Camellia Culture by Don Lesmeister

Boy this Covid thing has thrown a curve into Camellia growing...no shows, meetings, etc. etc. etc...

The things that need to be accomplished at this time of the year are nearly the same, regardless of the virus. First, PICK UP YOUR SPENT BLOOMS...especially if you see any sign of petal blight. If you don't you will suffer the results, not only later this year, but probably next year also. *Put these old blooms in the garbage pail rather than the green waste containers. If you do not, the green waste can be ground up and distributed by the City or County. Someone could end up with the petal blight in their yard.*

Because of the lack of rain, and increase in temperature, you may have to start watering more frequently.

Moving your plants up in containers from one size to another can safely be accomplished so long as you stay within a 2-3 inch diameter increase. You can also move containerized plants into the ground nearly anytime so long as *the feeder (top) roots are not disturbed. Moving plants that are in the ground to another ground location should be done with great care. I would suggest not doing this once they have completed blooming until next fall when the plants go dormant.*

You can begin pruning your plants now. I would also suggest fertilizing your plants around the middle of March. I prefer using a liquid fertilizer with a low Nitrogen quantity, like Fish food...5-2-1. The liquid is absorbed by the plant much faster than solid fertilizer, which takes an additional week or so to dissolve before the plant can absorb the fertilizer. *You can then use a solid fertilizer a month or so later so long as the temperature is around the low 90 degrees or less.* If aphid or other creatures appear when the new growth begins, use a mild insecticide to eliminate them.....Have a good summer!

Alba Plena	White. Medium, formal double. E-M
Barbara Goff	Pink. Very large. Semi-double, rose-form. Medium upright. E-L Reticulata
Bonanza	Deep Red. Large, semi-peony form. Medium, low growth. E. Sasanqua
Cabernet	Small formal. Rich burgundy red. Medium, bushy, upright growth. L.
Carter's Sunburst	Pale pink striped or marked deeper pink. Large to very large, semi-double to peony form to formal double. E-L.
Chris Bergamini	Anemone form miniature to small bloom that is white with varying shades of red and pink stripes. M
Dr. Clifford Parks (2)	Red with orange cast. Very large, semidouble to anemone form loose or full peony form. Vigorous growth. M
Francie L (2)	Rose pink. Very large. Semidouble with irregular, upright, wavy petals. M-L
Frank Houser Var	The variegated form of Frank Houser. Rose red mottled white. M
Frank Houser	Very large. Deep glowing pink to red with darker veins; white anthers and filaments. Vigorous, upright growth; dark green foliage. E-M
Grand Prix	Very large, brilliant red, irregular semi-double. Excellent texture. Vigorous, upright growth. M.
High Fragrance (2)	Pale ivory pink with deeper pink shades at edge. Medium, peony form. Vigorous, open growth. M-L Fragrant
Holly Bright	Glossy salmon red. Petals creped. Large semi-double. Compact, upright and bushy with unique crinkled holly-like foliage. M
Julius Nuccio	Large whorls of intense crimson red petals surrounding yellow centers form semi-double.
Katie Var (2)	Salmon rose pink blotched white. Very Large semidouble. E-M
Moonlight Bay	Pale orchid pink. Very large semi-double, somewhat tubular in form. Extremely strong, upright and full growth. Long blooming season. E-L
Nuccio's Bella Rossa-var (2)	Variegated red mottled white form of Nuccio's Bella Rossa.
Nuccio's Carousel	Large semi-double tubular form. Soft pink toned deeper at edge. Medium upright growth. E-L.
Red Hots	Medium, tubular, brilliant red semi-double. Pointed petals. Dark green foliage. Medium, compact, upright, somewhat columnar growth. E-M

Rudy's Magnoliaeflora	Brilliant rose pink. Sport of Magnoliaeflora. Medium. Semi-double. Compact, bushy growth. Has all of the fine qualities of its parent. M
Ruta Hagmann (2)	Very light coral pink loose peony. Very large. M
Shock Wave	Medium very brilliant deep bluish pink with white filaments and yellow anthers. Upright, open growth. M-L
Sue Kendall Var	Miniature pink with white blotched rose-form double. Sport of Sue Kendall. Vigorous upright growth. E-L
Swan Lake	Large white, formal double to full peony. Medium, upright growth. M-L
