



Children as Commodities?

At seventeen, Natalie* discovered that her parents had contracted with another woman to become pregnant using her father's sperm and the woman's own egg. Natalie became estranged from her parents, hurt that money, rather than the physical expression of married love, was the context in which she was brought into the world. Since the advent of *IVF* (in vitro fertilization), the floodgates have been opened to bringing about reproduction through egg and sperm donation and surrogate pregnancies. Yet these technologies are fraught with medical, legal, and moral complications. Children deserve to not be created as a product of reproductive technology, but to be given by God, and to be born through married love.

Saints of the Week

Tuesday, Oct. 22nd: Saint John Paul II, Pope; Karol




Jozef Wotjtyla was born in 1920 in Wadowice, Poland. As archbishop of Krakow, he took part in the Second Vatican Council. On October 16, 1978, he was elected pope and took the name John Paul II. His exceptional apostolic zeal, particularly for families, young people, and the sick, led him to

make numerous pastoral visits throughout the world. He left as a heritage to the Church a rich Magisterium and the promulgation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the revised Code of Canon Law for the Latin Church and Eastern Churches, and the third typical edition of the Roman Missal. Pope John Paul II departed peacefully in the Lord on 2 April 2005 at age 84 Pope Francis canonized him on 27 April 2014.

Wednesday, Oct. 23rd: Saint John of Capistrano, Priest; died 1456 at age 70; reformer of the Franciscans and Poor Clares; preached devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus (3 Jan.); animated resistance against the Turks at the battle of Belgrade (1456); patron of military chaplains.

Thursday, Oct. 24th: Saint Anthony Mary Claret, Bishop; died 1870 at age 63; from Catalonia; vigorous reforming bishop of Santiago, Cuba; founded (1849) the Missionary Sons of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (Claretians), today numbering about 3,000 members; fostered credit unions and the apostolate of the press.
