Camellia Culture by Don Lesmeister

Boy, this virus thing has sure shaken up the Camellia world. Normally, the Southern states have had Camellia Shows each week, beginning the middle of October...thus far, there have only been two reporting ACS shows both in Florida. And, the prospect of any Camellia Shows in California are about the same. However, some Camellia Societies are considering local Society shows only. Hopefully we will be able to do the same. Because of this, most Camellia Societies in this region probably won't have many plants for sale. So watch for the few nurseries still existing for Camellia plant availability. The good news is that we still have our blooms to look forward to seeing. Camellia plants are currently dormant, so now until they have completed this cycle is a good time for transplanting to and from the ground.

You can also do some re-containerizing (formally known as re-potting), pruning and other activities...I re-containerizing, I use a loose mix, about 1 part of Perlite, 2 parts pathway bark, 2 parts small bark, and 4 parts fir potting soil, try to stay away from redwood or pine in the main mix. When you move your plants to a larger container, try to keep the new planter about 3-4 inches maximum larger. For example, a gallon plant to a 2 gallon sized container, a 2 gallon container toa 5 gallon container, etc. If you move a 1 gallon container plant into something like an 18" Redwood container, you may not have any blooms for 1-2 years. I usually have a tag to identify what year the plant has been re-containerized so the plant does not have to be inspected yearly. For example, you can use a different color tag for 2021, 2022, etc. Generally, a plant needs to be re-containerized every 4 years or so. This identification can save you a lot of time and effort. Now is also a good time to thin out the dead branches and do some minor pruning. Lastly, February is the prime month to do your grafting.

Senritsu Ko	Small to medium formal to rose form. Beautiful light-yellow toned peach pink near edges. moderately fast, upright open growth. M Hybrid
ShockWave	Medium very brilliant deep bluish pink with white filaments and yellow anthers. Upright, open growth. M-L
Sue Kendall Var	Miniature pink with white blotched rose-form double. Sport of Sue Kendall. Vigorous upright growth. E-L
