#### Culture Corner

It sure seems as if there is an inordinate amount of petal blight on Camellia flowers this year. While this is normally associated with rain, it is also present with other conditions such as we are having this year. Be sure and remove flowers which show indication of the brown spots. Try to do this before the flower hits the ground. If you are not able to do so, please pick them from the ground as soon as possible. AND,,,,, put the spent blooms in the garbage, rather than IN the green waste containers. The Country/City folks generally take the garbage to a landfill, or send it elsewhere. If you place the bloom in the green waste containers, they will be ground up and eventually could end up in back your yard and perpetuate this disease.....Another thing you can do is to prune your plants that have completed, or are near completion of their blooming season. It is still a good time to re-containerize your plants. You can also still transplant plants from one location to another. Smaller & younger plants should be fine, but older and larger plants will suffer more shock, so it may be best to hold off transplanting them until next season. Lastly, towards the end of March you can begin your fertilizing program. I usually use a liquid fertilizer in the first fertilizing, as it is absorbed quicker by your plant. A solid fertilizer usually takes nearly a month to break down & before your plant can use the ingredients. Don Lesmeister

#### WHAT TO DO IN OCTOBER AND NOVEMBER

- 1. Disbud your camellias terminal.
- 2. Prune cross branches for better blooms..
- 3. Fertilize with 2-10-10 or 0-10-10.
- 4. Keep your plants watered. Remember not all plants get watered if under eves and trees.
- 5. Start to gib after Thanksgiving.
- 6. Clean up leaves and debris under and around your plants.
- 7. Spray for chewing insects.
