment to Phoenicia Lodge #58 and the broader Masonic Fraternity. You have set an example like no other, embodying the virtues of our craft and inspiring generations of brothers. PRESERVING TRADITION WITH PURPOSE:

A Reflection on Evolving Values By: Brother Andy Maroglio

Recently, I was invited to a conversation organized by the Goldwater Institute titled "How Identity Politics Warped Our Institutions." The event brought together Dr. Ronald Lindsay, an esteemed author and philosopher, and Timothy Sandefur, the Goldwater Institute's Vice President for Legal Affairs, to discuss how identity politics, wokeness, and cancel culture are reshaping American institutions like law, education, and healthcare. Engaging with Dr. Lindsay was particularly impactful; his reflections on these cultural shifts sparked my own thoughts on how foundational beliefs are preserved—or lost—over time. Though I haven't yet read his latest book, Against the New Politics of Identity, the conversation resonated deeply.

Having attended the Goethe Schule, a German institution, Goethe's reflections influenced my thinking, particularly around the responsibility we bear in thoughtfully examining our beliefs. For Goethe, ideas were to be rigorously analyzed, shaped by a willingness to test them from various perspectives before they could be genuinely valued. This principle came to mind as I listened to Dr. Lindsay, bringing Goethe's insight to life: "The things which we love tell us what we are; but in order to hold onto them, we must constantly work at preserving them." Listening to Dr. Lindsay, I felt a sense of guilt—a realization that it is easy to criticize those pushing for change while perhaps making too little effort to protect what we believe in.

Freedom of speech and constitutional rights, both central to our Founding Fathers' vision, are fundamental to any true democracy. Yet today, those who resist the so-called "new narrative" often find themselves silenced or ostracized. Specific cases come to mind—policies that attempt to mandate what individuals may say or think in public and corporate environments. Here, terms like "diversity," "integration," and "equality"—once celebrated ideals—are subtly repurposed in ways that demand uniformity rather than encourage true inclusion. As a Freemason, I ask myself what kind of brother I am if I simply stand by while others seek to erase these values. America was founded as "one nation under God"—a vision by Masonic Founding Fathers who cherished freedom and sought to preserve the rights of individuals. This brings to mind another of Goethe's timeless insights: "What you inherit from your fathers, you must earn in order to possess."

As I listened, I thought of many countries that have already lost their foundational freedoms under similarly subtle but restrictive language. History reminds us that values have always adapted to meet society's changing needs, but that preserving their core strengthens each new generation.

Reflecting on Barry Goldwater's legacy, I was struck by his words: "This country has grown great and strong and prosperous by placing major reliance on a free economy...Private property, free competition, hard work—these have been our greatest tools." Indeed, preserving these principles requires vigilance and active commitment.

As Freemasons and citizens, the call to action becomes clear: we should defend these ideals with respect and active engagement. Recognizing, as Goethe did, that values may evolve with society, we must approach them with rigor—examining, preserving, and refining them through respect and reasoned dialogue. In this way, we help safeguard the foundational principles essential to our nation's character. Freemasonry teaches that values transcending generations must be preserved with dedication and purpose—truth, reason, and virtue. Balancing preservation with open-mindedness strengthens our foundation for the future, as we engage with others and share these insights, helping preserve the principles that remain essential to our nation's character.

A Brief History

The Rise and Fall of King Solomon's Temple By: Brother Ed Perez

Also known as the first temple that holds great significance in the religious and historical contexts of Christianity, Judaism, and Islam.

The temple was built during the reign of King Solomon, the third king of Israel, in the 10th century BCE. It was considered to be the spiritual center of ancient Israel, serving as a place of worship and housing the Ark of the Covenant.

The Hebrew bible, specifically the books of the First Kings and Second Chronicles, provide an account of the construction of Solomon's temple. The temple was designed to be not only a physical representation of the divine presence but also an axis mundi, connecting heaven and earth.

The temple was approximately 90 feet long, 30 feet wide, and 45 feet high. It was constructed with stone, cedar wood, and gold. Stone blocks formed the foundation and walls, while the cedar wood was used for the beams, roof and flooring. The Gold adorned several parts of the temple, including its walls, furnishings, and sacred objects. It has three main sections: the porch, the Holy Place, and the Holy of Holies. The temple also featured two massive, freestanding pillars known as Boaz and Jachin.

The Holy of Holies is the temple's most scared chamber. Only the high priest was allowed to enter and even then, it was only once a year on the day of Atonement. Inside, you will find the

ark of the covenant. It was an ornate chest containing the Ten Commandments inscribed on two stone tablets. This sacred artifact symbolizes God's presence among the Israelites.

Solomon's Temple primarily functioned as a house of assembly and worship. The temple also played a pivotal role in the celebration of religious festivals and ceremonies, such as Passover and the annual pilgrimage known as the Feast of Tabernacles. The temple was also the site for the Levitical rituals, rites of purification, and the practice of tithing. These practices formed the backbone of Israelite religious life and social cohesion.

In 587 BCE, King Nebuchadnezzar II of Babylon invaded Jerusalem, leading to the eventual destruction of King Solomon's temple. This event became known as the Babylonian exile. The destruction of the temple ushered in a period of religious transformation among the Israelite population. The loss of the physical temple leads to the development of Jewish monotheism. This transition involved a new focus on studying and interpreting the Torah, rather than the rituals and sacrifices once conducted at the temple.
