





June 12, 2022 The Most Holy Trinity

BIBLICAL ROOTS OF THE TRINITY

Today's readings show some biblical roots of what Christians would later call the Trinity. Proverbs showcases the role of Wisdom in the work of creation, portrayed as a reality outside of God but integrated into God's work of forming the heavens and the earth. We join the psalmist in sharing Wisdom's delight in God's handiwork: "O Lord, our God, how wonderful your name in all the earth" (Psalm 8:2). In his letter to the Romans, Paul writes of peace with God through Jesus, and the love of God received through the Holy Spirit, distinguishing God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit while also displaying their abiding unity. Finally, in the farewell discourse from John's Gospel, Jesus—who had earlier spoken of himself as Son of the Father—promises his friends that they will receive the Spirit of truth that will teach and guide them after his departure.

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TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — Before anything was created, the wisdom of God was brought forth (Proverbs 8:22-31).
Psalm — O Lord, our God, how wonderful your name in all the earth! (Psalm 8).

Second Reading — God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us (Romans 5:1-5).

Gospel — Everything that the Father has is mine; the Spirit will take from what is mine and declare it to you (John 16:12-15).


Pope's Monthly Intention

June 2022: Elderly

We pray for Christian families around the world; may they embody and experience unconditional love and advance in holiness in their daily lives.

Excerpt from the Homily of his Holiness Pope Francis on Trinity Sunday June 16, 2019

Today we are celebrating the Most Holy Trinity. The Trinity is not a theological riddle, but rather the splendid mystery of God's closeness. The Trinity tells us that we do not have a solitary God above in heaven, distant and indifferent; no, he is *Father* who gave us his *Son*, who became man like us, and who, in order to be even closer to us, to help us bear the burdens of life, sends us his very *Spirit*. He, who is *Spirit*, enters our spirit and thus comforts us from within, bringing God's tenderness into our heart. With God the burdens of life do not rest on our shoulders: the *Spirit*, whom we name each time we make the sign of the Cross precisely as we touch our shoulders, comes to give us strength, to encourage us, to bear the burdens. Indeed, he is an expert in resuscitation, in raising up again, in rebuilding. It takes more strength to repair than to build, to recommence than to start from scratch, to reconcile than to just get along. This is the strength that God gives us.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today's feast, extending a dimension of Easter joy into Ordinary Time, reminds us that every aspect of worship centers on the mystery of God in three persons. At baptism, we are initiated into Christ and the Spirit. The Creed we recite at Mass every Sunday has its roots in the ancient celebration of baptism, when a new believer was questioned at the edge of the waters of the font with three questions: Do you believe in God, the Father, the Son, the Holy Spirit? Three questions, three affirmations, three immersions into the saving waters. Because every liturgy abounds with references to the Trinity, not only in words but in blessings by the sign of the cross, this feast was not easily accepted into the calendar. Pope Alexander in the eleventh century remarked that the liturgy is so laden with praise of the Trinity that there was no need for a special feast. Two hundred years later, while in exile in France, Pope John XXII proclaimed the feast, but it was not until 1911 that Pope St. Pius X gave it status as a solemnity.

A favorite image in art for today is the Icon of the Trinity, showing three glorious winged men seated at a table laden with bread and a cup of wine. It recalls Abraham's hospitality to angels and gives expression to the inner life of God, a life lived in relationship, a life poured out in abundance whenever Christians gather at the table of the Eucharist to give praise to the Father, in Christ, in the embrace of the Spirit.


Propósito: Campaña mensual que recoge fondos para ayudar a las personas que vienen a la oficina a pedir ayuda.

The Apostles and their Successors

From the earliest days of the Church the apostles appointed other men to succeed them to ensure that the mission Jesus entrusted to them would continue after their death (Acts 1:15-26; Tim 3:1; 2 Tim 1:6). In Catholic tradition bishops are by definition the successors of the apostles. “The bishops have by divine institution taken the place of the apostles as pastors of the Church, in such wise that whoever listens to them is listening to Christ and whoever despises them despises Christ and him who sent Christ” (Catechism, 862, quoting *Lumen gentium*, 20, 2). But in another sense, “The whole Church is apostolic, in that she remains, through the successors of St. Peter and the other apostles, in communion of faith and life with her origin: and in that she is ‘sent out’ into the whole world. All members of the Church share in this mission, though in various ways” (863).



