What's What in the Camellia World this Summer as We Cope with Covid-19

We begin with the sad news that the prolific camellia hybridizer Dr. Clifford Parks died in Chapel Hill, North Carolina on July 18. He was 84 and died peacefully at home. Dr. Parks was a camellia mentor to many... through his camellia articles and lectures. He introduced 20 Camellia japonica, 15 C. reticulata hybrids, 19 non-reticulata hybrids, 2 C. heimalis and 3 C. sasanqua. He bred cold hardy, fragrant and yellow camellias with his most famous being the large red bloom of the C. reticulata he named for himself. He bred 'Dr. Clifford Parks' when he was a young botanist at the Los Angles State and County Arboretum in Arcadia. When he moved to Chapel Hill he bred cold hardy camellias -- 9 of which comprise the "April Series". The pale yellow formal double "Optical Illusion", introduced in 2015, was his last introduction. He is survived by his son David Parks, who owns "Camellia Forest" in North Carolina. We will miss our camellia friend and continue to remember him when we enjoy the camellias he introduced.
