#### American Camellia Society (ACS) - Carol Schanz



# CAMELLIA CULTURE CORNER~ Don Lesmeister

As we enter into the summer months, I find that this is the 77th unusual weather year in a row in this area of California. Our Camellia plants, and many of other Society members, state it appears that plants are blooming a little later than normal. Generally, we fertilize our plants around the first of April, but may have to adjust, according to a later blooming season. Regardless, I have been using a liquid Fish fertilizer (5-1-1) at 1/2 half strength every 15 days. The liquid fertilizer is utilized by the plants a few weeks earlier than solid fertilizers, which takes longer to break down for plant use. While it entails a little more work, I fertilize using this method for around 3 to 4 months (6 to 8 applications).

Another item, is it seems like there has been a significant increase in petal blight in our neighborhood this year. IF you have experienced this also, be sure to take a few minutes longer in your clean up of blooms/petals around your plants, especially if they are in containers. AND, put your old blooms in the GARBAGE CAN rather than the green waste containers. Otherwise, the blooms can be ground up and returned to either you or your neighbors as mulch, by the City or County. Supposedly, the spores from this disease can travel for great distances in the wind...and you will notice the terrific winds we have had this year. You do not have to be a pest, or lecturer, but you can explain the Petal Blight situation to your neighbor camellia growers. Lastly, we have not cut as many blooms as normal because of the absence of Camellia shows. Therefore, you may want to wait to do some pruning in the fall months.

Under normal year things to do, you will have to increase your watering. The weather folks are reporting earlier, and warmer than normal temperatures, so pay closer attention to the soil dampness at the beginning of summer months.

Also, the critters are coming out a little earlier. Aphid seem to be the more prevalent, on new growth. ANTS deposit the aphid on the new growth, so attack the ants first, then the aphid. You can place ant stakes, etc. around your plants & garden. I keep a hand sprayer, with an insect solution available in my plant area. I usually keep a little milder solution than suggested. This may take a tad more spraying work, but the plants do not suffer any spray burn in case of a drastic temperature increase. The chewing insects do not normally present a large problem for Camellias but the same spray can be used for them also...

Lastly, don't forget to thank your plants for the great blooms you have had this year...and encourage them to get ready for the next blooming season.
