Doing our part for Pollinators

The LGC participated in the Vernon Area Library's first ever Spring Fest on May 1. Mary Ainger and Marj Lundy, Chair of the Pollinator Committee represented the Club and the Pollinator Committee in this event designed to reach out to the community to promote gardening and outdoor activities.



They gave out lots of information about bees, butterflies, and gardening with native plants. Mosquito Deterrent Planter

Using a large container (28" recommended diameter), fill it with potting soil and the following plants: Citronella geranium, Marigold 'Lemon Gem', Lemon grass, Catnip, Ageratum 'Artist Purple' and Lemon thyme. Their strong lemony smell will deter mosquitos and flies from your patio or deck. If you are working with a smaller planter, feel free to use any combination of these plants to help deter mosquitos.

For Lincolnshire residents, in the transition to LRS, there are additional benefits with their Organic Waste service.

When one starts the summer Organic Waste service, LRS will deliver a 32-gallon cart, one can also use their own carts or Yard Waste Bags.

In the cart with the plant matter one can dispose

of kitchen waste items and other compostable items such as cheese pizza boxes, chicken bones and more. This additional service keeps these items out of the landfill, at least during the Organic Waste service season.

Hydrangea Selection, Planting & Care

If you have visited a big box store or nursery recently you have seen the beautiful large panicle hydrangeas on display.

The following is an excerpt from an article by gardening expert and author, Melinda Myers.

'Melinda's Gardening How to Hydrangeas: Selection, Planting & Care'

Whether it is color, easy-care or year-round interest that your garden needs – hydrangeas are the answer. Mix them with perennials to extend the color, increase texture and add year-round interest to the garden. Here are a few tips to consider.

Panicle Hydrangea

Hydrangea paniculate

- Screen, hedge, specimen, mixed border
- Dwarf varieties 3 to 6' tall & wide; Large varieties up to 10' tall
- Performs best in full sun but will tolerate partial shade
- Moist, well-drained soil preferred
- Soil pH(acidity) does not influence flower color.
- Blooms on new growth prune during dormant season

<u>Pruning Tips:</u> Minimal pruning is needed. Thin plants to primary shoots to encourage large flowers.

Pruning to ground level will result in weak floppy growth.

Prune in late winter after the worst of winter has passed or early spring before growth begins.