Saints of the Week

Monday, June 13th: St. Anthony of Padua, Priest, Doctor of the Church; died 1231 at age thirty-six; from Lisbon; devoted student of scripture; first friar to teach theology to his fellow friars; gifted orator and preacher; known as the “Evangelical Doctor”; patron saint of Portugal, of the poor, of harvests, and lost articles.

June 14th: Henry O. Flipper, 1st African-American to graduate from the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, NY - 1877

RAÍCES BIBLICAS DE LA TRINIDAD

Las lecturas de hoy muestran algunas raíces bíblicas de lo que los cristianos llamarían más adelante la Trinidad. El libro de los Proverbios muestra el papel de la Sabiduría en la obra de la creación, descrita como una realidad ajena a Dios, pero integrada en la obra de Dios de formar los cielos y la tierra. Nos unimos al salmista para compartir el deleite de la Sabiduría en la obra de Dios: “Oh Señor, nuestro Dios, qué maravilloso es tu nombre en toda la tierra” (Salmo 8:2). En su carta a los romanos, Pablo escribe sobre la paz con Dios por medio de Jesús, y el amor de Dios que se recibe por medio del Espíritu Santo, lo que distingue a Dios, a Jesús y al Espíritu Santo, aunque también muestran su permanente unidad. Por último, en el discurso de despedida del Evangelio de Juan, Jesús—que antes había hablado de sí mismo como el Hijo del Padre—promete a sus amigos que recibirán el Espíritu de la verdad que les enseñará y guiará después de que él se vaya.

Extracto de la Homilía de Su Santidad el Papa Francisco el Domingo de la Trinidad 16 de junio de 2019

Hoy estamos celebrando la Santísima Trinidad. La Trinidad no es un enigma teológico, sino el espléndido misterio de la cercanía de Dios. La Trinidad nos dice que no tenemos un Dios solitario arriba en el cielo, distante e indiferente; no, es el Padre que nos dio a su Hijo, que se hizo hombre como nosotros, y que, para estar aún más cerca de nosotros, para ayudarnos a llevar las cargas de la vida, nos envía su mismo Espíritu. Él, que es Espíritu, entra en nuestro espíritu y así nos consuela desde dentro, llevando la ternura de Dios a nuestro corazón. Con Dios las cargas de la vida no descansan sobre nuestros hombros: el Espíritu, al que nombramos cada vez que hacemos la señal de la cruz precisamente al tocar nuestros hombros, viene a darnos fuerza, a animarnos, a llevar las cargas. En efecto, es un experto en resucitar, en levantarse de nuevo, en reconstruir. Hace falta más fuerza para reparar que para construir, para recomenzar que para empezar de cero, para reconciliar que para llevarse bien. Esta es la fuerza que Dios nos da.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Este domingo la Iglesia celebra la Solemnidad de la Santísima Trinidad: Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo. Este dogma acerca de la realidad de Dios es la clave para comprender la verdad de la religión cristiana. Mediante el poder del Espíritu Santo el Padre envió al Hijo como Salvador del mundo. Estas tres personas son un solo Dios. No es una doctrina fácil de comprender y mucho menos de pintar en arte sagrado. Sin embargo muchos artistas latinoamericanos han intentado pintar simbólicamente la verdad de la Santísima Trinidad. En muchos casos imaginan al Padre cargando a Jesús en la cruz y soplando sobre él el Espíritu en forma de paloma. A veces Padre e Hijo están entronados sobre las nubes soplando el Espíritu mutuamente y las alas de la paloma tocan los labios de ambos. En algunos casos el Padre, el Hijo y el Espíritu Santo son tres cabezas que salen de un solo cuerpo. Seguido los tres tienen el mismo rostro distinguiéndose solo por el color de sus vestiduras o los símbolos que cargan.
